SIMPLE FACTS ABOUT THE NOTES OF THE VICTORY LIBERTY LOAN.

There are two kinds of notes
being issued. Both mature in 3
or 4 years, as the Government
chooses later.

The first kind bear 4 3/4 per
cent interest yearly, payable every
six months. These are free from
State and local taxes, except es-
tate and inheritance taxes, and
from the normal Federal Income
taxes.

The second kind bear 3 3/4 per
cent interest and are free from
taxation as the others are, but in
addition are free from super-taxes
and every other form of taxation,
except the usual estate and in-
heritance taxes.

Notes of either kind can be
changed for those of the other
issue, at the wish of the buyer.

The notes of both series will be
dated and bear interest from May
20, 1919, and will mature on May
20, 1923. Interest will be pay-
able on December 15, 1919, and
after that on June 15, and Dec. 15
and at maturity. The dates upon
which payments will be required
on the notes are as follows:

Ten per cent with application
on or before May 10.
Ten per cent on July 15.
Twenty per cent on Aug 12.
Twenty per cent on Sept 9.
Twenty per cent on October 7
Twenty per cent on November
11 with accrued interest on deferr-
ed installments.

Payment in full can be made on
May 20, the ten per cent required
with application having been duly
paid on or before May 10. Pay-
ment can also be completed ON
ANY INSTALLMENT DATE
with accrued interest.

This accrued interest is the
money you refund the Govern-
ment on account of the fact that
it pays you interest on the full
amount of your Bond from May
20, whereas it does not have the
full use of your money until you
have paid the last installment.
This amounts to very little, of
course.

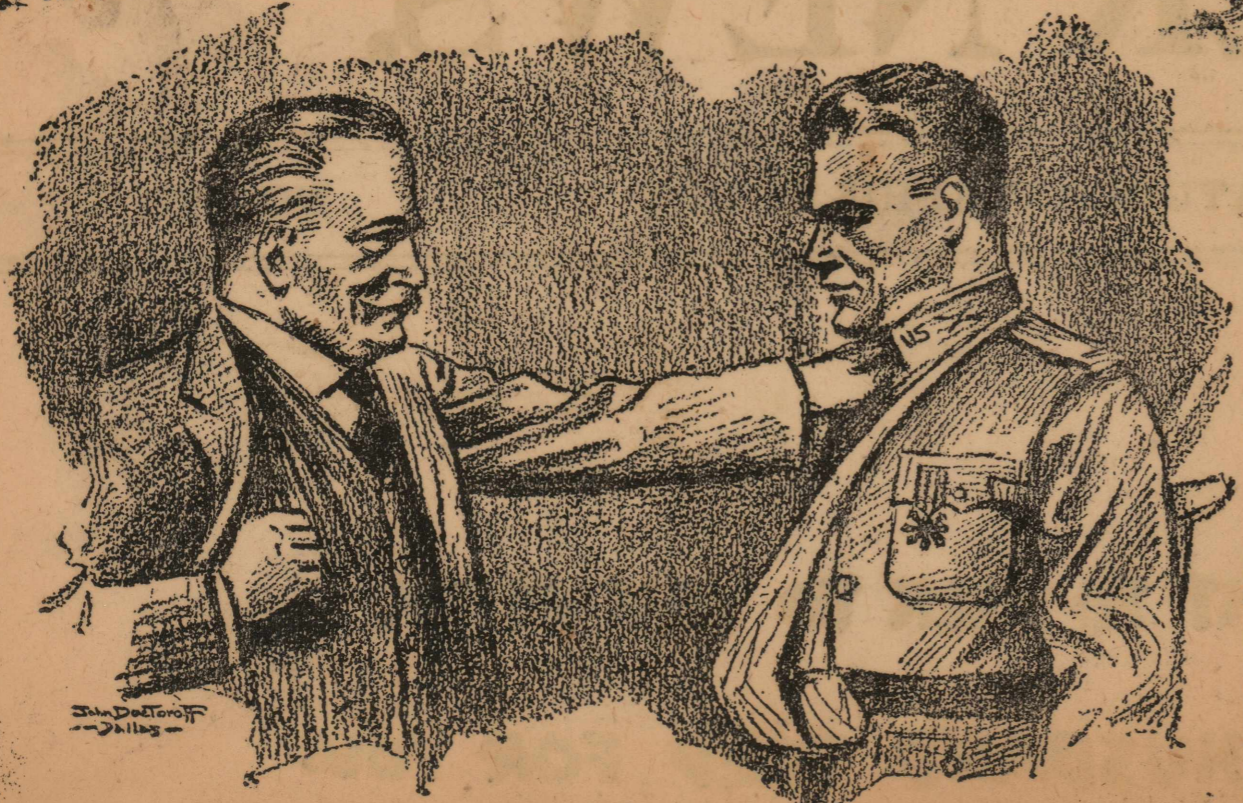

The amount of Fifth Victory Loan Bonds allotted to Sutton county is \$14,200. County Chairman **W. E. Hodges** says the sales are progressing favorably and urges all who expect to obtain their part of these Government securities to call early at the First Notional bank. They are in denominations of \$50 and up and the terms are most attractive.

BONDS TO BE ISSUED.
The election for the issuance of bonds for good roads in Sutton county will be held on May 24th. All the counties adjoining Sutton have voted the road bonds almost unanimously and now it is Sutton's duty to do the same. The Commissioners' Court in session this week paid off the old bonds and the county will start in with a clean slate for good roads in all directions. The recognized intelligence of the people of this county and their business ability insures the success of the bond issue.

WOMAN'S LIBERTY LOAN COMMITTEE.

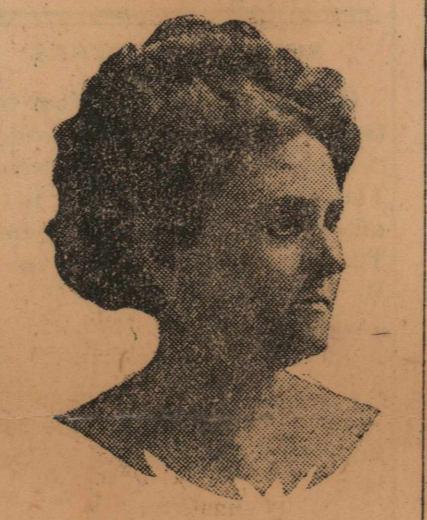
The opening gun of the Victory Liberty Loan has sounded. Over the top the forces of the Victory Army are sweeping, this week, next week and the week after, taking their objectives as our gallant doughboys took trench after trench from the Huns. Hostilities are ended, but our obligations have not ended with them. The Victory Liberty Loan must be floated, to bring home the soldiers still overseas, to finance reconstruction work, to care for the disabled and to provide for the dependents of these and the glorious dead.
In this Loan campaign women are assisting in the fullest measure as they have in all war activities from running railroads to nursing wounded under fire. In the Fourth Loan more than a million women sold bonds.



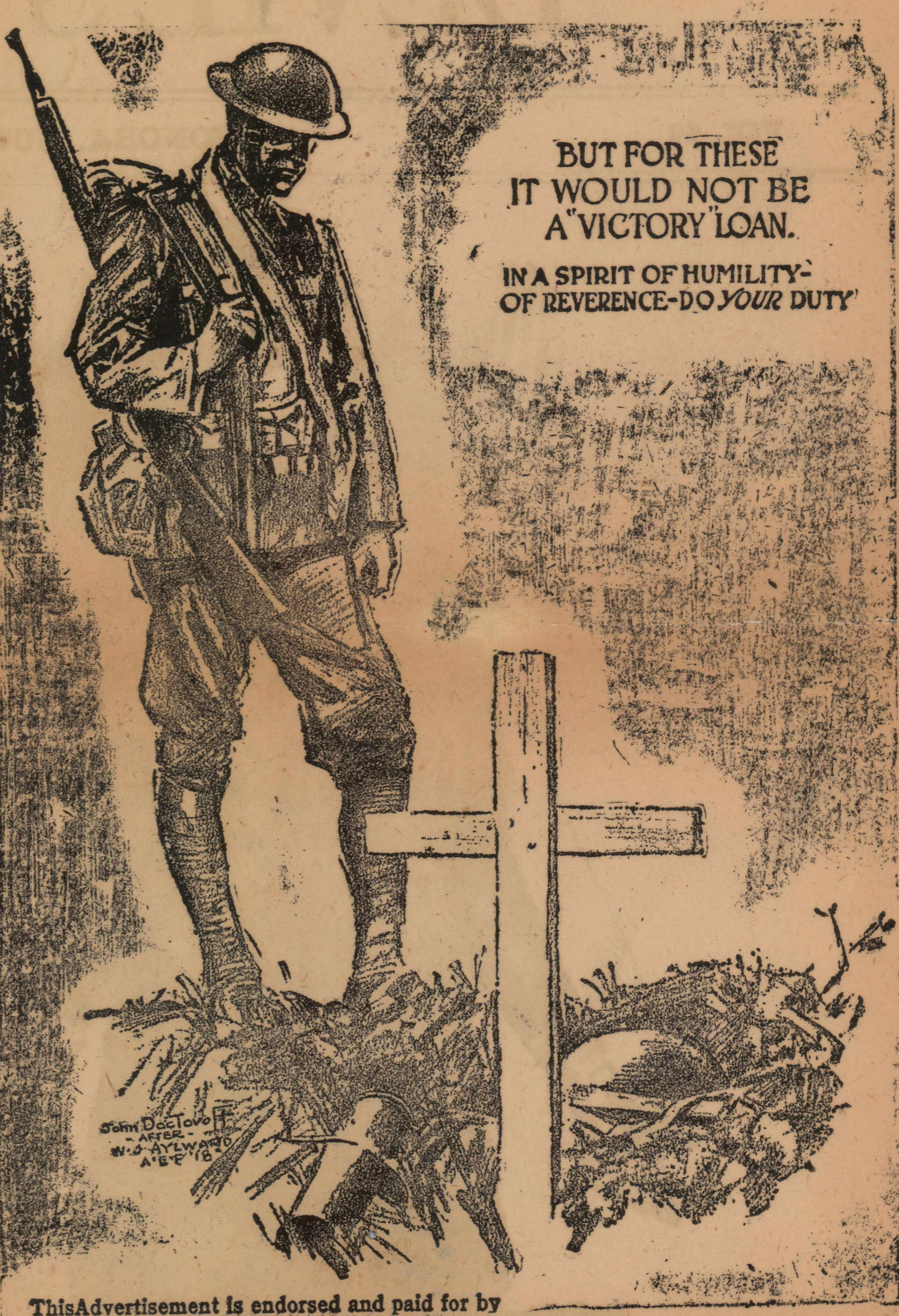
MRS. W. G. MCADOO.
Secretary of the Treasury W. G. McAdoo in May 1917 created the National Woman's Liberty Loan Committee. His wife, Mrs. Eleanor Wilson McAdoo, daughter of President Wilson, was chosen by the committee to be its chairman.



MRS. E. B. REPERT.
Mrs. E. B. Reppert of Dallas, was made chairman of the Eleven Federal District. With her characteristic force she organized the women so that from the very beginning they showed telling work. There was no record kept of the First Drive. In the Second Loan Drive women sold more than \$13,000,000 in bonds in the District and more than \$10,000,000 in Texas; during the Third more than \$23,000,000 in the District and more than 20,000,000 in Texas and in the Fourth Loan a total of more than \$36,000,000 in the District and more than \$30,000,000 in Texas.

In Sutton County the Woman's Liberty Loan forces, under the leadership of Mrs. W. L. Aldwell of Sonora, have done excellent work. In the Fourth Loan they secured over \$13,600. With this enthusiastic chairman still leading the Victory Liberty Loan Drive will doubtless go over the top.
Mrs. Aldwell, formerly Miss Winnie Harris of Austraalia, Ill., was educated in Memphis, Tenn., and upon coming to Texas, married. For 19 years she has lived in Sonora. She has taken active part in public and social affairs. At present she is President of the Sonora Woman's Club, vice President of the Red Cross, County Chairman of the Equal Suffrage Association and Chairman of the Woman's Liberty Loan Committee.

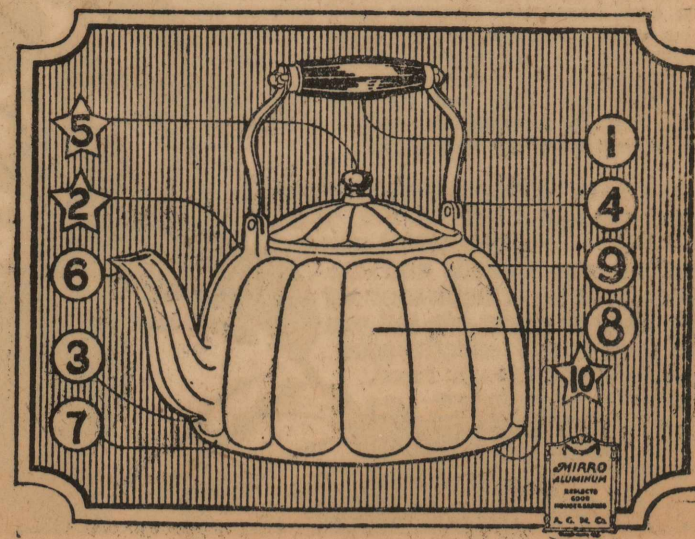
Sheep that have been on good range in the Sonora country are expected to shear a fourth more wool than last year. The consequence is the wool growers will need more sacks.

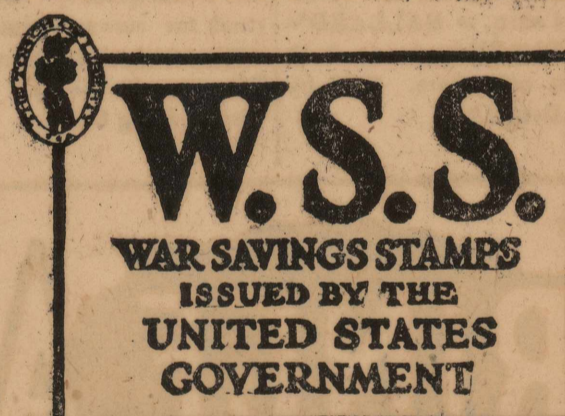

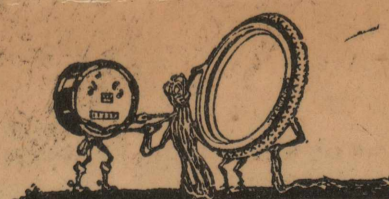

Del Rio-Sonora-Canadian Highway Association is Organized

Mineral Wells, April 19.—The Del Rio-Sonora-Canadian Highway Association was formed here Wednesday afternoon at a meeting of delegates residing near the highway route and attending the United States Good Roads convention.

The association will promote the interests of the highway, which will enter Mexico, making the first Texas international highway.

The highway starts at Del Rio. From there it runs north to Sonora, San Angelo, Sweetwater, Roby and Ochiltree. The route was one of the first to be designated by J. D. Fauntleroy of the federal good roads department for state and federal aid.

The association elected W. A. Palmer of Canadian president, George J. Trainer of Sonora vice president, Thomas F. Owen of San Angelo secretary-treasurer. One director for the association will be picked by each county on the route.

The vote in Edwards county Saturday on the \$400,000 good roads bonds was 251 for and 7 against.

The "all Texas" route of the national highway from Memphis to El Paso will enter Texas at Texarkana and run thence roughly to Sulphur Springs, Greenville, Dallas, Mineral Wells, Ranger, Baird, Abilene, Sweetwater, Big Springs, Pecos, Sierra Blanca and El Paso.

NOTICE OF ELECTION.

THE STATE OF TEXAS.

County of Sutton.

On this the 23rd day of April, 1919, the Court being in special session, came on to be considered the petition of W. L. Aldwell and 59 other persons, all being resident property tax-paying voters of said Sutton county, praying this Court to order an election to be held in Sutton County to determine whether or not bonds of Sutton County shall be issued in any amount not to exceed one fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of Sutton county, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining or operating of macadam, gravel, or paved roads and turpines, or in aid thereof, and whether or not a tax shall be levied upon the property of said Sutton County subject to taxation, for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof.

And it appearing to the Court that said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident property tax-paying voters of said Sutton County, that the bonds proposed to be issued will not exceed one-fourth the assessed valuation of the real property of said Sutton County.

It is therefore considered and ordered by the Court that an election be held in the County of Sutton, State of Texas, on the 24th day of May, 1919, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order, to determine whether or not the bonds of said Sutton County, Texas, shall be issued in the amount of \$300,000 (300,000) bearing 5 1/2 per cent rate of interest, and maturing thirty years from date hereof, and whether or not a tax shall be levied upon the property of said Sutton County, Texas, subject to taxation for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds, and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity.

Notice of said election shall be given by publication in a news paper published in said county for four consecutive weeks before the date of said election, and in addition thereto there shall be posted notices of such election at three public places in Sutton County, Texas, one of which shall be at the Court House door for three weeks prior to the election.

Said election shall be held at the various election precincts in said Sutton County, and at the voting places in said respective election precincts as follows: to wit:

No. 1, Court House in the town of Sonora; No. 2, at the J. W. Wilson ranch; No. 3, at the Cedar Hill school house; No. 4, at the Owenville school house; No. 5, at the Merck school house.

And the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election in the respective election precincts:

Precinct No. 1—L. R. Thorp and C. D. West managers of election.

Precinct No. 2—J. M. Pickett and Sol Kelly managers of election.

Precinct No. 3—T. T. Eubanks and Otto Thiers managers of election.

Precinct No. 4—J. A. Sykes and J. P. Reiley managers of election.

Precinct No. 5—A. T. Stuart and E. E. Steen managers of election.

Said election shall be held under provisions of Articles 627 to 641, inclusive, of Chapter 2, Title 18 Revised Statutes of 1911, and amended by Chapter 203, Acts of 1917, and only qualified voters who are property tax-payers of said Sutton County, Texas, shall be allowed to vote, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"For the issuance of bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof."

And those who opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the issuance of bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the law governing general elections in the State.

A copy of this order, signed by the County Judge of said County, shall serve as proper notice of said election, and the County Judge is directed to cause said notice to be published in a newspaper published in said Sutton County, Texas, for four consecutive weeks preceding the date of said election, and to cause to be posted a notice thereof at three public places in Sutton County, Texas, one of which shall be at the Court House door for three weeks prior to said election.

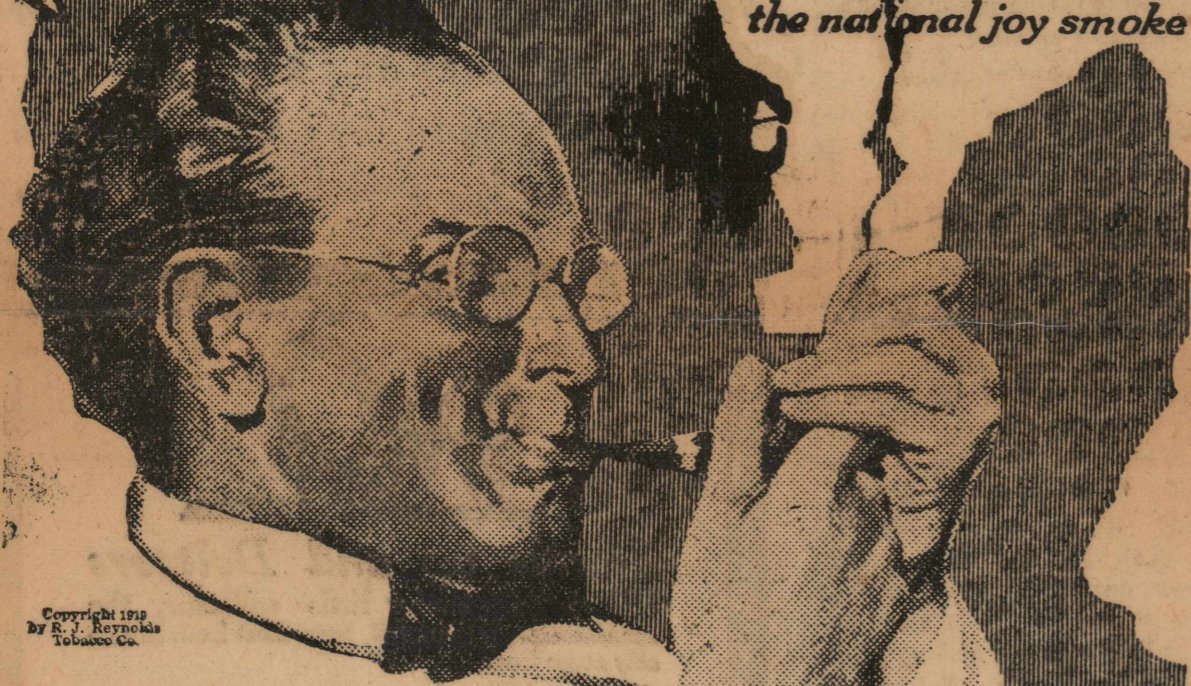
