### Tom Connally **Introduces** Bill To Increase Old Age Pensions

Washington, D. C., October 6,1941 Baird has one of the best Senator Tom Connally today introwith President Roosevelt's recent The following is the personnel of proposal to vary federal pension ta income of the States rather than on a fifty-fifty basis. This Chief and Fire Marshal, will enable the poorer states to receive proportionately a larger share of federal funds than that

Hose Co. No. 1, Pumper. Under the present act the Fed-George Lambert, Foreman Hose eral government matches the Tex Co. No. 2, Booster. as contribution dollar for dollar, P. H. King, Secretary-Treasurer. but under the proposed Connally bill the Federal government would contribute a little more than two dollars for every dollar contributed by the Texas Legislature. In other words, a \$45 Texas pension payment would be possible by the State contributing about \$15 and the Federal government contribut ing the remainder. Heretofore the combined contributions of the Fed eral and Texas governments have totaled a little less than \$14 but with the same State contribution the total would be \$22.50 under C. D. Under recent exactments of the Texas Legislature, if funds are available, the Arneld Thompson, connection man monthly payments from federal and stte funds would mount to \$18.50, but under the Conally bill with the same state contribution, the monthly payments would amount to \$27.50.

The State Department of Pub lic Welfare are now accepting apchildren at its local offices through out state.

Parents or relatives of dependent children should call at the State Department's loca 1 office in the county in which they reside and talk with the woker who will be prepared to explain the eligibility requirements and asist in filing application. It will not be necessary that the children be brought to the office as the local worker will later make a visit to the home at which time the childrein may be seen.

might be due to imprisoment, desertion or abandonment, or divorce The physical or mental incapacity of a parent is interpreted to mean an incapacity trat restricts the occupational activity of a parent to such n extent that the prent is unable to provide support. The parent's condition must be of such chronic nature that it can reasonably be anticipated to in-

capacitate the parent for a period if at least six months. The Constitution of Texas, Article III, Section 51D, restricts pay ments in such a way that no more than \$16.00 can be given for one child in an eligible family, and no more than \$24.00 can be given for two or more children in an eligible family.
