Uvalde, Texas April 13, 1965

To The Citizenship of Sutton County:

The year 1965 is the official birthday, 75th, of the County of Sutton and the City of Sonora. This is the only Diamond Anniversary we will ever have and by all means it should be observed, celebrated, honoring the pioneer citizen who came to this area and remained to raise their families and to make of this wilderness the "Stock-

A committee has been at work on this project and has voted not to employ a professional promoter but rather to put on a homespun celebration, featuring Western-style entertainment and programs depicting Sutton County life in the early days. I will repeat, it would be unthinkable for Sonora and Sutton County citizens not to celebrate properly this occasion.


