FALL STOCK MOVEMENT BEGINS HERE

Work Started on **Bitterweed Lab at Experiment** Station

Westbrook Gets Contract on Bid of \$12,117-Job to Be Completed in 45 Days

Wednesday saw the beginning of the bitterweed laboratory and new residences to be erected at the Ranch Experiment Station south of Sonora from a fund of \$20,000 appropriated for that purpose by the Texas Legislature.

J. D. Westbrook, San Angelo contractor, was awarded contract for the erection of the building on his bid of \$12,117. He expects to complete the structures within 45 working days. The contract allows 60 working days.

The unit will consist of three concrete buildings, a laboratory to be used in experimenting with the weed, its habits, and to determine means of eradication; and two residences for employees at the station.

The United States Department of Agriculture will send three men to work with the weed as soon as the structures are completed.

Agitation for funds for studying the bitterweed was begun last spring, and after a number of conferences by ranchmen and state and federal agricultural experts, the appropriation from the legislature was secured by Penrose B. The loading pens of the Panhandle and Santa Fe railway in Sonora were the scene of great activity Thursday morning, with virtually every pen occupied, and with a host of railway loaders and rachmen gathered around the pens and chutes.



A combination of the new state tax on cigarettes and the ingenuity of Theodore Ahlborn has put more than 100 unemployed heads of families to work. Now Ahlborn plans to help disabled war veterans.

Ahlborn, a native of Germany, sat a month ago on an Alamo Plaza park bench and wondered where his next meal would come from. His attention was attracted by a girl rolling cigarettes on a hand-rolling machine in a window across the street, and he noticed several unnecessary motions in the operation of the machine designed legally to beat the state tax.

With the design of a new machine swiftly born in his mind, Ahlborn was able to borrow enough money from a stranger, after explaining it unusually well, to make

Road and bridge costruction in Texas increased 100 per cent during the first six months of this year, due to the impetus of the federal emergency loan, the report shows. Contracts totaling \$21,335,-950 were let, during the first half of 1931, as compared with \$14,254,-454 in the corresponding period of 1930.

Road and bridge work furnished employment to 14,450 Texans in 1930, not including those doing clerical and other office work. Texas was one of the few states which had no road bonds or notes outstanding in 1930. Not a single penny, according to its books, out of the total \$47,331,987 spent on Texas roads went to pay interest or principal of indebtedness. State highways were allotted \$21,180,893 of the gasoline tax re-

ceipts, and \$4,625,479 of the motor vehicle fees and similar taxes. This was in addition to the federal aid funds apportioned to Texas.
