#### J. J. NORTH, 53. WAS BURIED IN OZONA TUESDAY

One of the largest funerals ever held in Ozona was that of one of Ozona's leading businessmen, Joseph J. North, who died at Temple, Texas, Sunday night following an operation and blood transfusion from which he never rallied.

Throngs from Sonora and other points in this section drove to Ozona Tuesday afternoon where friendly and tender hands laid the body in its last resting place. The funeral was conducted from the North home, and was under the care of Rev. J. H. Meridith, pastor of the Methodist Church of Ozona,

The funeeral was in the hands of the Masonic Lodge of Ozona, of which he was a member. He had been a Mason for over thirty years, demitting to the Ozona lodge from Dee Ora Lodge of Sonora, in which lodge he had been one of the most active workers. About twenty-five Masons from Sonora helped lay the body to rest.

Mr. North was one of the most widely known and best liked men in this section of the State. He was for number of years a partner of the late Geo. B. Hamilton in the grocery business at Sonora. Later he became a member of the firm of Hull, North, Simmons and Hull, operating the Sonora Motor Company, Ford dealers. In all of these business asociations he was recognized as a forceful figure, and one of Sonora's most progressive men.

Mr. North was a great lover of outdoor life, hunting and fishing being his principal hobbies. He was perhaps te best known deer hunter n the state, his marksmanship being unerring.

After leaving Sonora Mr. North entered the garage business at Ozona owning the Chevrolet agency there. Besides this business Mr. North had extensive ranch holdings in Crockett and other West Texas counties.






#### SONORA HAS BRIGHT FUTURE

This was one of the most heinous crimes the nation has ever known. The news was flashed all over the world when word was first received of this sad event. Such a crime, one that rocked the nation and surpassed anything that has ever been done. Even Hickman's act was not to be compared to this one.

Texas is noted for criminals. How is the crime wave to be checked? Simply to pass more stringent laws and careful selection of jurors in whose hands the fate of such blood-thirsty criminals rest. England, whose inhabitants run into the millions had only 27 murders in 1926. Why is this? Because the bar and law in England has no sympathy for murderers.

Look at the criminals who were released from the State penitentraries in "Ma" Ferguson's reign of terror. She pardoned and granted parole to over 1500 criminals—men who had everything from bootlegging to cold blood murder. Texas will have to be more careful in giving justice to criminals.






