Wool Warehouse Turns Into Tropical Island


Decorating committees of the Fling Ding Club are working this week to turn the Sonora Wool and Mohair Company warehouse into a tropical island.

Girl Scout Week 1965, March 7-13, has as its theme, "A Promise in Action."

Actually the promise has been very much in action and in evidence for 53 years. It was March 12, 1912, in Savannah, Georgia, when a group of girls led by Juliette Gordon Low formed the first Girl Scout troop in the United States and set the pattern for more than 20 million others by making the Girl Scout Promise: "On my honor, I will try: to do my duty to God and my country, to help other people at all times, to obey the Girl Scout Laws.'

It's interesting to note that Girl Scout experience refutes those critics who say that the modern girl is losing her taste for domesticity. In the past year, nearly one million Scouts-Juniors and Cadettes-chose to work on badges for demonstrated skills in homemaking. The largest number of Juniors-ages 9, 10, and 11picked the "Cook" badge out of 47 badges offered in a wide variety of subjects. The Cadettes-12, 13, and 14 years old-can choose from some 60 badges, but more "Hostess" badges were earned than any other.



Does your child write logical. well supported thoughts which are interesting to a reader? Does he know what a sentence is, and does he write in complete sentences, avoiding two sentences punctuated as one? Does he spell his words correctly? Does he make his subjects and verbs agree in number and person? Does he make his pronouns agree with their antecedents in number. person, and gender? Does he keep his discussion in the same tense, without shifting back and forth from one tense to another? Does he place his modifying words, phrases, and clauses beside the words they modify? Does he write a clear, neat, legible manuscript? Does he proofread his papers before he submits them to his teacher for a grade? Does he give credit to the author of ideas that he has borrowed? Does he "stick to the subject" on which he is writing? Does he understand thoroughly what his assignment is? And finally, does he submit his work to his teacher when it is due?

Writing consists of about as much perspiration as it does inspiration, and a parent can do his part to see that students do their parts of the perspiration.
