FIRE PREVENTION IS WORKING!

The year 1963 was the seventh consecutive one in which fire losses exceeded \$1 billion, according to the National Board of Fire Underwriters.

The growth of this country, the Board says, has of itself contributed to the high level of fire

Since its inception in 1866, the National Board has been at the forefront in fire protection activities.

We are glad to report that some real progress has been made in the fight against fire.

For example, since 1950 there has been an increase of 34,500,000 in the population of this country, 13,750,000 new housing units have been added, and thousands of new mercantile and manufacturing units have been built. The new structures have increased the number of burnable buildings.

However, the burning ratio—the ratio of dollar fire loss to national wealth—has been declining steadily over the years, indicating progress in the never ending fight to prevent fire waste.

As the nation observes Fire Prevention Week

this month-which comes October 4-10-it's a good time for everyone to use care with fire and try to help us stem this needless destruction of

Fire takes its toll in lives. Last year there were 11.800 fire fatalities and tens of thousands more were injured in fires.

We can cut down the national toll in lives and property by keeping our homes free of hazards, throwing out accumulations of old newspapers and combustible trash, keeping our electrical equipment in good repair, and using particular care with matches and smoking which are the cause of one-fourth of all fires.

Are fire prevention efforts worthwhile? Yes, says the National Board. Without fire prevention efforts on the part of all of us, the Board estimates, the annual fire loss in the United States would probably be three times its present size.







Addressed Form For Quarterly Taxes Sent to Employers

District Director of Internal Revenue Ellis Campbell Jr. said this week that employers in the Dallas District should receive through the mail on or about September 30, pre-addressed Forms 941, "Employers Quarterly Federal Tax Return" for use in reporting income taxes withheld and social security taxes for the calendar quarter ending

Campbell pointed out that the use of these pre - addressed forms, which also carry the correct employer identification number, will insure the prompt and proper credit to taxpayer accounts when these quarterly returns are processed through the ADP system at the regional service center. He said blank forms are available in local IRS offices for new filers and urged that those employers who have been assigned identification numbers make sure the number entered on the tax form is cor-

Employers without identification numbers should attach application Form SS-4 to the return for a number when filing, Campbell said.






May Be Welcoming

Farmers and ranchers may studied at Century College of the long-sought heavy rains, Medical Technology, De Paul observes the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

> In a progress report on the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program, the Service says, "Screwworm flies may also be welcoming the moisture. Confined to the areas along water courses and around stock tanks during most of the summer, the insects generally take off crosscountry during the fall season when every chuck hole and creek contains water. This brings about the annual fall increase in screwworm infestation that eradication officials warned about."

> The report further states that no cases have been reported in Texas for more than seven weeks, leading officials to feel that no screwworms exist in the state to start a buildup. However, the rains have also been prevalent in northern Mexico, and migration of insects from that country into the U.S. presents a danger.

No buildup of infestations has been observed in the Mexican states adjoining Texas, although the states below Arizona have experienced considerable probems with screwworms.
