



Yet, when it comes to a question of supplying the town with needed hotel facilities, the people of Sonora are strangely backward about making any move to secure such an institution.

Believing that a new hotel would be of more than ordinary benefit to the town and the business concerns in the city, we can't understand why ome action is not taken toward supplying the need. A hotel would not cost too much money. Our citizens are well able to supply any financial assistance required. A building site would not be hard to obtain. No great amount of opposition would be met with in locating the hotel. Capable people could be found to operate the hotel. There is a well-defined need for the hotel, and a well-defined desire for it. Only one thing is needed to assure the hotel-some initiative on the part of one or more of our business men to start advocation of it.

It is understood that the question of a new hotel for Sonora has never been brought up at any meeting of the local chamber of commerce. Why such is the case has not been explained. With such an outspoken desire on the part of many of our people and business firms, we believe it is the duty of the chamber of commerce to investigate the matter, appoint committees to go into the question, and find out if Sonora really wants the hotel badly enough to justify further action being taken If is is found that enough people are behind the move, then the chamber of commerce should take it upon itself to assist in every way possible to have the hotel erected as quickly as poserators, and do all other things requested of them in the matter. Of course, they would not be expected to help finance the proposition but its assistance in other ways would not only be a big help to the men working on the problem, but is no more than the duty of the chamber of commerce of

This matter of a new hotel demands immediate attention, and we suggest that at the next meeting of the local chamber, the question be brought up to decide at once whether it shall be gone further into. If not, let it be known so that useless agitation of the question shall cease. But we believe that the only decicion possible will be that of an immediate start on plans looking toward an early completion of a new hotel.


