

## Paving O.S.T. to

Designation of a state highway from Sonora to Rocksprings seems definitely assured, with a preliminary survey of the route already ordered by the Texas state highway commission. This assurance was given a Sonora delegation which met with the highway commission in Austin Thursday and Friday of last week.

Definite approval of the paving of the Sonora-Ozona segment of the Old Spanish Trail was also given by the commission. Surveys for the Sutton county portion of this project are complete, with plans yet to be drawn. The Crockett

three to four months before con-Commission Approves tract can be awarded for the Sutton county route.

There is a probability that highway 30, leading from Sonora to Del Rio, may be re-routed through Edwards county, swinging east of the present route and saving the building of parallel routes from Sonora south to Rocksprings from here. The new road would enable building of a highway from here to Rocksprings by developing a stretch of a few miles leading off the proposed new route of highway 30. The Del Rio road is paved to a point 22 miles south of Sonora, and it is at this point that the change in route would be effective. It is thought that in case the route is changed, with a short cut-off to Rocksprings, that highway 41, leading from Rocksprings to intersect highway 30, would be abandoned.



K. Mackey, professor of animal husbandry in charge of sheep and Angora goats, Texas A. & M. College, advised members of the livestock group at the Farmers' Short Course here Monday.

In bringing about lower production costs, more efficient use of both permanent and temporary pastures in order to save on the feed bill was recommended. Attention was called to the importance of controlling parasites and other factors of loss that increase cost of producing lambs for market as well as wool.

Prof. Mackey suggested the slogan, "Grow to Marketable Age and Weight Every Lamb that is Born Alive and Strong," as a good rule to follow in increasing the returns on the individual animal. He recommended earlier lambs and creep feeding in order to get them on the market when prices are usually higher and before hot weather begins. 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



There's no doubt about it-Oklahoma has a governor what is a governor. "Alfalfa Bill" Murray, the state's fiery chief, jumps from one hot spot to another, and in every case he is taking the cause of the people and bucking big business, regardless of consequences.

Murray's campaign for governor was indeed misleading. He posed as a hayseed ignorant of law and all principles of business. He promised to throw a monkey wrench in the educational system of the state, and that did arouse adverse criticism. It turned out later, though, that Mr. Murray knew exactly how to line up the votes, and once in office he became concerned with serving the people to whom he owed an electorial majority.

In recent weeks he has accomplished more than the average governor does in an entire term. He has opened a free bridge between his state and Texas, he has had the nerve to buck the utilities, and offer prison-made ice for 30c a hundred pounds, in competition with their 60c rate. And now he has had the gall (call it by the name you prefer) to shut down all of the oil wells in the state-quite a day's work.

A tribute to Governor Murray is not necessarily a reflection against Givernor Ross Sterling of Texas, nor any other governor. Murray just happens to be a fearless individual whose office carries with it powers not given to the chief executives of other states, and none can deny that he is making the fullest use of those powers.

Following the dance, according to the testimony of the bride's father, Lopez sat about the house until after daylight. Hernan dez then went to sleep, and did not know when Lopez left the house.

According to witnesses, Rodriguez appeared to be very drunk at the time of the murder, but Lopez, apparently, was sober.

The knife used in the stabbing has not been found. Five beer bottles were discovered near the body of Rodriguez, with the five caps showing teeth marks. It was thought from that that none of the three originally doing the drinking had a weapon.





of State Stimson and Secretary of the Treasury Mellon to sit in at the conference of European Ministers in London. They are limited to the discussion of economic and financial phases that may be brought up, but there is a growing feeling that economics and politics are becoming the same thing under a different name. In other words, democratic chieftains see in Hoover's instructions the more or less full adoption of Woodrow Wilson's theories regarding international relations.

Mr. Hoover, his friends assert, has displayed great courage in dropping the "unofficial observer" fiction, by means of which the United States has been represented at former international discussions, and giving Stimson and Mellon full power to commit this country to definite action. Already republicans inimical to him are seizing on his actions as a means of dicrediting him in the eyes of voters but this unfavorable turn is more than made up for by the way he has disramed democratic critics.

The "Chief" displayed in this action the same qualities that enabled him to dominate in private business and raise himself above his fellows, and by his success as head of the Belgian relief committee and later as food administrator during war times in this country. He apparently is construing his powers as president to extend as far as he finds necessary, subject only to those limitations expressly named by the Constitution. It is being freely commented here that Mr. Hoover is showing more initiative than any president has shown in recent times and, in working for the best interests of the country and the world in general, is making himself the logical candidate to succeed himself and carry out the policies he is initiating. \* \* \* \*
