City Manager Polonis explained that three million dollars will be spent to replace leaking lines in the water distribution system, while the remaining six million dollars will be spent to repair deteriorated

sewer lines and to improve the City of Sonora Waste Water Treatment Plant.

Polonis said the city applied for grants for repair and improvement of grants for repair and improvement of the water utility systems, but that none were available. The loans through the Texas Water Development Board are available to municipalities at a low interest rate and with a 20-25 year pay-

Historically, when mains deteriorated, city crews dug the pipe up and patched it; a solution that is no longer viable. "The city has a current water loss rate of 22% in its water distribution system," Polonic explained, adding that the figure represents an unacceptable loss to the city.

on Environmental Quality (TCEQ). The state agency has identified several deficiencies, including excessive inflow and infiltration in the waste water system, as well as deterioration of pipes and unreliable water pressures in

the water delivery system. After receiving funding through TDB, the city received notice from TCEQ of an agreement on a 10-year moratorium on enforcement actions related to the City of Sonora Waste Water facility through the Sanitary

Sewer Outflow Initiative. As reported in the June 28th edition of the Devil's River News, the city will first focus on detection of weak areas in the waste-water collection system. Smoke testing is expected to begin on sewer lines within the week. Information gathered from the testing will aid engineers in finding poor or improper plumbing connections, broken pipes and illegal cross connections within the system. Once the testing has been completed, the city will notify its

completed, the city will notify its customers of any defect or problem found, residents will have 45 days to repair the situation.

The second phase of the project will be replacing deteriorating water delivery lines. Many of the city's mains will require repair, resulting in digging up pipes usually found in street rights of way. Following completion of both projects, the city will likely repair the streets with tax dollars derived from the Weight controller that was approved. the 1/4-cent sales tax that was approved by city voters for street maintenance.

## **Commissioners Begin Budget Discussions**

# Maintenance Issues Eyed at Senior Citizens Center

maintenance issues, including a laundry list of necessary repairs at the Sonora Senior Center, highlighted discussion at Monday's meeting of the Sutton County Commissioners Court.

According to a document forwarded by Sonora City Manager Jim Polonis, the center has major electrical problems. The document indicates that too many appliances are powered on one kitchen circuit; citing, for example, that when a microwave is turned on it pops the circuit breaker. In fact, the center's electrical system is compromised in the kitchen, both storage rooms, the office and in the men's and ladies' restroom areas. The city and county, who oper- pressed concern regarding intermunicipal agreement, are looking at some major repairs – and quite possibly major costs – during the next budget year.

Additionally, the facility is looking at repair of the kitchen flooring, cracks in the dining room ceiling, windows and doors in the recreation room, additional storage shelving, and termite damage to the exterior of the building during the coming fiscal year. County Judge Carla Gar-

ner informed the commissioners that the city manager did not yet have an estimate for repairs. She advised the commissioners that she had of necessary repairs can be meeting.


Operation of the Sonora Senior Center is performed through an agreement established in the 1980's with the city administering the program and the county paying one-half of the expenses incurred, including employee salaries and benefits. The county earmarks \$10,000 each year for repairs to the center. During the 2007 fiscal year, the grease trap was replaced with the cost shared by the city and county. The county paid \$5,800 for this expense. County Auditor Maura Weingart informed the commissioners that the county currently has \$21,700 in reserve for the center.

The commissioners exate the center through an maintenance of the facility and appointed Commissioner Milton Cavaness to tour the facility to review maintenance and electrical issues with city personnel.

The commissiones discussed upcoming mainte-nance projects for the coun-ty's buildings, including repairs to the roofing and air conditioning systems at the annex and the county jail. Judge Garner indicated that the county has a regular maintenance program for all of its facilities.

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
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# Medication Management Important for All Ages

We know that taking our medications as directed is an important part of staying healthy. This involves understanding a little bit about drugs, in general, and how to

talk to your doctor, pharmacist and other health providers who might prescribe medications. However, it also involves safely organizing and storing medications in addition to keeping

good records about them. He has prescribed a medication, the pharmacist has filled the prescription and now it is up to you to take it safely. Here are some tips that can help:

Take your medication in the exact amount and at the time your doctor prescribes

Call your doctor if you have problems with your medica-

Your doctor may be able to change it to a different one that will work better for you.

Avoid mixing alcohol and medication. Some medications may not work correctly or may make you sick if taken with

Take your medication until it is finished or until your doctor says it is okay to stop taking it. For some medications, like antibiotics, it may be important to take all of the pills, even after you start feeling better. Remember not to share medications. Your medication was prescribed for you to treat your condition. Also, check the expiration dates on your medication bottles and throw away outdated medications.

Because of changes in vision, hearing, loss of strength in the hands and many other ailments that may accompany aging, older adults may have a hard time managing their medications once they get them home. For these reasons and others, you may want to purchase a pill sorter to help better manage your

Some pill sorters allow for a 7-day supply of medication, and some hold a 7-day supply of medication with different slots for taking pills up to 4 times per day. Some pill sorters hold a months supply of medication. No matter what type you choose, look for a few things before buying:

> Is the print large enough for me to read? Are the lids easy enough for me to open?

Does the pill sorter have enough slots for all the medi cation I take?

Does it come in different colors so I dont get my pills

and my spouses pills confused? If you take your medication out of the childproof contain-

er, remember not to leave your medication on a kitchen table or counter where a young child may get into it.

You should always keep a list of medications you are taking, why you are taking each medication, and the dose for that medication. It is a good reminder for you and your doctor, especially if you have more than one doctor. In addition, this list can be invaluable in an emergency. Keep this list somewhere that is easily accessible in case of an accident, perhaps in the glove box of your car or on the front of your refrigerator.

Many different agencies and organizations can give you a medication record. No matter where you get your record, or if you make it up yourself, it should have a few basic parts:

It should clearly be identified as YOUR medication record. Be sure it contains your name and phone number. Your record needs to have the date it was last updated. It is important to keep your list of medications up-to-date, always making changes when a new dose is given, when you stop or start a medication, etc.



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List your allergies to food and drugs. This information may make a difference in what your doctor wants to prescribe for you

Make a complete list of everything you take, both prescription and non-prescription, including the dose you take, how often you take it, what the pill looks like, why you take it, the doctor who prescribed it and any special instructions

You play a big part in making sure that you and your medications are safe. You can do this by keeping a list of your prescription and non-prescription medications, keeping that list up-to-date and making sure to take that list with you to any doctors visits. Also, remember to take your medications as prescribed and not to share them. And last, talk with your doctor or pharmacist about any problems you have with your

Remember, medications that are strong enough to help you can also be strong enough to hurt you if they are not used


The Paytons, who met on-line, have well over a half century of combined writ-

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

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

## Responsible Grazing **Urged for Area Ranchers**

EXTENSION

Looks like the drought finally broke. Range plants have grown to above average heights and produced a legion of seed stalks. However, the color green can have a profound psychological effect, tempting you to deviate from your best-laid drought recovery plans. You should resist the temptation to restock to pre-drought levels no matter how "green" the range appears. Animals graze forage, not acres, and stocking rates considered to be moderate during a "normal" precipitation year may

be heavy during and following dry years. Overgrazing after drought will damage surviving plants and ultimately require a much longer period of rest and recovery than with conservative, incremental restocking strategies.

The year following drought should be devoted as much as possible to improving plant vigor and restoring protective residual vegetation and plant litter. Pastures most likely to provide the largest increases in forage production should receive highest prior-

ity. Grazing management practices that benefit plant recovery in the years immediately following drought (listed in order of efficacy) include

1) Rest pastures for an entire growing season or more following severe droughts. Complete rest is the most effective and fastest way to achieve range recovery.

2) Use pastures only when key forage species are dormant for one or more growing seasons. The dormant season is typically the least harmful time to graze perennial grasses.

3) Use pastures when the least desirable species are green and palatable. By manipulating timing of grazing in this way, you can shift grazing pressure away from key forage plants. For example, animals are likely to prefer green (but less desirable) plants over key forage plants when they are dormant.

4) Defer grazing until after key forage species have produced mature seed. At this stage, they are usually not as highly prized by livestock. Perennial grasses can generally tolerate grazing better during this period because they have completed their life cycle for the current growing season.

Droughts are a guaranteed but unpredictable phenomenon, occurring, on average, about 4 out of every 10 years. Successful management depends on planning in advance how to deal with it. Delays in decision making often leads to intensification of the problem, economic loss, and long-term damage to rangeland resources.

There is no cookbook approach for proper drought management. It really boils down to the fact that sound range management practices that sustain or improve range condition will ultimately result in good drought management.






