But next time you're down in the dumps, remember: It might be depreciable. That's not so silly as it sounds when you look at a recent Tax Court decision written up by Prentice-Hall. While it may be axiomatic that you can't depreciate land, the Tax Court, in effect, permitted a taxpayer to do just that.

#### **HUNTING IN AMERICA**

The outdoors lies deep in American tradition. It has had a great impact upon our Nation's character and on those who made its history. When an American looks for the meaning of his past, he seeks it not in ancient ruins but on a mountain, in a forest, by a river, or at the edge of the sea. The outdoors is a thing of the heart and of the senses-sight, sound, smell, taste, touch. Conservation and sportsmanship are personal things-growing from the conscience, from the soul. That is why hunting is cherished by Americans as a legacy to be shared by sportsmen today, but to be conserved for generations yet unborn.

When our forefathers established our government, it was decreed that wild game belongs to the States in their sovereign capacity for the use and enjoyment of all the people. At the same time, it was decreed that the landowner has the right to determine who may come upon his land to hunt the game. While pressures were light, there was no critical conflict between public ownership of game and private control over its harvest. As the population has increased, however, trespass laws have become more and more

To allow remaining blood to drain from the body cavity, hang the deer by the head or antlers from a nearby tree for about 20 minutes. If no tree is near, turn the deer upside down on a clean place to let it drain, advises

To remove the skin, cut down the inside of each leg to the deer's middle. Then cut the skin all the way around the neck, grasp with both hands at the back of the head and pull down. Usually the skin will come off down to the front legs. Use a knife to work the skin off the legs and other areas where it sticks tightly to the meat.

If the specimen is to be mounted, do not make any cuts in the skin around the neck or head but rather cut around the shoulders when removing the skin. Allow the skin to remain intact with the head, says Klussmann, and salt or freeze until delivered to the taxidermist.

Back at camp, hang the carcass in a tree by the hind legs for four or five hours. This will allow all the tiny blood vessels to drain. Wrap the carcass in a sheet, cheese cloth or sack made for this purpose, and always remember to keep the carcass in

After it has cooled, cut the carcass in half or quarters and wrap to take home. It is wise to keep the hide, head, antlers, legs and tag until the meat is placed in a freezer or commercial locker, advises Klussmann.





#### **Prosperity and Sales of Automobiles** Are Interlinked in American Economy By S. S. Talbert, Ph.D.

Prosperity and automotive sales are so closely linked in America that it is difficult to tell which comes first.

This year, it seems that automobile manufacturers are working on the theory that sales of new models can be controlled by advertising. Never before has such faith been shown in the promotional efforts of the major companies.

The advertising introducing the 1965 autos has never been equalled in volume. However, the methods have been proven. More than ever the printed page is being used to illustrate new models. Again national companies are putting increased emphasis on ad-

Ten years ago when some automotive firms experimented with the concentration of advertising in metropolitan media a drastic decline in sales followed. Near-disaster taught the industry that advertising could not be divorced from the local dealer. A trend back to local newspaper advertising followed.

One company which introduced new models in more than three thousand newspapers, covering the communities of all its local dealers, was once a chief exponent of centralized advertising.

A company official explained that no other medium could show the "exciting new styling of 1965" to so many people so effectively as the local newspaper. In this respect, the selling of automobiles is no different from other retail selling. And in either case prosperity in the local community may be created through newspaper





### Hunters Reminded To Observe Laws

Sobering reminders of trouble with guns afield is reflected in the monthly arrest report of the Parks and Wildlife Department, according to J. B. Phillips, coordinator of law enforcement.

He noted that 12 arrests were made for night hunting, 25 for hunting from an automobile, 11 for hunting in closed season, 9 for exceeding the bag limit on doves, 4 for using an unplugged gun, and 4 for possession of wild doe deer.

Thirty-one cases were filed for lacking a hunting license but fishing licenses cases dropped from 386 on the preceding period to 173 for last month.

Phillips advised hunters to check on hunting hours, hunting places, dates for hunting different species and daily bag and seasonal limits.

He said waterfowl hunters should heed the new Federal and State regulation requiring that one feathered wing be left on each duck or goose. The same rule applies to mourning doves and other migratory game.

Phillips said one chronic cause for violations is shooting too early or too late. Unless otherwise specified, he said, the big game daily shooting hours are from half an hour before sunrise to one half hour after sunset and the waterfowl hours are sunrise to sunset.

#### Clean Birds Well Before Freezing, Official Advises

"If birds have not been thoroughly cleaned prior to freezing, they should not be used for human food," is the advice given recently by Dr. E. H. Dustman concerning waterfowl and other game birds.

"Many birds carry bacteria of the genus Salmonella in their intestinal tract and freezing and thawing of these bacteria would allow release of the endotoxin which they produce," states the director of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service Research Center in Maryland.

"This endotoxin is heat-stable and if ingested will cause a severe food poisoning," he adds. "Birds frozen while still containing the internal organs, particularly the intestinal tract, should not be used for food."






