Entire Pool Goes to Corporation at 15c for Adult and 35c for Kid Mohair

Eight cars of mohair left the warehouse of the Sonora Wool and Mohair Company yesterday and today, according to C. H. Evans, manager. The shipment represented the entire fall clip received here. a total of 300,000 pounds of mohair.

The adult mohair goes to Philadelphia, along with about 6,500,000 pounds being loaded out in other Texas shipping centers, while the kid hair goes to Boston, all consigned to National Wool Marketing Corporation and to Draper & Co., selling agents for the national co-op. About 12 per cent of the Sonora total is kid hair.

The Texas pool, formed about six weeks ago at a meeting of the Texas warehouse association in Kerrville, was consigned to the National Wool Marketing Corporation after committees from the group had negotiated a sale for the entire clip, and after three men had conferred with the Farm Board in Washington and with mill men in Fire Department the East.

Passes Ordinance Enforcing Use of Pit Type Toilet

Commission Votes to Sell Toilets to Users, Accepting Rents on Time-Payment Plan

All surface toilets in the city of Sonora must be replaced with the sanitary pit type toilet or else converted into toilets of that type, according to the provisions of an ordinance passed Thursday night by the Sonora city commission. The city voted to sell the toilets now in use, which were installed and are owned by the city, to their individual users, accepting the monthly rental as partial payment on the toilet. The monthly rent was reduced from \$1 to 50c.

The ordinance becomes effective on October 22, and at that time inspection will be made to insure conformity to the design approved by the State Department of Health. Ordinary surface type toilets can be converted into pit toilets with little expense and with unskilled labor, according to the state department of health, which furnished a regulation design for the structures. This design is reproduced in the ordinance, which is carried on page 3 of this issue of The News.



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

Statistics issued by the Texas Fire Insurance Commission reveal the following facts:

The property loss in Texas, insured and uninsured, during 1930 caused by fire was approximately \$20,000,000. The insured property loss in Texas as shown by reports of Stock Fire Insurance Companies doing business in Texas during 1930 was approximately \$17,225,417, and of this amount \$8,503,757 was dwelling house losses.

It has been estimated that fire killed 10,000 in the United States last year, and of this number, 340 were men, women and children of Texas. Also, fire injured twice as many killed and caused untold suffering, unemployment and business failures.

A few more dollars and a little more time spent in exercising caution can eliminate fire danger in great degree, and will save America millions of dollars, and hundreds of precious lives each month.

Don't let Fire Prevention Week stop with the end of the designated period. Make it last throughout the year.



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

1,500,000 Pounds Goes to Mills With Prices Firm

Nearly one and one-half million pounds of western wool were sold during the week ended Sept. 19 by the National Wooi Marketing Corporation for its western grower associations, it is announced by J. B. Wilson, secretary,

Movement of wool from huge Boston storage warehouses of the National continued steadily during the week to mills in face of rather quiet trading and a somewhat unsettled market, apparently brought on by fluctations of the British pound in foreign markets.

Califrnia, Idaho, Texas, New Mexico, Wyoming, Colorado and other western wools were among those sold to New England mills by Draper & Co., selling agents for the National at Boston, where corporation headquarters are located.

Barfield Indictment Quashed By Sutton

Former Upton Sheriff Freed of Murder Plot Charges

Indictments charging murder and conspiracy to commit murder against J. O. (Bud) Barfield, former sheriff of Upton county, and against two of his deputies, were quashed Monday in Rankin by Judge C. R. Sutton in 112th district court. The motion for quashing the indictments was made by defense attorneys on the ground that members of the grandjury returning the indictment were not qualified voters of Upton county.

The charges against Barfield and his two deputies, Clarence Shannon. Lovington, N. M., and Hugh Gillespie, McCamey, grew out of the deaths of J. M. (Blackie) Miller and another man never identified as the pair were allegedly in the act of robbing the First State Bank of Rankin on Jan. 12, 1928, soon after the Texas Bankers Association had posted standing rewards of \$500 each for dead bank robbers. The association refused payment of the rewards in this case.

Whether or not other indictments will be sought against the trio of former officers is matter for con-

the state department, will be in Sonora within the next few days, and he will offer the use of wooden forms to be used in pouring the concrete for the foundations of the pit toilets.

The toilets now in operation, all of which are owned by the city, will be sold to the users on a rent payment plan. All rent paid to date, as well as the original deposit of \$5 will apply on the purchase price of \$30, the cost of the toilets to the

In reducing the rental from \$1 each month to 50c, the commission provided that in instances where 12 months rent had been paid at the higher rate, no rent payment would be required for the coming twelve months, making the cost for the two years exactly \$12, or 50c a month.

If the users prefer, the toilet may be bought outright, and rent payments will cease. Otherwise rents must be paid each month, and at the end of five years the entire purchase price will have been paid in rents and title will go to the user.


