





We are in receipt of a letter from Judge J. A. Whitten, chairman of the Livestock Sanitary Commission, in which he advises that Sonora, Texas, has been designated as an official sheep dipping station and we are enclosing a copy of a telegraphic permit sent immediately upon receipt of Judge Whitten's letter to W. C. Pendleton of Parowan, Utah, permitting him to ship one car of sheep to Sonora, Texas, with the understanding that they be dipped upon arrival or soon thereafter, at

Sonora. The sheep must of course be dipped under the supervision of an authorized inspector of this Commission and in this instance Mr. H. E. Sharp, our representative, stationed at Eldorado, will supervise the dipping of these sheep and will ask that you please notify Mr. Sharp immediately upon arrival of the sheep at Sonora.







GASOLINE TAX

The present State Highway Commission, which has made by far the greatest record of highway cnostruction and maintenance in the history of the State, has contended for more than two years that this system of requiring the counties to bond themselves biuld State roads cannot be abolished so long as the construction and maintenance of such State highways must depend upon the current revenue of the department. The chairman of the Commission presented this information to the Legislature ieghteen months ago, and recommended that the people be given the opportunity to rote on the question of bonding
