We have learned that life isn't only a question of a job and enough to eat, we want to be freated like human beings. A man wants to feel that his work means more to him than just wages. He spends most of his fine at work, the rest of it is spent with his family and in sleeping so he will be able to work the next day. Why shouldn't he have an interest in the business, and why shouldn't the husiness have an interest shouldn't the business have an interest in him? 
