THEY SAW THE LAKE FLY.

An African Phenomenon That Looked Like a Waterspout.

Crossing Victoria Nyanza, Messrs. P. H. Moland and E. H. Chalmers, the authors of "Through the Heart of Africa," saw a phenomenon which although common on the lakes of central Africa, seems rare enough.

The chief excitement on coming down late to luncheon told us that he had seen a waterspout near by. As we had finished our meal we hurried up on deck to get a glimpse of it. We saw near the southern horizon a gray smoke-like column arising from the surface of the lake and expanding into what looked like a cloud above.

Thinking that it must be the engineer's waterspout, we approached Captain Gray and Mr. Akoley, who were also intently observing it, and asked them if we were right in our conjecture.

"Waterspout!" said the skipper, with a smile. "Flies!"

"Flies?" we repeated and turned to Mr. Akoley in the hope of getting from him a more intelligible explanation.

"Quite true," he said. "Flies. You've seen the lake fly before?"

"No," we retorted, "we haven't, and we didn't know that it flew."

Assuring us that neither he nor the skipper had any intention of deceiving us, Mr. Akoley explained that he referred to the insect known as the "lake fly" and not to any spasmodic frolicosity on the part of the waters of Victoria Nyanza. The apparent waterspout was nothing more or less than a huge cloud composed of myriads of tiny flies. They sometimes rise from the surface of the lake in such dense columns as to obscure the light of the sun like a pillar of smoke.

TRICKS OF LIGHT.

Why People Sometimes Feel Dull or Uncomfortable at Table.

How few people realize that they are actually suffering from snow blindness in miniature every time they read or work over a white surface on which a brilliant light shines directly.

Half tone paper, for instance, which is the common medium for the majority of books we read, will throw a blinding glare into the eye of the reader if the light strikes it at the wrong angle and it forms an excellent test for the selection of proper lighting for a room and for the placing of the lighting fixtures, for blinding diffusion should be such as to allow comfortable reading from half tone paper in any position.

A dome hanging above a dining table on which is white cloth causes the light to reflect into the eyes of those around the table at an angle that produces muscular strain. This has a peculiar effect upon the senses, and drowsiness and mental inertia are apt to result. People are apt to complain of a feeling of dullness at table or that they have indigestion when it is, in reality, the effect of the light.

A too brilliant light shining directly into the eye plays many curious psychological tricks. Deep people, for instance, cannot hear so well if they are facing a brilliantly lighted room and, as for being able to see better by a bright light than by a dim one, exactly the reverse is the case, for details of objects become practically lost to the eye when too much light enters it.—Substant Life Magazine.

THE TICK QUESTION.

The new law provides that the work against the tick shall be more extensive by having the aid of the Federal, State and county Governments. Dr. Scott said the counties in which the new regulation is given effect will be cleared of the cattle tick and placed above the quarantine line. He has hopes of rapidly reducing the quarantine area of Texas in this way.

Cattlemen of West Texas, according to Dr. Scott, are manifesting much interest in the fight to kill the tick, even more than was at first anticipated. If present strides are kept up and other counties join in the work, he believes a big part of the now tick infested territory of the state will be placed above the quarantine line in two years.

The example of California and other Western states should be followed, Dr. Scott thinks. He said that 92,000 square miles were cleaned up in California in two years, and that state is now free from the ravages of the tick.

Dr. Scott would be pleased if Sutton County stockmen would consider and take action in the matter early so that the work of putting Sutton in the clean bill could be done by the Department when at work on adjoining Counties.

Action on the tick question should be taken at once so that the instructions of the Department may begin in October. The Oxtick is the one that causes most trouble in the work of extermination.

Dr. P. B. Scott of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, who is pressing back the tick in West Texas was in Sonora Wednesday for a few minutes. He states that the vote on clearing Schleicher County would be held on Sept. 6th and that in order that the vote would more thorough understand the importance of the work contemplated a meeting would be held at Eldorado on the evening of September 5th at which time W. N. Waddell, Chairman State Live Stock Sanitary Commission, Dr. E. J. Allen Supt. in charge of Texas U. S. Department of Agriculture, Dr. E. S. Neibert, U. S. Inspector in charge of Georgia and others will be present. Dr. Neibert will deliver an address on the subject and otherwise the meeting promises to be interesting to stockmen. The Citizens of Eldorado will provide a barbecue lunch for those attending. Dr. Scott thinks it would be a good opportunity for a Committee from Sutton County to learn of the tick and other cattle troubles.

William Mittle the Lost Lake divide stockman farmer, was in Sonora Thursday for lumber to build cribs and barns in which to store this seasons crops which are larger than formerly. He also reports that the West Texas Supply Co. of Kerrville sold him 5 bales of wool at 17 cents.

Bob Martin and outfit moved a bunch of cattle to Bear Creek this week.

Here is the Ultimatum.

These are the demands made on Huerta by the United States:

1. That there be an immediate cessation of hostilities and that an indefinite armistice be established. 2. That an early and fair election be held.

3. That General Huerta pledge himself not to be a candidate in this election.

4. That all the contending factions agree to abide by the result of an election.

If failure should be the result of the negotiations with Huerta, President Wilson in a message to Congress will recommend:

1. That all American left in Mexico shall withdraw, and that the United States shall use all its available resources in aiding their departure.

2. That the embargo against the shipment of arms from this country to Mexico shall be enforced, and the United States troops at the border shall be reinforced for this purpose.

3. That the factions in Mexico shall be left to fight out the question of supremacy.

4. That Americans remaining in Mexico and their property shall have proper protection, for which leaders of the Federalists and Rebels shall be held responsible.

5. That Huerta shall not be recognized as President of Mexico.

6. That there shall be no intervention of American troops except as a final resort.

Railroad Talk.

Fort Worth, Aug. 23. The Orient Railroad will be out of the hands of the receivers by March, 1914, is the confident expectation of road officials. The Orient railroad is not as dependent on agricultural conditions as some Texas roads, and the crop deteriorations of the last few weeks have not had as disastrous effects as roads running through strictly agricultural territory.

The Orient railroad will undertake to complete its lines in Mexico as soon as the receivers complete their work. However, work on the line running from Alpine to the Mexican coast cannot be resumed until conditions improve in Mexico. It is said that sixty-two miles of new road are being operated southwest of Alpine.

Commercial Agent J. P. O'Donnell of the Orient, who has his headquarters in Fort Worth, said the company is preparing to arrange its schedule north and south of Sweetwater so that good connections can be made with the new Texas & Pacific train, which will start Aug. 30. Mr. O'Donnell believes the addition of this train will bring in closer touch much of the Western territory that is tributary to Fort Worth.

Under the management of the receivers the Orient, he said, is doing an exceptionally good business for the season. An additional freight train from Kansas City to Alpine which was put on a brief time ago is doing better business than was expected.

"There is no doubt that the road will be built through Mexico as soon as conditions are settled," said Mr. O'Donnell. "The line already has been surveyed southwest of Alpine to the coast." Part of the line has been built and is in operation and the eighty-one miles from Reedido to Alpine have been surveyed. The line from Marquez to Sanchez, Mexico, a distance of 287 miles, had been built before the revolution in Mexico. Part of this line has been destroyed and there is a gap from Sanchez to Fuerte of 209 miles. Sixty miles from Fuerte to Tapolobampo were built before the Mexican disturbance, and I suppose this division is in operation now.

"All plans for building from San Angelo to Del Rio, on the Southern Pacific, a distance of 175 miles, have been made. A continuation of this line from Del Rio to A leads, a distance of forty-five miles, would make the run from Kansas City to the City of Mexico fifty-five miles shorter.

On the 13th a cyclone will appear on the Gulf of Mexico, 14th to 15th, rain over the Gulf States, hot over the Northern States. 16th to 17th, showers. 18th to 19th, cooler.
