## AMENDMENT MERITS APPROVAL

There are urgent reasons why Sutton County
people should vote Tuesday, September 7, for people should vote Tuesday, September 7, for State Senate from 31 to 39 members.
This amendment is of great importance to
Texans in rural areas and small and medium Texans in
size towns. size towns.
Unless the
Unless the amendment is approved, the remaining alternate will be the adoption of anway re-districting plan which would take away voting strength in most of the small and medium-populated counties of Texas and add
to the voting strength of urban areas. Under to the voting strength of urban areas. Under
this plan, Houston would get three additional State senators, Dallas two, and San Antonio State senators, Dallas two, and San Antonio
one. This result would be accomplished by expanding the senatorial districts in sparsely poplated areas.
The present size of the state Senate-was set
when the present constitution of 1876 was drawn. At that time there were 26,000 Texans per senator; now there are 309,022 per senator. Only one state, California, has more people per senator than Texas. With a 39 -member
Senate, each Texas senator would still represent an average of 245,633 people.
Should the amendment fail to
Should the amendment fail to pass, the al-
ternate plan for 31 senatorial districts ternate plan for 31 senatorial districts, the will be in effect in 1967. Under that plan our district
(No. 25) will be expanded into an area 321 square miles, an area larger than any of 17 states, including Tennessee, Ohio, and Virginia. It will be larger than the combined area of New Hampshire, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Hawaii, Connecticut, Rhode Island, and three The jumbo district would be 400 miles across
at its widest point, and to visit all the 21
counties, a person would have to travel 1,100 countie
miles.
With miles.
Without doubt, we would be left withou adequate representation.
A senator simply cannot communicate ef
fectively with his people when they are scat fectively with his people when they are scat tered over such incredible geographic areas.
Further, such huge districts Further, such huge districts would include
widely varying interests so that senators would widely varying interests so that senators would
be unable adequately to represent the multiple needs of their constituents.
On the plus side, approving the amendment and adding eight Senators would provide work-
load relief and should thereby increase ef load relief and should thereby increase ef-
ficiency. The Senate works through commitficiency. The Senate works through commit-
tees, and each member now must serve on from tees, and each member now must serve on from
10 to 14 committees. As a result, he can't at-
tend all meetings, tend all meetings, can't inform himself on all legislation he must act on.

the amendment, "Finally, and the factor of most direct concern to West Texas, the larger Senate would best preserve a voice in the
