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

Stay High and Dry... Don't Drive **Around Barricades**

The Sonora Police Department has asked us to remind local drivers that barricades, especially those placed in areas of high water and construction sites, are erected for the safety of the motorist. In Texas every year, many drivers and passengers of motor vehicles are swept away and drowned by attempting to cross high water.

Driving around the barricades is a violation of the law and local law enforcement officers will ticket those caught driving around the barricades.

The official wording of the statute is found below.

Texas Criminal Law and Traffic Law

Sec. 472.022. Obeying Warning Signs and Barricades. (a) A person commits an offense if the person:

(1) disobeys the instructions, signals, warnings, or markings of a warning sign; or

(2) drives around a barri-

(b) This section does not apply to: (1) a person who is following the directions of a police of-

(2) a person, including an employee of the department, a political subdivision of this state, or a contractor or subcontractor, whose duties require the

barricade. (c) Each violation of this section is a separate offense.

person to go beyond or around a

(d) An offense under this section is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not less than \$1 or more than \$200, except

(1) if the offense is committed in a construction or maintenance work zone when workers are present and any written notice to appear issued for the offense states on its face that

workers were present when the offense was committed, the offense is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not less than \$2 or. more than \$400; or

(2) if a person commits an offense under Subsection (a) where a warning sign or barricade has been placed because water is over any portion of a road, street, or highway, the offense is a Class B misdemeanor.

(e) In this section: (1) "Barricade" means an

(A) placed on or across a road, street, or highway of this state by the department, a political subdivision of this state, or a contractor or subcontractor constructing or repairing the road, street, or highway under authorization of the department or a political subdivision of this state; and

(B) placed to prevent the passage of motor vehicles over the road, street, or highway during construction, repair, or dangerous conditions.

(2) "Construction or maintenance work zone" means a portion of a highway or street:

(A) where highway construction or maintenance is being undertaken, other than mobile operations as defined by the

Texas Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices; and

(B) that is marked by signs: (i) indicating that it is a construction or maintenance work

(ii) indicating where the zone begins and ends; and (iii) stating: "Fines double

(3) "Warning sign" means a signal, marking, or device placed on a barricade or on a road, street, or highway during construction, repair, or dangerous conditions by the department, a, political subdivision of this state, or a contractor or subcontractor to warn or regulate motor vehicular traffic. The term includes a flagger deployed on a road, street, or highway by the department, a political subdivision of this state, or a contractor or subcontractor to direct traffic around or on the road, street, or highway during construction,

(f) Articles 45.051 and 45.0511, Code of Criminal Procedure, do not apply to an offense under this section committed in a construction or maintenance work zone when workers are present

Hudson Medals at State

On May 7th and 8th, the Sonora Bronco Boy's Golf team was one of the top eight 2-A golf teams that competed at the State Tournament in Austin, Texas. Playing the Morris Williams Golf Course both days, the boys finished in 6th place overall.

After the first day of competition. John Duke Hudson's round of 1 over par, 73, was splitting 4th 3 ways and had him as a contender to medal as an individual. His second day score of 1 under par, 71, put him in a three way tie for the 2nd place silver medal with Jade Scott from Daingerfield, and last year's gold medalist, Travis

Klutts from Callisburg. What ended in a three hole playoff for 2 medals, started with a very exciting beginning

with all three making birdie on the first hole. Scott won the silver medal on the 2nd hole with a birdie while Hudson and Klutts both posted par. The third hole is where Hudson claimed the bronze medal with a par.

One very unique scature of this year's 2A State Medalists is that all three young men were sophomores.



A. Marion Franklin Hamby was born on June 9, 1864 in Fayetteville, Arkansas, some say Austin, and died February 16, 1937 in Austin. He was buried in the Sonora Cemetery. His wife Nan Casey Hamby, the daughter of John Casey, was born December 5, 1858 in Alabama and died on February 14, 1931 in Sutton

Her obituary lists survivors as 7 children: J. S. McMillon, Austin; Mrs. J. G. Baker, San Angelo; Mrs. Al Stockton, Menard; Mrs. Guy Landrum and Mrs. Gertrude Hart, California; John F. And Finis H. Hamby of Sonora.

After the death of his father on January 26, 1832 and the subsequent remarriage of his mother to Alfred Britton in 1853 and then to Jeptha Billingsly in 1856, Joseph Abner Glasscock went to live with his uncle George Glasscock in Georgetown where he was living at the time of the 1850 census. (This census shows George W. Glasscock living with his wife Cynthia and children Elisabeth, Margaret, George W, Albert H. and six others, one of which is Joseph Abner, living in the household listed as blacksmith, carpenters and farmers.

Eliza Ruth Bowmer was born in Missouri in 1838. Her father, Samuel Sellers Bowmer, was born in Kentucky in 1815. In 1851, the Sellers Bowmer family came to Texas and settled at Georgetown where Sellers built and operated the first blacksmith shop. His father, Birkett D. Bowmer, carried the mail between Georgetown and Austin for several years.

Eliza Ruth Bowmer and Joseph Abner Glasscock were married in Williamson County, Texas. They lived in Travis Co. in 1860, Williamson Co. in 1870, Menard in 1880 census records. They moved from Burnet to Menard in 1874 with ox and mule wagons. Joseph Abner Glasscock is shown as a teamster and op-

erator of a freight line.

In 1877, the Joseph
Glasscock family moved into the dog-run log cabin on the San Saba River two miles below Menard, which had previously been occupied by Company D of the


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Main Street Traffic



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

Old School Catfishing

Jug-fishing and limb-lining let you fish many places at the same time — and they work.

area on Lake Aquilla near Hillsboro is hard to find, but for those wanting to pursue catfish with jug lines, it's worth searching out. Its boat ramp gives access to areas where jug lines and limblines can put plenty of blue and channel catfish in your cooler.

John Tibbs, the Texas Parks

and Wildlife Department Inland Fisheries district supervisor for the Waco area, shares my enthusiasm for jug-fishing.

I came to jug-fishing late in life. As a kid growing up in Central Texas, I was a frequent farm-pond fisher using a cane pole. Fishing trips started with digging earthworms in the yard or chasing down grasshoppers, swatting them with a willow switch and popping them into a Prince Albert tobacco tin to await their turn on the hook. The catfish we caught tasted pretty much like the muddy water where they lived, but catching them was fun.

Not until I was grown did I discover jug-fishing. While on a float trip down the Lower Canyons of the Rio Grande, we found a number of abandoned jug lines fashioned from plastic quart motor-oil jugs. The cap screwed on over a knot on one end of a twofoot length of heavy twine that held the line in place. We hadn't anticipated fishing, so the only bait we had was pimento loaf sandwich meat. It didn't stay on the hook well, but the catfish didn't care. We'd toss a baited jug into the water and watch it pull ahead of the rubber raft as the current took it. Suddenly the jug would disappear, surface a short distance away, and head for the bank.

happened, I was as hooked as the fish.

Part of the appeal of jugfishing is purely visual. It's like fishing with a bobber, but instead of having just one line to watch, you can have a dozen or more. Set out a spread of jugs, anchor nearby, put some rod and reel lines in the water, and wait for a cruising catfish to find one of your baits. Small fish may just move the jug around a little when they take the bait, but a big fish will take it completely under. It's as exciting as watching a bass smash a topwater lure.

Jugs can be either free-float-The Old School recreation ing, like those we found on the Rio Grande, or anchored to the bottom with a weight. Anchored jugs are like a vertical trotline, and you can adjust the length of the main line for whatever depth you're fishing. Put them in a good location, and they stay put though if you pick the wrong place, you won't catch much.


Jugs must be white and bear the angler's name and address and the date set out. (Commercial jug-fishers must use orange jugs.) You can use plastic milk jugs, but they are not very durable. Ready-made versions are available, some of which tip up or "flag" to signal a bite. These have a short piece of rebar inside a length of PVC pipe and a collar of closed-cell foam on one end. The jugs are deployed with the rebar in the foam-covered end of the pipe; when a fish pulls on the line attached to the opposite end, it pulls the pipe down, the rebar slides to that end, and the rig stands upright in the water.

John Tibbs makes his own anchored, non-flagging jugs out of two-foot lengths of white plastic pipe capped at both ends. He uses a main line about 25 feet long weighted with a brick or a cement-filled tin can with an eyebolt embedded in it. Two drop lines about two feet long are attached to the main line; these hold the hooks. "For the main line I prefer at least 300-pound test so if a fish pulls it into brush, you can retrieve the weight," Tibbs says. "I prefer 150-pound test for the drop lines." Hooks are 2/0 or bigger circle hooks.

"Circle hooks let the fish hook itself," Nick Tibbs points out. "Also, fish won't swallow the hook. They will take the bait About the third time that and start to swim off with it, and the hook will turn and catch them, usually in the corner of the mouth.

Legally up to five hooks can be used on a jug-line, but it's best to use no more than two. When handling the jugs, especially if there is a big fish on, it's easy to get tangled up and even hook yourself if there are a bunch of hooks flying around. Tibbs uses hooks attached to the main line three and six feet above the

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
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

Range Condition vs. **Forage Condition**

We've been blessed with a wet spring and everything is green. Invariably, the question of range condition or forage condition comes up after periods of rainfall. But before it can be answered, we must ask ourselves another question, "How does range condition differ from forage condition?"

The terms range condition and forage condition are often used interchangeably, although

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
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

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Common Medicare Questions

What is Medicare?

Medicare is the federal health insurance program for people age 65 or older, people under age 65 with certain disabilities and people of all ages with End-Stage Renal Disease. Medicare has many programs from which one may choose.

Part A: Most people do not pay a premium for Part A because they or a spouse already paid for it through payroll taxes. One qualifies mium and/or deductible. for Part A after working and paying taxes for 40 quarters (approximately 10 years). Medicare Part A helps cover inpatient care in hospitals as well as skilled nursing facilities; however, Medicare does not pay for long-term care (nursing home, assisted living, etc.). It may also help cover hospice care and some home health care.

Part B: Part B is completely optional and most people pay a monthly premium for it. Medicare Part B helps cover doctors' office visits and outpatient care, such as lab tests. It also covers some other medical services that Part A does not cover, such as physical therapy, occupational therapy and some home health care. medically necessary.

Part D: Part D is completely optional and most people pay a monthly premium for this coverage. Medicare prescription drug coverage is available to all Medicare beneficiaries. If a beneficiary signs up for this coverage, it may help lower prescription drug costs and help protect against higher costs in the future. While Medicare lends its name to this program and oversees it, coverage is provided by private companies.

While the monthly premium for Part D may go up each year, those who do not sign up when they first become eligible, usually within six months of turning 65, may pay higher monthly premiums as a penalty. However, those beneficiaries who can prove they had existing prescription drug coverage during that time may be able to have their penalty waived. Programs are available to beneficiaries who meet certain income requirements to reduce or eliminate their monthly pre-

Medicare Advantage:

Medicare Advantage Plans work more like private insurance and are usually administered by private companies but are still part of the Medicare program. If you join one of these plans, you generally get all your Medicare-covered health care through that plan. Medicare Advantage Plans may include Medicare Health Maintenance Organization (HMOs), Preferred Provider Organizations (PPOs), Private Fee-for-Service Plans and/or Medicare Special Needs Plans.

When you join a Medicare Advantage Plan, you use the insurance card that you get from the plan. In many plans, there may be extra benefits and lower co-payments than in premium to your Medicare Advantage Plan for the extra benefits that they offer.



Voters approve tax relief amendment for seniors, disabled

AUSTIN - Texas voters approved Senate Joint Resolution 13 in the May 12 election.

Unofficial results available May 13 revealed the statewide turnout was only 7 percent, with 88 percent of the voters casting ballots in favor of the resolution.

SJR 13 amends the state constitution to authorize the Legislature to adjust the public school ad valorem tax or tax rates for taxpayers who are aged 65 or older, or are disabled, and who are owners of an exempted homestead.

The change benefits older or disabled taxpayers who did not receive tax relief as a result of the school tax rate reduction passed a year ago in the 79th Legislature, 3rd called

Guv threatens special session

The bill the Texas House and Senate passed enacting a two-year moratorium on private toll road projects landed on Gov. Rick Perry's desk May 7

The legislation, HB 1892 authored by Rep. Wayne Smith, R-Baytown, and sponsored by Sen. Tommy Williams, R-The Woodlands, puts Perry's Trans Texas Corridor on ice but grants powers to certain county and regional tollway authorities. Those entities would have first option in building projects within their jurisdictions.

Perry said the moratorium is not what bothers him the most about the bill

The big issues, he said, are potential loss of federal funding and the wording of the bill, which he said would adversely affect the Texas Department of Transportation's contracting and oversight responsibilities. A letter from the Federal Highway Administration raises those questions.

Perry suggested lawmakers reconsider and rework the bill before the end of the current session. He hinted that the alternative to that would be a veto and then a special session.

House passes TYC reform bill The House on May 7 tentatively approved legislation to overhaul the Texas Youth Commission, which earlier this year was put in conservatorship after reports surfaced of sexual abuse of inmates and fiscal mismanagement at the agency.

SB 103 by Sen. Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen, is crafted to enhance transparency of its operations, prosecute offenses committed within the agency, and improve the hiring practices of guards.

The bill's House sponsor, Rep Jerry Madden, R-Richardson, said, "The abuse and poor performance identified at the TYC cannot be allowed

continue. This bill reforms the structure, management and oversight of the commission to provide true rehabilitation, not just the punitive warehousing that characterizes the system today.'

In related news, Will Harrell, executive director of the Texas chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union, was named ombudsman for the TYC, contingent on passage of SB 103. His job will be to evaluate ans last year." and secure youths' rights.





Ever Eat a Agarita?



Crimson is the color of the day! A mating pair of vermillion flycatchers has been spotted on Eaton Hill. This is exciting news for our birding operation because the male vermillion is an electric red with a handsome chocolate brown mask, back and wings, making him one of the most stunning North American birds. While vermillion flycatchers commonly nest in this area, they seem to prefer the flat terrain, and this is the first recorded sighting for Eaton Hill. Jacqui Thomas first spotted the female bathing in the water feature at the Native American village, with the male nearby, and again noted the pair several days later. We hope they've already built a nest and that this is the beginning of another annual ar-

Speaking of arrivals, the much anticipated first sighting of the supreme king of color, the unparalleled painted bunting occurred last week, adding another humbling delight to an already giddy springtime procession of natural wonders.

And as if the lush green vegetation, butterflies, incredible wildflowers, cactus blooms, and vibrant birds weren't enough to

knock your socks off, here comes the holly-like agarita shrub donning its succulent orange-red fruit! The agartia is interesting for its multiple attributes.

Not one to be pinned down, the Agarita goes by many names including Algerita, Agaritos, Chaparral Berry, Wild Currant, Larado Mahonia and Currant of Texas. In early spring, fragrant clusters of bright yellow blooms are visually inconspicuous from a distance, but can be detected by their scent wafting on the breeze, sometimes without an actual plant in sight. The stiff, sharply pointed, holly-shaped leaves are an attractive blue-green and add a pleasing change of hue to the landscape. Being an evergreen, the agrarita is a constant in our surrounding foliage but is native only west to Arizona and south into Northern Mexico. Perhaps the small range is due to the plants' only sensitivity: too much water. Aside from needing well drained soil, agarita is adaptable, hardy and extremely heat tolerant.

The brilliant fruit, which is currently ripe on the bush, is a favorite of birds, small mammals, and some two-legged upright mammals as well. The enticing berries are said to make a lovely jelly, with a delicious and distinct flavor, as well as a nice table and desert wine! Hey, my spell check wants to change 'agarita" to "margarita", maybe I'm on to something.

With Veteran's Day approaching, one other relevant point of interest is the use of agarita wood and roots for yellow dye. Early settlers made use of this, certainly Native Americans did, and surprisingly, during WWII the dye was used in color-coded parachutes!

However you choose to pronounce the name, never underestimate the value of our limestone ornamental, the lovable - but not so huggable agarita bush. Hit the trails, and don't forget the
