Three Routes Three logical routes have been suggested for the proposed line. The first, by way of Fredericksburg, would include Brady, making contact at that point with the Frisco system, thence to San Angelo.

The second via Kerrville, utilizing existing trackage of the Southern Pacific, would run into San Angelo y way of Menard.

Th ethird route, by way of Sonora, would touch lines of no other existing trunk road.

If built direct to San Angelo, the road would require aproximately 200 miles of track, Morrison said.







And a number of those convicted were soon at liberty and free to commit more bank robberies, some pardoned, some escapae Pointing out that the great major-

ity of present day bank robberies are by "daylight bandits" uusually of the generation, Massie declares flatly, 'There is only one way to stop a daylight bank robbery after it gets start ed and that is to shoot the robber and shoot to kill.

Results of the new policy already have far exceeded his expectations the bankers' association president de clares.

Between the time the reward notices first were posted, late in November and Janary 1st, three Texas bank robbers have been killed in the act, two wounded, the leading members of a well-organized gang believed to be responsible for a series of bank holdups over two years time have been rounded up, only one successful bank robbery occured and one bank robber was sentenced to the electric chair, Massie pointed out Furthermore, "there has been a greater number of arrests on the charge of bank robbery in Texas during the past six weeks than during the previous two years," he adds significiently.

We are going to keep on advertising the fact far and wide that we will pay \$5,000 for every dead bank robber and that we will not pay a cent for a hundred live bank robbers," Massie concludes. "We are launched upon this policy for an indefinite period."

Washington, D: C .- More than 1,500,000 applicants were registered at European consulates for admission into the United States at the first of the year, Senator David Reed, of Pennsylvnia, said at the immigration conference held under the auspices of the Key Men of America. Admission of this number and the millions which would follow would cause the United States "soon to lose its American identity and become a polyglot of transported European culture and institution," he declared. He urged that to avoid this menance to the welfare of the country a strict enforcement of the immigration restriction laws and adherence to the trouble. national origins system of immigration appointment should be mainained. "We have no need for any uch immigration," the senator coninued. "America is doing its own work well today. Can you inflict any greater injury upon the American who works with his hands than to innew workers who come to look for jobs and come inevitably to take jobs rom American citizens?"


