
In the parade and downtown celebration we do need some specialty acts, acts in which local characters make fools of themselves. This always goes over big and we do have the characters.



> Last year the average party consisted of three persons. Average cost per day per person was \$7.97, while the average cost per party was \$23.91. Expenditures per person were up 12 cents per day from 1963.

> The Texas Highway Department has long recognized the importance of the travel industry to the State's economey. Through its Travel and Information Division it strives to bring visitors to Texas in ever-increasing numbers by publicizing the State's attractions and providing information and descriptive literature to prospective visitors. Last year the Department serviced 704,000 inquiries for the traveling public.

> Eight Travel Information Bureaus are operated by the Department at key point-of-entry locations and in the rotunda of the State Capitol in Austin. These information centers played host to 492,000 visitors last year, of which 225,000 were from out-ofstate and 267,000 were Texas residents.

The hospitality centers provided visitors with current travel information, descriptive literature on points of interest, State Highway maps, information on scenic and historical attractions, special events and state parks. Current road condition information is also available to the highway traveler at the centers.

During 1964 the Texas Highway Department received via mail and filled 212,000 requests for all types of information about the State. Some 18,000 of this total were coupons received by the Texas Tourist Development Agency as a result of its media advertising program.

Data covering out-of-state automobile travel to Texas in 1964 were collected and analyzed by the Travel and information Division of the Texas Highway Department. The sample included nearly 10,000 Texas visitors traveling by automobile.

92% FAVORABLY IMPRESSED Comments contained on the completed survey forms indicated nearly 92 per cent were favorably impressed with the Lone Star State. Things impressing Texas visitors most were: Texas Highways, Texas, Texans and Texas Highway Department Tourist Information bureaus.

Others of the thousands of comments related to vacation sites, prices, size of the State, Texas attractions and recreational facilities. Only 8.2 per cent of the total comments were derogatory in nature.

An estimated 37% were visiting Texas for the first time. Over 52% of the total visitors to Texas last year were here for vacations. Some 30% were visiting family and friends and 18% came to Texas for business reasons.

Motels were a heavy favorite for overnight accommodations with 58 percent selecting these roadside facilities. Of the remainder, 20 percent were housed in private homes, 7 percent stayed in hotels, 7 per cent camped out and 6 per cent had their own trailer accommodations. Two percent of those polled reported no preference.

EVERY SEGMENT BENEFITS Businesses catering to the basic needs of the traveler are the first to feel the impact of the tourist dollar. However, every segment of the Texas economy benefits as this income spreads throughout the state in a demand for services, supplies and labor.

A recent study of the Texas visitor's expenditures indicates the travel dollar is spent as follows: automobile 30c, food and
