

## Amendments Need Thoughtful Consideration

"Our Constitution is our fundamental law, protecting the rights of citizens and limiting and defining legislative, executive and judicial authority," the Texas Industrial Conference reminds us.

In less than two weeks we, as voters, will be considering three proposed changes in our Texas Constitution.

An amendment must first be submitted to the Legislature at a regular session, and it must be approved by a two-thirds vote of the membership in the House and in the Senate in order to be placed on the ballot for a vote by the electorate of the State.

### A Fund For Posterity

Proposition One on the November 3 ballot would amend the Texas Constitution to eliminate the authority to transfer up to one per cent of the permanent school fund to help pay

current school costs. The constitutional convention of 1875 conceived of the Permanent School Fund as a trust fund which would be created out of public lands. The Available School Fund was to receive the interest and earnings off the capital in the permanent fund and was to be the

source of state aid to our public free schools. During the 1880's more money was needed for the schools, and a constitutional amendment was adopted in 1891 authorizing the Legislature to transfer money from the Permanent School Fund to the Available School Fund. That is the provision which Proposition One would repeal.
