**T. A. Kincaid to Work with Expert**

President Sheep and Goat Raisers Association Named as Member Co-operating Committee

College Station, Feb. 20.—G. W. Barnes, beef cattle specialist of the Extension Service, A. M. College of Texas who in his seven years with the Extension Service has become a well-known figure in Texas and Southwestern livestock circles, will engage during the next twelve months periods in work with the Federal Farm Board as co-operative organization expert of the livestock division of the board. Mr. Barnes has been granted a year's leave of absence by the Extension Service for his new duties, being in a way loaned to the Farm Board for the work. His headquarters will remain at the Extension Service here, however.

As co-operative organization expert, Mr. Barnes will serve to build up the contact between the livestock industry and the Federal Farm Board through organization of the Texas livestock marketing association that will become the central marketing agency for cattlemen and sheep and goat men of this state. Much of his time will be given to explaining co-operative plan of the Board as it affects the livestock industry and enlisting members for the Texas organization which is expected to be formed at a meeting at San Angelo in March.

The committee of livestock men named to work out the Texas plan for the industry includes H. L. Kokernot, San Antonio, chairman; D. T. Hobart, Pampa; T. A. Kincaid, Ozona; J. M. West, Houston and Judge E. D. Henry, San Antonio.

ifically to do with the inspection department of the railway commission.

Taking out of class B permits is urged for those who operate between two incorporated cities, or who in in way hire or cause to be hired a commercial vehicle. Ranchers who operate their own trucks from an incorporated city to their ranch are exempt from the provisions of the law. Anyone whose itinerary between place of purchase and ranch includes an incorporated city is not exempt, the inspector warns. Such for instance would be the rancher who truck from San Angelo to his ranch on the other side of Eldorado. — San Angelo Standard.

There are eighty-eight Merit Badges available to first-class Scouts, these badges covering a variety of handicrafts, vocations and hobbies. Through this laboratory of professions, many boys are enabled to receive a glimpse into the possibilities of each subject as a potential life work.

**Wood Carving**

To obtain a Merit Badge for Wood Carving a Scout must:

1. Plan and carve an appropriate design, low relief on some simple object such as book ends, a tray, a pair of bellows, a chest, a screen, a clock case, a letter opener or a box.
2. State the qualities of hard wood and soft wood, and the best woods to be used in woodcarving; name, describe, and explain how to sharpen the different kinds of woodcarving tools; and explain methods of handling the grain of wood in designing.

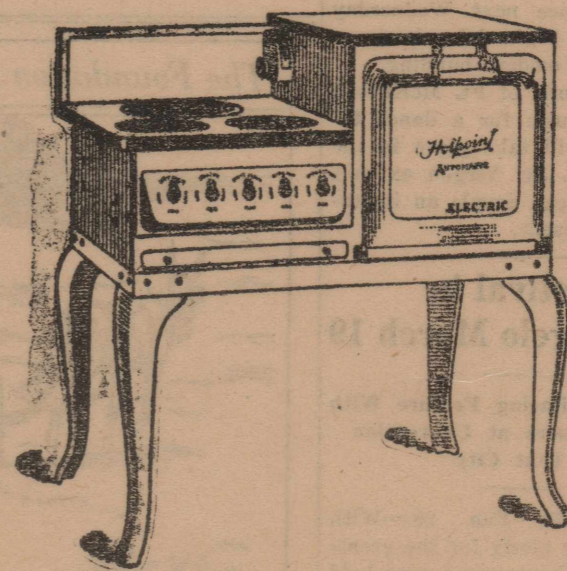

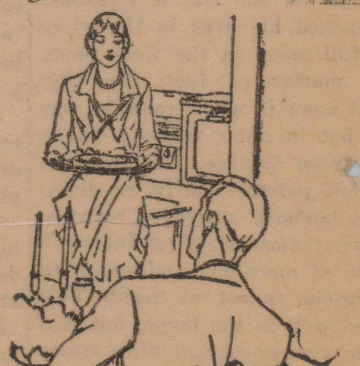
