THE MONUMENT TO THE PILGRIMS

TOP TOWN HILL in Provincetown, Massachusetts, looking out over the restless sea from the great in which that state flings out into stands a great and impressive nonument of extraordinary beauty

This monument, one of the tallest bild born in New England and the hole chain of happenings which preeded the settlement at Plymouth. Built entirely of Maine granite, States Army, this structure rests upon sixty-foot-square foundation, is 28 feet square at the base, approximately 252 feet high and the site is about 100 feet above the tides. The architecture is of the Italian Renaissance order, the design having been copied from the tower of Torre del Mangia






