> Most animals which grow wool, ter or socalled protective covering and an under coat which provides warmth. The develoment of these two coats varies with the climate in which the animals live and it has also been modified greatly under conditions of domestication where protection has been provided and special attenetion has been given to their breeding. The wild goat has two kinds of hair. The outer coat of coarse hairs constitutes the great bulk of covering on these animals. These hairs have a close resemblance to the kempy and coarse fibers of fleece from unimproved Angoras. Careful selection and breeding to improve the fleece of Angora goats have already resulted in a considerable reduction of kempy fibers.

> Of 47 commercial mohair samples examined, of which 35 represented principal sorts, 3 showed entire freedom from kemp. Two of these samples contained fine under fibers, were objectionable from the standpoint of uniformity. Of 27 samples from improved Angora goats 6 were from kemp. Two of these samples, however, had many fibers which were objectionable because of their close resemblance to kemp.

Judging from the quality of the mohair samples from the improved Angoras, says Doctor Hardy, it should be possible through selection and breeding to develop flocks of Angoras whose fleeces are entirely free from kemp and in this manner greatly improve the quality of mohair grown in the United States. 


