10th. We use just enough Sodium Chloride, (Common Salt) to satisfy the demand for salt and not too much because it is cheap. We know the correct amount.

The Blue Bug (Fowl Tick) as an Enemy

This tick like many other pests is an imported enemy and is the worst poultry enemy we have to fight. This fat tick, and it is a true tick, is found in most poultry houses, turkey roosts, many buzzard roosts, etc. Owing to its habit of crawling between boards in every crevice, climbing wire and hiding in the topmost recesses of a chicken house, and other places where it remains during the day time, it is seldom noticed until the damage is done. We then notice chickens with pale combs and wattles, thin in flesh, drooping, often falling upon the ground while walking and many even die from the loss of blood taken from the fowl by the blue bug.

The females may deposit as many as 200 odd eggs, 500 being the average. These eggs hatch in from 10 to 100 days into the seed ticks which attack the fowls and there remain from 2 to 4 days before becoming engorged. They then drop off, shed their skin and again attack an unfortunate fowl some future evening. This time it will complete its meal in from one to three hours, drop off and again repeat the same process. After being fed for the third time egg deposition takes place.

The cattle tick engorges and deposits eggs but once, while the blue bug repeats the process five or six times. This pest is also very patient while waiting for another meal because the seed ticks are capable of doing without food for five and a half months, the second and third stage nine and thirteen months respectively and the adult tick is known to live at least two and a half years without food.

Strange as it may seem, but the blue bug is very hard to find upon a chicken, turkey, or any other fowl, for example the author examined a chicken that was known to be infested and found only 30 to 40 seed ticks but after keeping this same fowl in quarantine over water for ten days, 1015 ticks were recovered. Is it any wonder our chickens go down in egg production.

Probably the best way to be sure ticks are present is to examine the cracks, roosts, ceiling, knot holes, etc. for large black specks and for the blue bugs themselves, also go into the house about 10 p.m., or later with a flashlight and see the ticks crawling everywhere.

A tick that is red in color has just had a meal, but if it is dark blue or bluish black it is or soon will be looking for another meal.

A later article will deal with the best known methods of control and eradication.

THE WOOL MARKET.

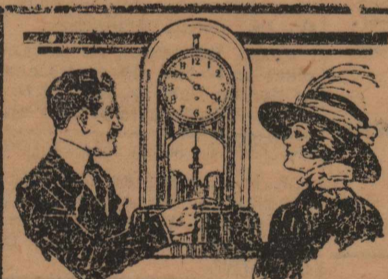
The Government had on hand on March 31st 48,977,456 pounds of wool of which only 4,517,142 pounds were Domestic, and since that date the Government has sold about 7,500,000. Another disturbing factor of the wool market is the recent importation of Foreign wools, some of which are said to be of good quality, and enter seriously into competition with the Domestic fine wools as they are at a lower price because of industrial and other conditions in Europe.

There is a dangerous element also in the range of prices between the fine and lower grades of Domestic Fine Laboratory tops now priced at \$2.70 before the war brought 40c, while quarter blood tops now selling at 70 cents before the war brought 45 cents, showing how the fine has advanced beyond proportion to the medium.

Wool is not ordinarily classed as perishable freight nor is it food, fuel or feed, still it is necessary to the mills and the transportation difficulties removes the incentive for buyers to seek the clips for the early market.

In Michigan 75 to 80 cents is being asked for fine wools and Ohio growers are still firm as to prices. In Eastern Washington trading has been fairly active with crossbreds selling at 38 to 41 cents and fine wools at 49 to 55 cents.

The wool market is further depressed by the cancellation of woolen and worsted goods which has started from the sales of stocks of dry goods at reduced prices throughout the country in response to the popular demand for lower prices in all lines. The result of this movement is problematical, some firms may be closed out and the threat of a panic may really produce one with the consequent loss to all lines of industry. This condition is not expected to affect the fine wools, such as are grown in the Sonora country, except in a sympathetic manner, and will not last longer than this fall. The labor and production conditions, however, are the principal reasons for the unsettled conditions. Fine wools will continue most in demand even though the sales may be slow.

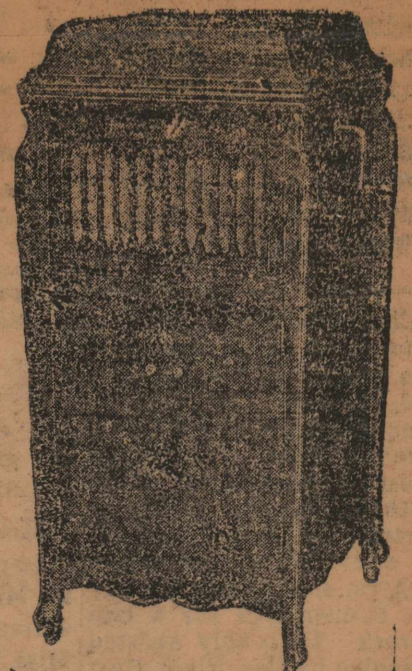

DIED.

Mrs. Sarah A. Luckie, died at the home of her son, W. F. Luckie in Sonora, Texas, Wednesday, June 9th, 1920, in her 85th year.

Mrs. Luckie was a pioneer of Texas, coming from her native State, Alabama, with her parents Mr. and Mrs. James Smith, when an infant. She was married to W. F. Luckie in Bexar county in 1853. Her husband was a Confederate veteran who served all through the Civil war. She lived in the town of Castroville at the time and knitted socks for the soldiers. They moved to Burnett county in 1869, where Marble Falls now stands and had many thrilling experiences with the Indians in those days and in her later years often related these experiences for the entertainment of her grand children. Her husband died March 23rd, 1902 and was laid to rest at Marble Falls and her remains were taken there Thursday and placed by his side. She was the mother of 12 children, rearing ten of them to maturity and seeing them married six of whom are now living as follows: W. F. Luckie of Sonora, Mrs. Julia Cox of Stroud, Okla., Mrs. Josie Hamlin of Moody, Mrs. Sallie Lowe of Nashville, Tenn., Leta Luckie of Magerman, N. M., Mack Luckie of St. Cloud, Minn. Deceased lived through 4 wars of the U. S. A., and during the European struggle again knitted socks for the A. E. F. boys. She left a host of grand and great grand children to mourn her loss as she was dearly loved by all.

The remains were taken to Marble Falls Thursday accompanied by W. F. Luckie and Miss Ethel Luckie. They were met at San Angelo by Leta Luckie. The News extends its sympathy to the relatives in their sorrow.

Dr. C. B. Carver, the well-known physician, died of acute indigestion at his home in Eldorado Tuesday night. Dr. Carver practiced in Sonora for several months two years ago and was quite successful. He made many friends here who will be sorry to learn of his sudden death.

Citizens Committee to Washington Given a Respectful Hearing on Railway Matter.

W. L. Aldwell, H. P. Allison and S. E. McKnight returned this week from Washington, where they with Judge Cornell, represented the interests of the people in the matter of obtaining a loan from the Interstate Commerce Commission for the extension of the Orient Railway to Sonora. They were given a special hearing and are hopeful that the loan will be made.

Mr. Aldwell says that on arriving in Washington the representatives of the people and the Railroad met and organized with S. C. Rowe, attorney for the Cattle Raisers Association as chairman and with the assistance and guidance of Congressman Hudspeth arranged for the meeting with a program which allowed all the communities and the interested parties a few minutes each in which to present their views after which Judge James Cornell of Sonora summed up for all the parties. The Committee of the Interstate Commerce Commission that heard the presentation of the petition were evidently impressed with the justice of the claim for assistance and extended the time allowed for the hearing in order to get all the facts and inform themselves as to details. They must have been impressed with the proposal of the people asking for the extension of the road to supplement the value of the security with a bonus of \$250,000.

Mr. Aldwell says the people through the committee are under obligations to Congressman Hudspeth, Senator Kendrick of Wyoming, Senator Sheppard of Texas and Congressmen Lanham, Jones and Blanton as well as several others for the valuable assistance rendered them. Mr. Rowe of the Cattle Raisers Association will return to Washington and be in touch with the Commission should any further information be needed.

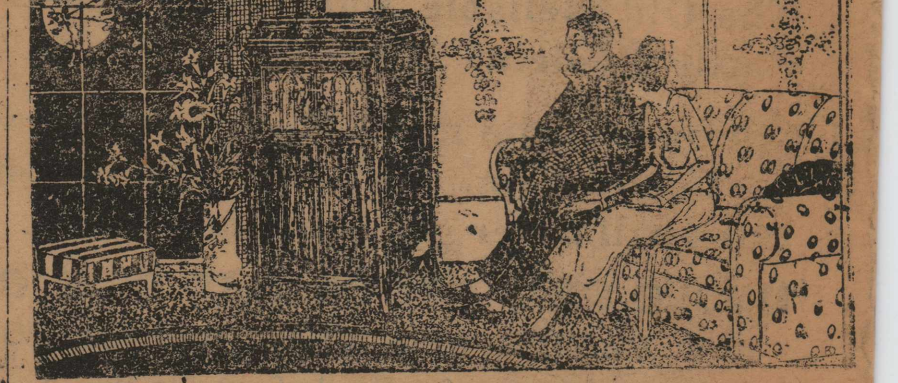
