

Letter To Sutton County Residents

Uvalde, Texas
April 13, 1965

To The Citizenship of Sutton County:

The year 1965 is the official birthday, 75th, of the County of Sutton and the City of Sonora. This is the only Diamond Anniversary we will ever have and by all means it should be observed, celebrated, honoring the pioneer citizen who came to this area and remained to raise their families and to make of this wilderness the "Stockman's Paradise."

A committee has been at work on this project and has voted not to employ a professional promoter but rather to put on a homespun celebration, featuring Western-style entertainment and programs depicting Sutton County life in the early days. I will repeat, it would be unthinkable for Sonora and Sutton County citizens not to celebrate properly this occasion.

In this connection, two very foolish things have happened this week. First, the most ridiculous, the Committee asked me to be general chairman for this important event and the other being that I didn't say no. A week ago the committee called me by phone saying that my failure to accept this appointment might jeopardize the entire project as they had failed to find anyone who was able to give the time and attention necessary from the general chairmanship, and they felt that the general chairman should be one who knew the history of the county and the oldtimers, themselves.

Bill Whitehead has been kind enough to offer his assistance as co-chairman.

Now the die has been cast and there is a job awaiting every man and woman in the county. It will be your celebration and one you will put on. Your suggestions will be most welcome and your cooperation will measure the success of the project. This is the occasion to invite back home all former citizens, all former students, teachers and to invite all our neighbors to come and celebrate with us, the 75th Anniversary, which is in honor of our pioneer settlers of this county, those passed on and those living among us.

It is an honor and a privilege to be able to work with you on this important assignment, and it can be a wonderful success and one with much satisfaction to all, so, lets get the show on the road.

Diamond Jubilee Set for August

Plans for a live-wire diamond jubilee to celebrate the 75th anniversary of Sutton County's founding got a thrust forward Monday when H. V. (Buzzie) Stokes agreed to be the organization's general chairman.

Saturday, August 21, was chosen for the climax of the celebration, but interest will be spurred earlier in the week with special events leading up to the final day's homecoming, parade, barbecue, historical presentation and street dance.

Stokes explained that the celebration should be the biggest one ever to hit Sonora, second only to the one Sonorans might stage 25 years from now. Stokes, now of Uvalde, was considered the most able person to head the celebration because of his experience in heading successful promotions while he was manager of Sonora's Chamber of Commerce. Bill Whitehead will serve as co-chairman.

Downtown sideliights and concessions under consideration during the week of the celebration include hold-ups, shoot-outs, medicine shows, and rain makers. A beard growing contest and woman's authentic costume contest will be held with men not participating in the contest being required to have a shaving permit.

Purpose of the celebration, as outlined by the Rev. George Stewart, president of the Diamond Jubilee, is to have fun through friendships past, present and future, and to remember

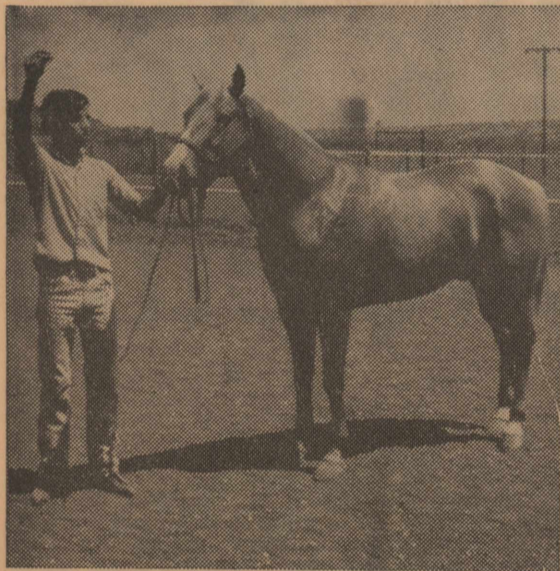
our heritage, celebrate our beginnings, and to point us to a prosperous and effective future. A budget of \$4,000 has been set for the celebration, most of which will come from the sale of stock to be issued in \$100, \$50, \$25, \$10, \$5, and \$1 denominations.

Invitations will be available to send to friends, relatives, and former residents and plans call for inviting dignitaries including the governor to attend the celebration.

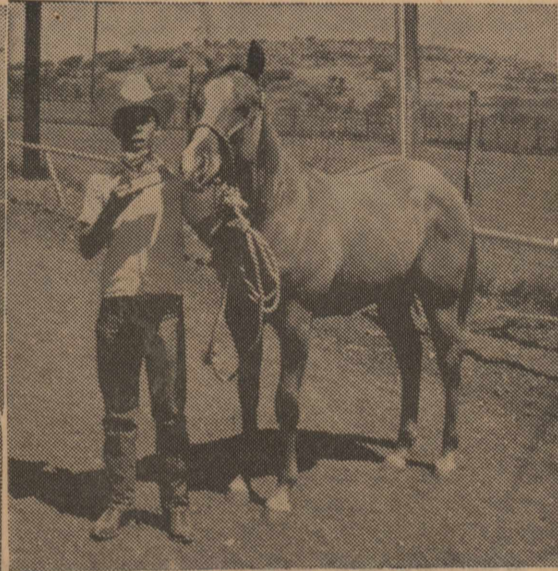

The executive committee will meet in Uvalde Wednesday with Stokes to discuss plans for the celebration and appoint committee heads.

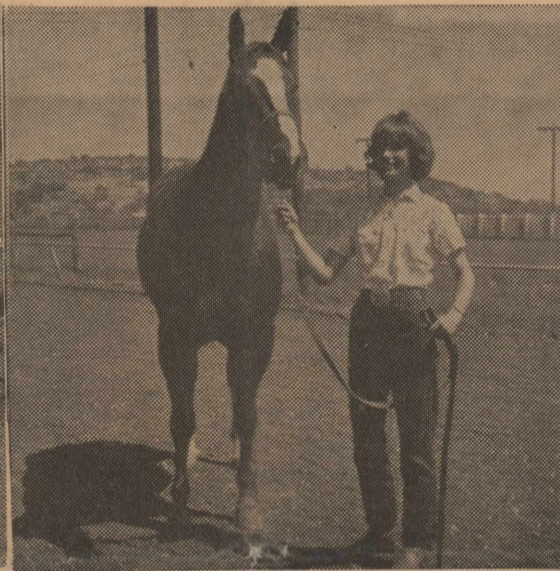

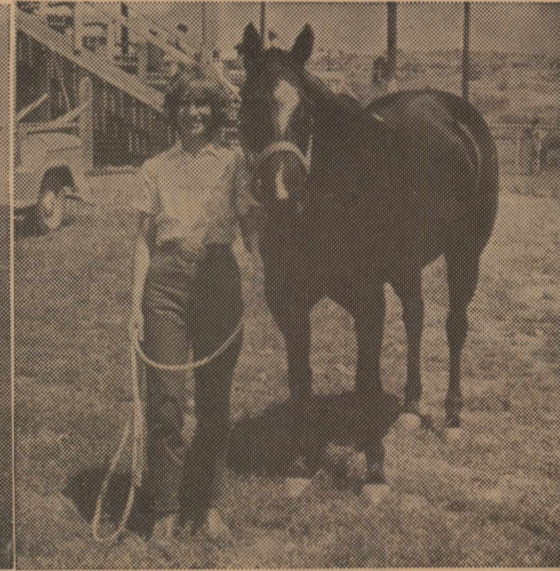
GRAND CHAMPION STALLION of the Junior Quarter Horse Show held here Saturday was Golden Raffles shown by Jerry Shurley



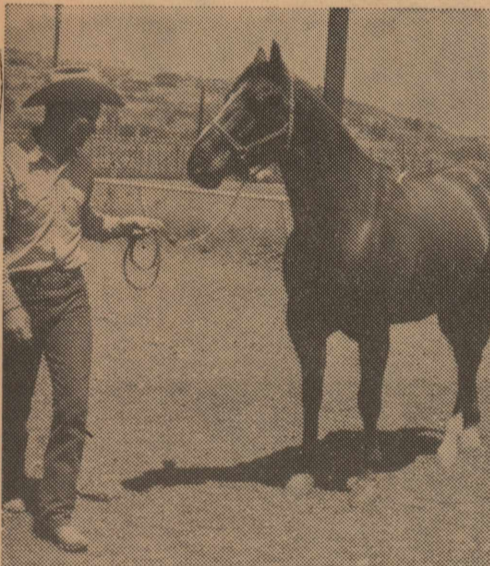
LEE BLOODWORTH shows the unnamed horse which was judged reserve champion stallion of the quarter horse show here.



LITTLE DANDY BEE shown by Debbie Galbreath was the grand champion mare of the quarter horse show here.



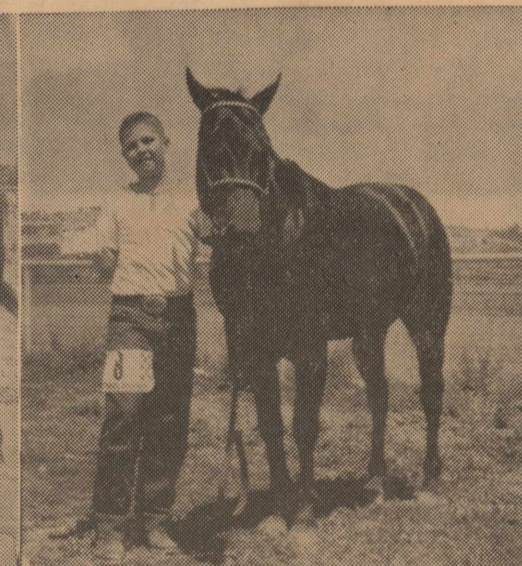
DEBBIE GALBREATH also showed the reserve champion mare, Glamor Play, in Saturday's horse show.

66 Horses Eligible For \$20,000 Futurity

With ten days left before the trials of the West Texas Quarter Horse Futurity some 66 horses remained eligible for the race which tempts horsemen with an estimated purse of \$20,000.

Trials to select horses for the ten berths in the 330-yard futurity will be held April 24, the first day of the two weekends of racing. The \$20,000 race will be run Friday May 1.

Four Sutton County horses are eligible for the race: Barbravo, Work of Art, and Raffleene Reed, all belonging to James Hunt, and Raffles Shurley, owned by Jerry Shurley.

Barbravo and Raffles Shurley are also eligible for the 220-yard futurity which will be run May 2.

Board Accepts Resignation of Mrs. Love

The resignation of Mrs. Tommy Love, junior high science teacher, was accepted with regret by the Board of Trustees of the

Sonora Independent School District at the meeting Monday in the school central administration office. The board passed a resolution commending her effective teaching job this year.

The results of the School Board election held April 3 were canvassed, and Armer Earwood, Gene Shurley, and Mrs. Vestel Askew were declared elected to the board and received the oath of office. Earwood was re-elected board president, and Mrs. Askew was re-elected secretary.

In other business the group approved the purchase of a new bus for the Fort McKavett route, and approved new contracts for teachers in the system. Shurley was appointed to represent the board at a district school board workshop in San Angelo April 15.

A request by Thomas Y. Pickett Company that a board of equalization on tax matters be held on June 11 at 2 p.m. was approved.

The final portion of the meeting was held with the Citizens Survey Committee, a group appointed by Earwood several weeks ago to study the school plant facilities. The committee submitted its report to the board.

Interest seems to be running pretty high, owners say, as Sonora Livestock Exchange prepares for its first special sale.

The special goat sale has been planned for Friday, April 23, with Odus Wittenburg as auctioneer. Consignments, particularly good quality mutton goats, are wanted.

Lunch will be available. The sale is being advertised in some 20 newspapers throughout the goat raising area.

Pens now are being painted, and shearing pens are being completed. The company also is building sheds to protect wool and store hay.

Unit Distributes Cancer Leaflets

The leaflet poses four questions about cancer and answers them by telling current advances in the fight against the disease, the symptoms that may mean cancer, protection available against cancer, and progress against leukemia.

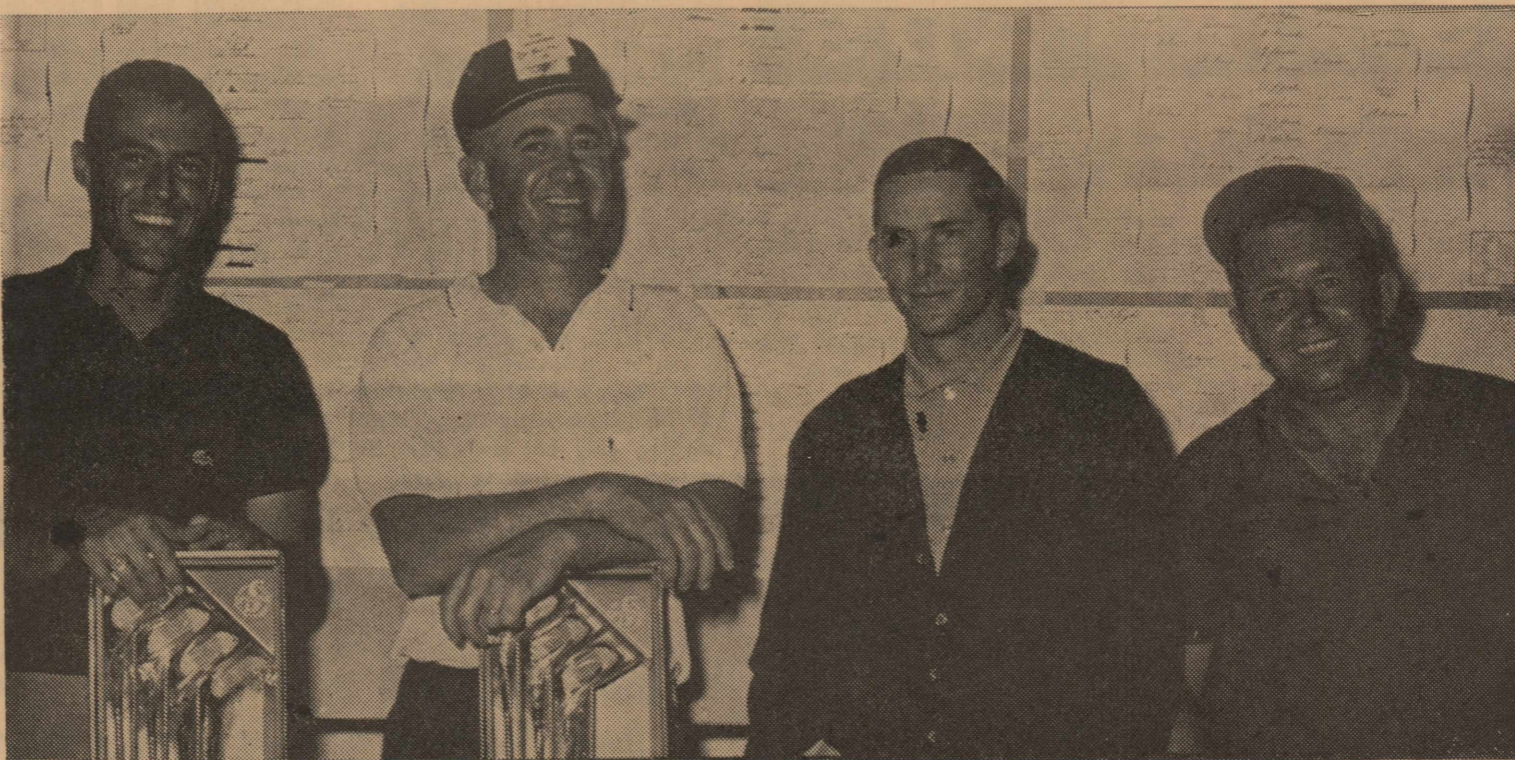

Bob Teaff, owner of Teaff Oil Company and part owner of the Caverns, says that Friday night he traded a tire for the bear, which was destined to be killed.

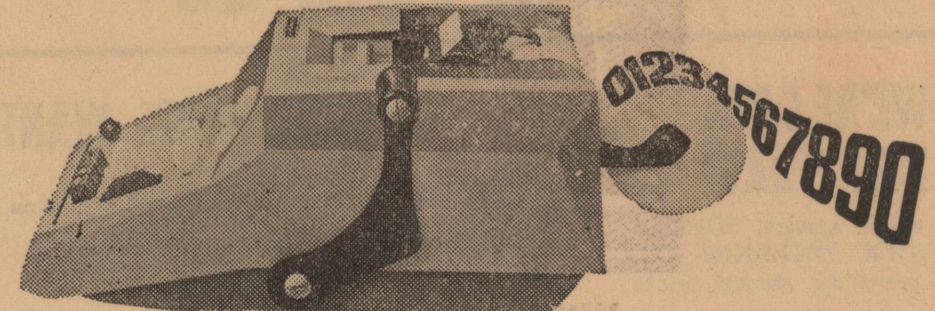
The bear, a gentle animal, will live at the zoo at the Caverns in a pen which Teaff is constructing now.

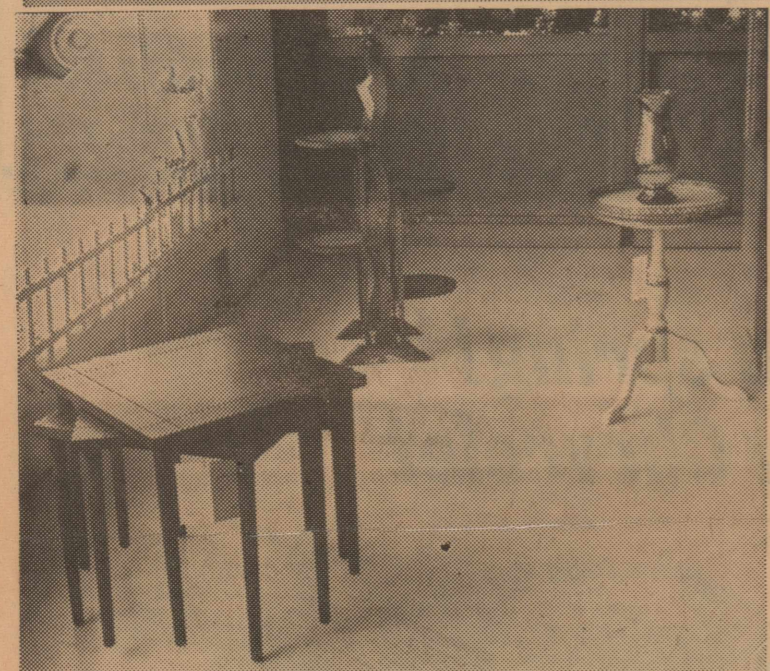

Opening lead: king of diamonds. West's king held, so he returned the queen of diamonds, which was trumped in the closed hand. South then started to clear trumps, but when East showed out on the second lead, was forced to try a finesse for the king of spades. When South found the king in West's hand, he then cleared trumps, took five heart tricks and finessed the king of spades again to make six.
 Comment: This hand would play either six hearts or six clubs. Since South was reluctant to go for slam, North could have encouraged him again.

Good Spring Seen for Mesquite Control

A good rain or two in April or early May should make this one of the most favorable springs for mesquite control in many years.

With the good winter moisture mesquites are expected to put on a heavy leaf crop. Abundant leaves are considered necessary to transport the hormone spray killer into the stems and roots of the tree.

Mesquite should be sprayed from 40 to 90 days after the first spring leaves appear. The optimum time is usually late May or early June.

Although root kills of mesquite in the Edwards Plateau soil conservation district have been generally low—from 5 to 30 percent—control by aerial spraying is usually considered the most practical method available for heavy stands. When sprayed at the right time, top kills have averaged over 90 percent. This good top kill reduces the tree competition for moisture, and will offer control for 4 to 7 years before another treatment is necessary.

The cost of aerial spraying is about \$2.50 to \$3 per acre. Since this gives control for a five-year or longer period the cost per acre per year is not prohibitive. Individual tree treatments, such as basal spray or grubbing, give a better kill but are much more expensive on thick stands.

Ranchmen may receive up to \$1.50 per acre cost share assistance for aerial spraying mesquite from the Sutton County ASCS program, provided that the area can be rested for three months following the brush control.

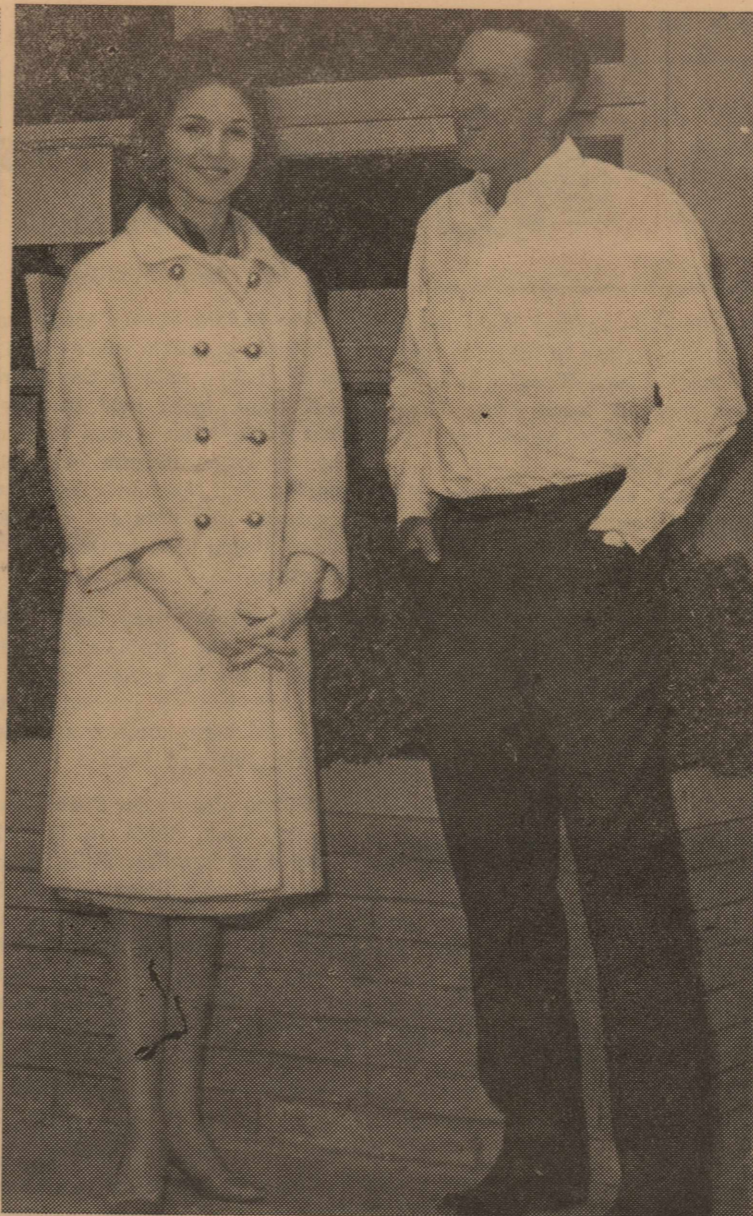

Bloodworth has been active in dozens of communities in dozens of ways. At one time he traveled the country as an evangelistic singer, but he stopped that to organize the Edinburg Chamber of Commerce in 1926.

His life-time associates claim

that the Bloodworths organize a new church wherever they go. This was true at Bosque Farms, New Mexico, where the couple reside. They were instrumental in the organization of the Valencia Community Methodist Church. Perhaps church organizing is an inheritable trait, for Bloodworth is said to have followed in his father's steps. His father was a Methodist circuit rider in Texas. Bloodworth has been in the public eye throughout his long career. He has been Democratic candidate for the governorship of New Mexico, provost marshal of New Mexico, founder-editor of the Ruidoso News, manager of the Albuquerque Chamber of Commerce, and executive secretary of El Paso Chamber of Commerce.

His part in organizing affiliated chamber of commerce organizations proved he could be an Indian as well as an Indian chief. Credit was also rightly won by him for helping with the successful celebration of Albuquerque's 250th anniversary in 1959.

Bloodworth and his wife, who is active socially, have tried many times "not to get involved" but they have never succeeded. They just never have been able to turn down a project that was in need of their service.

He recalled that when he and his wife returned to Ruidoso in the mid-forties, it took only 90 days before she was elected president of the P-TA and he was elected president of the Chamber of Commerce.

Although they have tried to retire before and failed, this time they intend to stay retired. They plan to make Bosque Farms their permanent residence, although they intend to spend more time at their summer home in Ruidoso, and with their four

children, 10 grandchildren, and four great grandchildren.

The Bloodworths hope to visit in Sonora during the latter part of April.
