### Youth To Solicit 'Treats' For Needy For CROP Program


Texas young people of various working together in their communities will be among CROP workers calling from door to door in their communities on Halloween seeking "treats" for needy people abroad.

In 1948, President Truman carried the states of California and Ohio by a margin of close to one vote per precinct. Ohio was won by only 7,017 votes in 9,247 precincts; California by 17,865 votes in 16,802 precincts.

In 1960 we learned how close an election can be. John F. Kennedy's plurality over Richard M. Nixon was only 112,803, and there were 68,-833,241 total votes cast. A shift of 1,838 votes in just two states (Illinois and Missouri) would have reduced Kennedy's electoral vote by 40, thus denying him a majority in the electoral

# College Students Travel and Study On Unusual Campus

Terry and Lowell Powers have enrolled for the spring semester in a university with a campus 482 feet long with a gross tonage of 12,574. They are the sons of Raymond Barker, brother of Bill and Granville Barker and a former Sonora resident.

The unusual educational institution is the University of the Seven Seas, a former passenger liner which has been fitted with classrooms and a library. Lowell and Terry, both students now at Arizona State University, have received scholarships for the four months of study and travel.

The University of the Seven Seas "travels around the world," explains its catalogue. It "visits mearly 20 countries . . . comes into contact with a large area of the earth and its peoples. It combines classroom instruction under competent faculty with organized educational tours and other shore experiences in portsof-call."

Classes meet six days a week at sea. For example, a world history course requires 48 hours of classroom instruction, plus on-the-scene lectures at the Acropolis in Athens, the Forum in Rome, the wonders of the Nile, and other historical sites. The students receive college credit for their work.

A wide variety of subjects including architecture, journalism, philosophy, and geology are offered.

Terry and Lowell are slated to sail from San Diego February 11. Among ports of call scheduled are Honolulu, Manila, Capetown, Buenos Aires, Rio De Janeiro, and San Juan.

An Open letter to Barry Goldwater From State Senator Walter Richter, Gonzales, Texas Dear Mr. Goldwater:

The other day when you suggested that you would be willing to use some phrase other than that shop-worn cliche of "soft on communism" in referring to our President, someone in the audience suggested the word "treason" and you replied "That's

I guess that's when the deep resentment I have been feeling about the calculated campaign of vilification against our President turned into pure nausea. I stayed awake until 2: a.m. feeling sick, and thinking about what you were doing.

You must have finally felt a touch of nausea yourself, when, on the next day, you cancelled the "smut" film your campaign crew had prepared for nationwide showing. I guess I am pleased to learn that you do have a limit.

In your heart, Mr. Goldwater, you know that neither President Johnson nor his administration is in any way guilty of treason, and that this, even for campaign tactics, is something of a record "low."

This brings me to the point of this letter, "morality", an issue which you, sir, have chosen to inject into this campaign. It is an issue which only one of tremendous personal integrity can effectively pursue; and although you have tried mightily to project a posture of piety, I want to point out that you have not been very convincing.

You have cried out against government spending and waste, and then you have rattled the saber, even saying that nuclear war was inevitable, an attitude which has to call for a tremendously expensive military force.

Even more remarkably, you have spoken glibly of ending the draft.

Is this your idea of integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

You have cried out against massive Federal projects only to support them when they will be located in and benefit your home state.

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

You have cried out in support of the exercise of local responsibilities as opposed to Federal "interference," and then you suggest that it is the Federal responsibility to maintain law and order in our local communities.

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

You have had so much to say about crime and lawlessness in many United States cities, notably Washington, D. C., and yet your own hometown in your own home state turns up the fourth most crime-ridden city in the whole country.

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

You have cried out against riots and lawlessness time and again, and yet your voting record in the Senate reveals a consistent vote against programs designed to correct the causes of crime.

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

You've cried out bitterly against immorality in high places, and yet you have not uttered one word in condemnation of your running mate, who, as a congressman, fought for legislation to benefit an organization which had been paying him \$7,500 annually for many years.

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

In three speeches in January, you came out in favor of voluntary Social Security, something which makes one wonder about your wisdom, because this can only lead to bankruptcy of the system. Significant, however, is that in February in New Hampshire, you had the audacity to say. "I don't know where this voluntary business crept in."

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

When asked on a TV program in 1963 if, as President, you would favor getting out of the United Nations, you answered, "I would. At this point, having seen what the United Nations cannot do, I would have to suggest it." In June of this year, you said, "I've never advocated withdrawing from the United Nations." Your first remarks are recorded on tape.

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

First you said, "I don't want to hit the moon—I want to lob one into the men's room in the Kremlin and make sure I hit it." Later you said, "It's absolutely essential that we get a man on the moon for military reasons if for no other."

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

You once said that one Eisenhower in a generation was all the nation could survive. Had you erased that feeling from your heart when you were seeking Ike's support? How about that interview with the General which you had taped for campaign purposes, and then edited out several Eisenhower statements because they did not suit your position?

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

As you know in your heart, Mr. Goldwater, these are only a few of your inconsistencies, and you must know that they are very unbecoming to a man who wants to move into the White House by smearing its present occupant on the issue of morality.

What about Lyndon Johnson? He's not perfect and has never claimed to be so. On the other hand, and you must know this in your heart, he is a great leader, and was selected by a majority of the most exclusive club in the world, the United States Senate—your club—as their leader.

I have read the "hate" stuff and I have yet to find a serious charge that is supported by evidence which would stand up in court. It is 98.9% pure smut—based on rumors, half-truths, inuendoes and pure lies.

Bobby Baker and Walter Jenkins? Can a man be held responsible for the actions of all the individuals whom he has associated with in 32 years of government service? Let us not forget that even President Eisenhower could not escape this sort of experience. Neither, for that matter, could Jesus Christ.

So please, Mr. Goldwater, out of common decency and so that your campaign memories won't come back to haunt you in the years ahead, stick to your more noble campaign issues. Like taking the government out of agriculture, education, automation, transportation, pollution of streams, the waste of national resources. Like repudiating the foreign policies of Truman, Eisenhower, Kennedy and Johnson, and leading the nation on a massive crusade to destroy Communism all over the world, even though it takes us to the brink time and again.

One closing thought—offered by my wife: Might it not encourage lawlessness in our land when one of the leading presidential candidates constantly belittles and demeans our Judiciary and our Executive branches of government—even to the extent of charging treason?

Oh yes, thank you for providing the voters of our nation with a choice. You have made it an awfully, awfully easy one.

#### **Low Cost Protein and Energy Are Keys To Supplemental Feeding, Says Expert**

A mixture of different sources of vegetable protein has little to offer since cattle make their own amino acids.

Before purchasing a supplemental protein feed, note the price per 100 pounds, percentage of crude protein supplied by the oil seed protein meals, percentage of equivalent protein from non-protein nitrogen, crude fat and crude fiber content. Higher fiber content feeds should be cheaper.

A protein suplement is bought primarily for its protein, Thompson points out. Cost of this protein may be determined on a per pound basis by dividing the price per 100 pounds by the percent protein. Thus, range cubes with 20 percent crude protein at \$3 per 100 pounds would supply crude protein at a cost of 15 cents per pound.

Herd protein supplemental feeding should be based at .8 pound of digestible protein daily per cow. Therefore, it would take four pounds of a 20 per cent product such as range cubes to satisfy this requirement.

Of course, methods of feeding and individual preferences determine the form of supplement to be used-meal, cakes, cubes, crumbles or pellets. Selflimiting mixtures of protein mineral blocks, Urea-molasses or other liquid supplements, and combinations of salt and cottonseed meal may affect savings in labor and provide more even herd consumption. However, the unit cost of protein may be high, Thompson indicates.

Mixtures of salt and cottonseed meal have had extensive use, the percentage of salt vary ing from 15 to 50 per cent of the mixture. Ground sorgum grain or ground ear corn is often mixed with salt and cottonseed meal and fed free choice. Common mixtures contain about onethird of each. Water should always be available nearby when these amounts of salt are fed.

Selection of a supplement may be influenced by the amount and quality of roughages available. Cattle performance is directly related to forage quality and quantity, explains Thompson. Where forage is limited, a feed including both protein meal and grain may be more useful than a straight protein supplement.

A Vitamin A fortified supplement should be fed where production is likely to be affected by adding Vitamin A de-

## Goldwater represents more clearly the basic direction we want this country to go!

In this election campaign Farm Journal has hewed to its policy of giving both sides equal treatment in our news columns and has stated its own position only on this page. We believe any publication worth its salt has an obligation to the public to do both things.

Our own position may not be yours. Every man to his own opinion. We have never claimed to be speaking for "all farmers." They don't delegate anybody to do that, thank goodness. Nor do they garee among themselves.

In this concluding statement on the election we'd like to repeat something we said two months ago:

"We will be choosing between two men. But more importantly we will be choosing between what they champion. We may or may not like everything about the man we vote for. We may or may not agree with everything he says. But which man represents more clearly the basic direction we want this country to go? That is the big question. Let us never lose sight of it."

Will we lose sight of it in the face of the greatest character smear in modern times? Mr. Goldwater is being grossly libeled, his position falsified.

In 1960 Mr. Kennedy frightened the wits out of a good many people with claims about a "missile gap" which supposedly had us in danger of being obliterated by a Russian atom bomb at any moment. It turned out (after election) to be phony. The scares of this year are, in our opinion, just as phony.

Both candidates want peace— who doesn't? Both are responsible. Neither favors annihilation. Both have been in a war, Mr. Goldwater in Southeast Asia. He has two sons of military age now.

Both candidates have compassion for the poor and have proved it in private life. Their only difference is in how to tackle the problem.

Both want good times to continue. Don't we all? But

what best assures them? Control by government or control by citizens of their own affairs?

We agree with Mr. Goldwater that the way to "The Great Society" is not through the Welfare State, toward which we are headed, but through individual enterprise left



free to operate. Most of us agree that those who can't take care of themselves must be taken care of, with compassion. But this Administration makes more people dependent on government for a part of their livelihood every day. It steadily usurps more of the functions of private business. It steadily reaches for more power, a little more today, a little more tomorrow. It seems to believe that an all-wise centrally-controlled government in Washington can solve our problems better than we can.

We agree with Mr. Goldwater, too, in choosing principle over expediency. For us the attitude of the Johnson administration is too much "Peace at any price" with any substantial group of voters at home or any government abroad, Cuba included.

On farm policy we agree in general with Mr. Goldwater's position, and we believe most farmers will if they understand it. He is not for "abolishing the farm program and you along with it," as Mr. Johnson and Mr. Humphrey have been proclaming. True, he has been against compulsory controls, high rigid support prices, CCC dumping of grains to depress grain prices and club farmers into government programs, and making the Secretary of Agriculture all powerful. Most farmers feel the same way.

But he is for voluntary programs, for support prices at stabilization levels, for a land retirement program, for adequate farm credit, for co-ops.

We agree with the Republican position on reapportioning legislative districts. Mr. Goldwater wants to protect the rural minority. The Democrats are courting the big cities. You'll note that Mr. Johnson ducked the question in the Farm Journal last month.

Will farmers fall for the phony scares about Mr. Goldwater, or will they keep their eye on these big issues? On that the outcome of the election, at least in the farm country, will largely depend.


