**CITATION BY PUBLICATION**

(State of Texas)  
 County of Sutton)  
 To the sheriff or any constable of Sutton County, greetings:-  
 You are hereby commanded to summon **JUAN GALINDO**, by making publication of this citation once in each week for four consecutive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your county (which has been continuously published for more than one year in the County of Sutton, with a general circulation) to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Sutton County, to be held at the courthouse thereof in Sonora, Texas, the first Monday in November, A. D. 1928, the same being the 5th day of November A. D. 1928, then and there to answer a petition filed in said court on the 28th day of September, A. D. 1928, in a suit numbered on the docket of said Court No. 598, wherein **CARMEN GALINDO** is plaintiff, and **JUAN GALINDO** is defendant, said petition alleging that plaintiff and defendant were lawfully married in Schleicher County, Texas, on or about June 18, 1924, and plaintiff continued to live with him as man and wife until about the 16th day of May, 1926, when at which time by reason of cruel and harsh treatment she was forced to separate from defendant, and has not lived with him since. That plaintiff had two children by him, to-wit: Osker, a boy, born April 16, 1925, and Aurelia, a girl born August 16, 1926. That during all the time they lived together she conducted herself with propriety and treated her husband with kindness and forbearance; but that defendant failed to provide for plaintiff and treated her with utter disregard. That on or about the 16th day of May, 1926, at or near Miles in Runnels County, Texas, at a time when plaintiff's first child was only 13 months old, and near the time when her second child would be born, defendant left plaintiff and her 13 months old child in destitute circumstances, among strangers, and plaintiff was forced to chop cotton to get money to support herself and child and prepare for her expected second child; that after the birth of her second child, her father came and got her and brought her back to Sonora, Texas, that defendant thereafter returned to Sonora, but plaintiff would not further live with him; that such treatment, as aforesaid, was under circumstances which showed an utter disregard of plaintiff's health, if not her life, and was of such cruel and harsh nature as to render their further living together insupportable and caused plaintiff to permanently quit defendant. That defendant has never contributed to the support of their children, but that plaintiff is now working and supporting them.  
 Plaintiff prays for judgement dissolving marriage contract between her and defendant, and for the care, custody and education of her two children, and for costs, etc.  
**HEREIN FAIL NOT**, but have you before said court on said first day of the next term thereof, this writ, with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.
