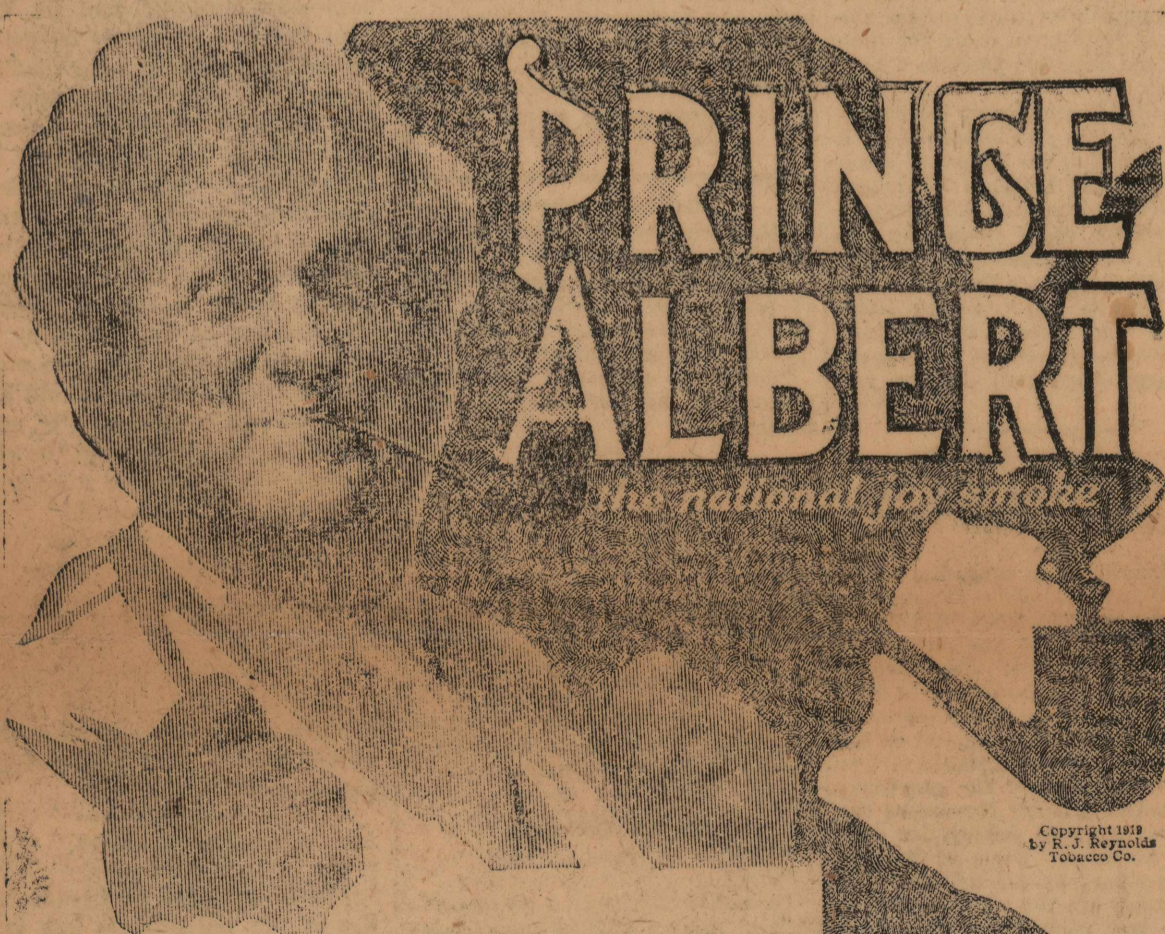

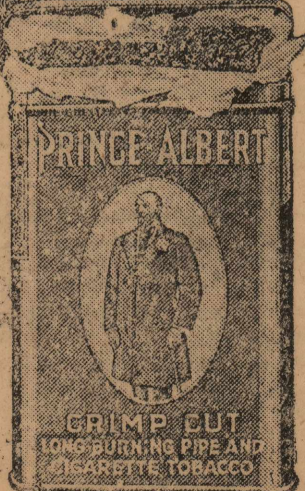

MARRIED.

Some idea of the seriousness of the drought situation in the Northwestern States, as it affects stockmen, may be gained from the estimate made the other day that in Montana alone, there are 400,000 cattle and 100,000 sheep that must be immediately removed to graze or they will be in danger of perishing. This indicates that the total number of animals on the ranges of the several states where the drought prevails, will run well into the millions. At the meeting of Government officials and livestock men held in St. Paul a few days ago to take action for relief of suffering stockmen, tentative plans were made for removal of large numbers of cattle and sheep to Minnesota, where grass is said to be plentiful, the idea being to pasture the stock there during the summer and feed them in through the winter, so they will be ready for next spring's market. The Federal Government is expected to supply money for moving the stock, and it is being urged to also provide cash for buying feed for the stock before shipping, as it is said the animals are in so weakened a condition that they are not able to stand the long transportation. This situation is very similar to that which prevailed in West Texas two years ago, except that it involves a greater number of animals and owners—San Antonio Express.

 You are hereby commanded to summon Butler M. Alexander by making publication of this citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper of general circulation, published in your County, which has been continuously and regularly published for a period of not less than one year, to be and appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Sutton County, to be held at the Court House thereof in Sonora, Texas, on the third Monday after the first Monday in September, 1919, the same being the 22nd day of September, A.D. 1919, in a suit numbered on the docket of said Court No. 47, wherein Mrs. Alice Alexander is plaintiff and Butler M. Alexander is defendant, said petition alleging:
 1st.

That she is an actual bona fide resident of the State of Texas and has resided in said County of Sutton for at least six months next preceding the filing of this suit. That the residence and whereabouts of the defendant is to the plaintiff unknown.

That plaintiff, during the time she lived with the defendant as aforesaid, had two children by him, to wit: A boy, thirteen years of age, by the name of Cecil Alexander, and a girl, eleven years of age, by the name of Jewel Alexander. That said children are now and have ever been in the care, control and custody of the plaintiff; that plaintiff is the proper person to have the care, control, custody and education of said children; that she is able, ready and willing to properly maintain and educate her said children.

Wherefore, plaintiff prays the Court that the defendant be cited to appear and answer this petition according to law, and that upon hearing hereof said marriage be dissolved and declared null and void, and that plaintiff have judgment for the care, custody and education of the said children of said marriage, for costs of suit, and for such other and further relief special and general, in law an equity to which she may be entitled.
