J. M. SHANNON, 80. **BURIED IN SAN** ANGELO TUES.

One of the wealthiest among capitalists and stockmen in West Texas, J. M. Shannon, 80, died in San Angelo Monday.

Mr. Shannon settled in West Texas during the early days and engaged in the stock business. He attributed his success to "staying with the herd." At the time of death he had amassed a fortune of several million dollars.

He was president of the Guaranty State Bank of San Angelo, succeeding the late Wm. Schneeman; vice president of the Central National Bank, president of the First State Bank of Big Lake, a director in two other West Texas banks; president of the Western Reserve Life Insurance Company of San Angelo, and was instrumental in its organization.

Deceased was able to be at his office every morning until a few days ago when he became ill and was called by the grim reaper.

He leaves a widow and two nephews to mourn his death.

RAILDOAD MAY BE BUILT SOON TO GULF COAST

By Associated Press.

San Antonic, May 28.-Directors Sold for Harry Jackson, Eldorado, will undertake to effect connection of the Gulf and West Texas railroad between San Antonio and San Angelo themselves, without waiting on the Frisco system to get interested enough to start action, it was announced after a directors' meeting Monday afternoon.

The first thing to be done, it was decided, will be to raise \$1.400.000 participating stock, allotted as follows: San Antonio \$600,000, San Angelo \$250,000, Corpus Christi \$150,-000, and \$400,000 to the territory between San Angelo on the northwest and Corpus Christi on the south.

Little Money Spent

All the quota chairman are diectors of the Gulf and West Texas which was organized last August with \$25,000 paid in capital, of which only \$621.83 has been spent, mostly in trying to get the Frisco interested in the project.
