Book News and Reviews

Michael Arlen, the talented young author of "The Green Hat" has apparently taken his severest critics seriously, for his new enthusiastic treatment of the former, though his wonderful style remains intact and as usual, this latest book is a best-seller that is worth reading.

More doings in Mayfair are outlined in "Young Men In Love." In place of Iris March, this time Arlen presents for the readers approval, or disaproval (and he doesn't seem to care very much whether you approve of her) Veneita Vardon, and those who followed Iris March in her course through "The Green Hat" will recognize in Venetia Vardon the prototype of the young English girl which Mr. Arlen seems so much to admire

To be perfectly frank, the story is a little sordid, not to say, downrigh off-color. But that is just what has placed Michael Arlen's name high among the ranks of modern writers. He simply writes the facts as he might like to write them, or as the reader might like to see them, but a those characters, with their environment, rearing, etc. would most probably act if the circumstances depicted became actualities.

In his description of Englishmen and women of the upper strata, Arler is without a rvial. You can see the trantic attempts of the young son of the Jewish Lord (who attained his title through his ownership of a huge city daily in London) to win for him self the heart of the Amercian chorungirl by presenting to her a priceless diamond, unset, which he has stoler from his father's collection, as plain by as though you, too, were in her dressing room.

So much unfavorable comment has heen given to Sinclair Lew book, "Elmer Gantry," (Harcourt, Bruce & Co., N. For some occult reason, those who seem to knock the book (like hose who knock the Bible) are the ones who have not read it, but have been willing to take for granted that he scathing criticisms of the clergy are well grounded.

The argument most frequently advanced against Elmer Gantry" is that bewis has painted a perfect demon of a vigaro as the typical American protestant minister.

But he has drawn a picture of a certain type of American preacher, he Bible-banging, fire-defying, pubcity-seeking evangelist, all too familiar to most of us.

The fact remains that there are uch men, and plenty of them, in the rotestant churches, and in nine cases out of ten they are at the top f their profession, with crowded churches, and tremendous salaries.

However, as against these, there appear in the book men who exemplify he highest type of minister, scholarly gentlemen with the love of God and the desire to help others deeply coted in their natures.

Every book that Lewis has written has been a protest against some fault of our modern civilization. Who is there complacent enough to think that it is perfect?



HOTEL PROSPECTS BRIGHTER

Our persistent hammering on the question of a new hotel for Sonora is about to bring forth results other than mere talk, if the action of the local chamber of commerce can be taken as a criterion. In a meeting held last Saturday morning, the question of a hotel for Sonora was brought before the chamber of commerce, and that body went on record as favoring another hotel for the town to supplement existing hotel facilities. We have long favored such action taken by the chamber, and that it has done so is a source of pleasure to us, whether or not our boosting had anything to do with the action being taken.

In its meeting, the chamber went into the hotel question thoroughly, found that there was a well-defined demand for another hotel, and acted accordingly, making it plain that the body as a whole favored the new insttution, and giving assurance that it would help in everything posible to further the scheme. Individual members of the chamber, some of them being the most prominent men in the city, were also outspoken in their desire for another hotel, and it was revealed during the discussion of the question that several men of Sonora were willing to subscribe money toward securing another hotel for the

For several weeks we have agitated the question of a new hotel for Sonora. This was done from a desire to see Sonora secure every convenience that a city ought to have. We have had no quarrel with existing institutions, nor have we desired to see them suffer from competition which another hotel in town would create. Nor have we had any desire to turn our citizens against hotels now in operation. We have been actuated from a desire to see hotel accomodations increased, since it is a self-evident fact that such accomodations have been insufficient to care for the needs of the town. Now that the chamber of commerce is officially in favor of another hotel, we expect to see something come of the move.




