





FIRES ARE FAILURES

Every hour fire destroys or damages 67 American homes.

Every hour and twenty minutes, one personmost frequently a child or elderly person-dies in a dwelling fire.

These figures, from National Fire Protection Association research, are the measure of our failure to heed fire hazards, and the measurable result of our failure to correct them.

There is no mystery about the causes of most home fires. A carelessly discarded cigarette is left to smolder in an over-stuffed chair, a portable oil heater is refilled while burning, electrical circuits are overloaded and overfused, uncleared rubbish becomes a breeding place for fire.

The causes of most fire deaths in homes are no mystery. They occur when the simple rules of

safety from fires are violated-smoking in bed leaving children alone in the house, neglecting to teach youngsters that matches and lighters are not playthings.

A critical failure is being unprepared for fire emergencies in the home-no family planning of escape routes, no periodic family fire drill to make sure that both adults and children can act quickly and without panic.

Fires represent failure.

Fire Prevention Week, October 3-9, is a time to recognize this fact, and to act-to remove hazards, to reform habits.

Your actions and attitude now can make you and your family safe from the tragic consequences of fire in the months ahead.

NURSING HOME NECESSARY, BENEFICIAL

The primary concern of a nursing home in Sonora would and should be the care of elderly citizens from Sutton County and the surrounding areas who do not need hospitalization but do, however, need limited care.

Nevertheless, it would be senseless to ignore the other consequent benefits that a nursing home would bring to Sonora.

The home would undoubtedly boost Sonora's economy by adding another payroll to the town. The home would naturally need countless supplies that would be purchased here and resi-

There are several reasons for the parasite and disease problems, says Dr. Maurice Shelton, animal geneticist at Texas A&M University's Livestock and Forage Research Center, McGregor.

The wet spring was conducive to a build-up of parasites, said Shelton. The dry summer amplified the problem since lack of moisture caused a low quality forage. Goats have been, and are in poor shape and have little resistance to the parasites.
