

"Texas Swing" to Heat up Saturday's Dance



Jody Nix and the Texas Cowboys are bringing Texas Swing to the dance slab at the Sutton County Park Saturday night. Advance tickets are available from any of the Miss Sutton County queen contestants, but may also be purchased at the gate.

Saturday night's Sutton County Days Slab Dance will feature the lyrical strains of country swing drifting in from the sandy plains of West Texas. Following the final performance of the Sonora Outlaw Pro Rodeo, *Jody Nix and the Texas Cowboys* will take the stage at the Sutton County Park to play their mix of pure, traditional western swing and true country music. Their solid Texas dance music is sure to have dancers swinging under the stars well into the night.

Texas swing was created and made popular by Bob Wills and Hoyle Nix in the 1940s and '50s. Hoyle's son, Jody Nix, inherited his father's love of music and his talent- a combination that was shown early in life. At eight, when most children were learning the music scales, Jody began his professional career, playing five nights a week with his father's band, *The West Texas Cowboys*. He learned the soft swing of country music as only an insider can – an insider guided by Hoyle Nix and Bob Wills!

Jody's years of music education were rewarded. In 1973, at age twenty-one, Jody performed on Bob Wills' "For the Last Time" album. After his father's death, Jody moved from the drums to the fiddle; from the back of the stage to the front – a move he was destined to make. His dedication to western swing fiddle has dazzled audiences ever since. His high-energy stage shows and easy dance music have excited audiences, and the band has developed a loyal following of fans of all ages.

The Texas Cowboys are accomplished musicians as well, with Larry Nix on bass and vocal harmonies; Robert Weeks on fiddle; Johnny Cox on steel guitar; and Dixie Hanks on drums. These musicians are known as one of the finest professional music organizations anywhere. They travel across the country playing major rodeos, clubs and conventions to large audiences. Jody and the Texas Cowboys received a special honor in 1989 when they were asked to perform at the Texas State Society Black Tie & Boots Ball for President George Bush

Jody has seven albums to his credit and was a guest artist with *Asleep at the Wheel* on the "Tribute to Bob Wills" album. The album was a Country Music Association nominee for Album of the Year honors at the CMA awards show in 1994. In October of 1996, Jody was inducted into the Western Swing Hall of Fame in Sacramento, California.



Baylie Brown of Krum, TX will be performing the National Anthem on Friday and Saturday nights at the Sonora Outlaw Pro Rodeo at 7:30 p.m. Baylie is the granddaughter of Joe N. and Goldie Brown of Sonora. She has been singing professionally since the age of 7 and is currently negotiating record contracts with 2 different major record labels. Her big break came last January when she was on Season 6 of American Idol.



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

The City of Sonora extends a big thank you for all the support to those involved in the city's grease trap program. This support is paying dividends to our community in many different ways. The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) is pleased with the progress in Sonora, and because of the support of local citizens, the city has become a shining example to other cities in the area.

The benefits to the city and its utility users are now being manifested by reduced grease present in the collection system. This means the city is able to reduce the amount of very expensive enzyme chemicals it puts in the wastewater collection system to break up grease. The lift stations do not have to pump grease-laden water, which requires more electrical power to push it through the system, and has reduced maintenance on the

treated effluent throughout is more efficient. A little over a year ago, the City of Sonora embarked on a program to reduce the grease content in the wastewater collection system. The TCEQ dictated this program to the city as a "clean it up or else" project. This project became a community effort with the city, the Sonora Industrial Development Corporation (SIDC), restaurant owners, County Judge and commissioners, and the Sonora Independent School District all participating.

The city took action first by hiring designated representative, Charles McDonald, who has done a great job informing, instructing, and assisting restaurant owners installing grease traps. The city then drafted and approved a grease trap ordinance. The SIDC took the initiative to assist businesses requiring grease traps by setting up a grant program to defray this cost. Sutton County Judge Carla Garner and the county commissioners got behind the effort, making county facilities compliant. The school district jumped on the bandwagon installing grease traps at their facilities. Restaurant owners/operators took to the task by installing grease traps at their respective restaurants.

Now that the grease trap program is established, we cannot stop; we must continue. As our progress continues, the benefits for the city will increase. Your efforts to make this program work are making Sonora a better place to live, work, and play.



ASK THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Q. You once printed an article about a crazy Mexican prisoner that was bounced around jails and caused a big hassle between counties, will you print it again?

A. The story you are looking for was in "Bad Old Days" In and Around Sutton Co. 1889-1939 and was reprinted from articles in The Devil's River News on April 25, 1896 and May 2, 1896.


Mexican Dumped on Del Rio by Crockett Co. - Ben McMahan, a commissioner from Crockett County, arrived in Del Rio Tuesday, having in charge a violent and dangerously insane Mexican named Cicilaneous, whom he turned loose in Las Vacas, the Mexican suburb of Del Rio, claiming that, since this man was not an American citizen, he had no right to be protected by this government. As might be expected, the lunatic immediately re-crossed the river and, but for the vigilance of the shrievalty, might have done damage to this community. Cicilaneous is now in jail and safe to himself and us, but what can be said for a community which so transgresses the commonest laws of humanity and decency as to turn loose its dangerous maniacs upon a sister community. No doubt the officer had authority from his county for this action, but for any man or set of men who will purposely impose upon a neighboring people such an iniquity the Record has nothing but condemnation and contempt. Let the chips lie where they fall, we intend to hew to the line. - Del Rio Record

Del Rio Jail Fire - The crazy Mexican confined in the county jail set fire to his bedding Wednesday night about ten o'clock and the neighborhood was alarmed. The jail being fireproof, the fire could make no headway and was easily extinguished by Cenal Hose Company No. 1, under Captain Wallen, which was the first to arrive. When the jail doors were opened the Mexican was found sitting in the window laughing wildly and yelling "Let her burn!" Del Rio Record

"Lige" Briant to bring him in for the retrial so the case was continued many times until he was apprehended. It was a known fact that the sheriff ate at the home of Mr. Adams many times during those 10 years and a little difficult to believe that he didn't know where he was residing, even if he was "hiding in the attic," as so many claim. Why didn't he arrest him when he came out at night, dressed like a woman, and little children skipped along behind him chanting, "killer, killer, killer." It has been said that his partner Mr. Callahan had a hand in him not being arrested. Who knows, not me for sure. What we do know is that Mr. Adams' body was taken to Alpine and he was

buried in a plot belonging to the family of his wife.



A lot of people experience memory lapses. Some memory problems are serious, others are not. People who have serious changes in their memory, personality and behavior may suffer from a form of brain disease called dementia - the two most common forms of dementia being Alzheimer's disease and multi-infarct dementia. Dementia seriously affects a person's ability to carry out daily activi-

Sometimes, older people have emotional problems that may cause memory loss and be mistaken for dementia. Feeling sad, lonely, worried or bored may be more common for some older adults for a variety of reasons. Adapting to change may and other memory aids. leave some people feeling confused or forgetful. Emotional things better by mentally conproblems can be eased by sup- necting them to other meanportive friends and family or by professional help from a health provider or counselor.

can make a person more forgetful. Forgetfulness caused by these emotions usually is temporary and goes away when the feelings fade. However, if these feelings last for a long period of time, getting help from a professional is important. Treatment remember that a healthy diet is may include counseling or medication, or a combination of both.

Reversible conditions can be caused by a high fever, a balanced diet helps maintain dehydration, vitamin deficiency, overall good health. poor nutrition, bad reactions to medicines, problems with the thyroid gland or a minor head injury. Medical conditions like these can be serious and should be treated by a health provider as soon as possible.

People who are worried about memory problems should see their health provider. A complete medical examination for memory loss may include gathering information about medical history, including use of prescription and over the counter medicines, diet, past medical problems and general health. Because a correct diagnosis depends on recalling these details

> Lab tests may help your health provider find any probmental abilities: memory, problem solving, counting and language. A brain scan may assist the doctor in ruling out a curable disorder. A scan also may show signs of normal age related changes in the brain. It may be necessary to have another scan at a later date to see if there have been further changes in the brain.

Many older adults, in fact, people of all ages, wonder how they may try to keep their memory sharp. Some suggestions include developing interests or hobbies and staying involved in activities that stimulate both the mind and body. Many people find it useful to plan tasks, make "things to do" lists and use notes, calendars

They also may remember ingful things, such as a familiar name or song.

Exercise is important to Stress, anxiety or depression keep your body healthy, but it is also important for your mind. The brain needs exercises and challenges so that it can remain active and keep up with your daily life. Try to challenge your brain daily to keep it active and alert. Also, very important to the body's function and especially to the mind. Although no special diets or nutritional supplements have been shown to specifically address memory problems,

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Controlling Caterpillars In Pecans

Despite the fact that they've been around for weeks, we are now seeing

heavier infestations of several pests on pecan and other trees. While pecan nut casebearer and pecan weevil are the most serious pests of pecans, there are other secondary pests. These include hickory shuckworm, fall webworm, and walnut caterpillars.

Hickory Shuckworm (Cydia caryana), are creamy-white larvae with five pairs of prolegs. Adult moths are dark-gray with a wingspread of onehalf inch. Pupae are one-third inch long and dark-brown color. Several generations of this insect occur each year. Larvae in the second summer generation feed on fruit in early July, which may cause some minor nut drop. The third summer generation has the greatest potential for crop loss. Third generation eggs are deposited over a long time period from late July to early September. Before shell hardening, larval feeding results in fruit abortion. Once the shell hardens, larval feeding is confined to the shuck preventing normal shuck opening. Full-grown larvae overwinter in the shucks, either hanging on the tree or on the ground.

Fall Webworm (Hyphantria cunea), has 2-3 generations per year. It is the most common gregarious caterpillar that feeds on pecan and can completely defoliate trees. Dirty white webs enclosing a colony of caterpillars are the distinctive signs of fall webworm infestations. Adult moths are white with small dark brown spots. The larvae construct a web (1 to 2 yards long) that covers a cluster of leaves on which they feed. Larvae leave the web in late fall to pupate in constructed hairy cocoons under the scales of the bark on the trunks or on the ground. The first generation moth flight occurs in June while the second generation moths emerge in August.

Walnut Caterpillar (Datana integerrima), adults are light brown moths with four narrow, brown bands on their forewings. The caterpillars (larvae) are dark red with many silver hairs along the body. They feed in groups on leaf tissues causing defoliation and severely affecting tree vigor, yield, and nut quality. The larvae crowd together on the lower parts of trees to molt and leave a patch of hairy cast skins. There are two generations each year with the second generation appearing in greater numbers. Larvae pupate in the soil where they pass the winter before adult moths emerge in early summer. Walnut caterpillar is a periodic outbreak pest in pecan. During most seasons, naturally occurring populations of parasitic wasps heavily parasitize the egg masses of walnut caterpillar. Only when the balance between Aug. 31 pest and parasite is disturbed (usually by unusual weather conditions) does walnut caterpillar become a serious pest.


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


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McGuffin Wins Paint Horse Show

NONINSURED ASSISTANCE PROGRAM NEWS

Monday, September 3, 2007, is the deadline to purchase small grain grazing Noninsured Crop Assistance Program (NAP) coverage for 2008 crop year. The fee is \$100 per crop up to \$300 per county. Producers may continue 2008 NAP coverage on the same crop as 2007 if the applicable service fee is received in our office by the earliest application closing date (September 3rd) without having to file another application for coverage. Our office mailed continuous coverage letters to inform producers of NAP crops covered in the 2007 crop year and the deadline for submitting the ap-

plicable service fees. Producers who wish to add or delete any crops on their 2008 application for coverage will be required to file and sign a new application. Any previous year's production needs to be filed with our office prior to the subsequent crop year's final acreage reporting date to be eligible to be used for Actual Production History (APH) purposes. Also keep in mind that sales closing dates are different for all crops.

Information about the contest from the July 24, 1975 issue of The Devils River News indicates the contestants were to be "rated by a panel of judges on poise, personality and beauty. There will be a swim suit competition, as well as the most fantastic legs award." Twenty-eight men had pre-registered to enter the contest and included (among others) Bill Harle, Charles Graves, Hershel Davenport, Jim Garrett, John Cotten and Ken Braden.
Sutton County Day was a one-day event that was very much a community picnic with everyone pitching in. The girls little league sold lemonade, the volunteer fire department and ladies auxiliary sold corn dogs and sandwiches and the Lions Club had home made ice cream. Mexican food and coffee was available from the Childhood Development Center and the Women of St. John's Episcopal Church

The caption under the photo describes the difficulty judges had choosing between the entrants, finally naming Teaff Oil Company's entrant, Mike Street, as Miss Sutton County.






Paula Zaragoza



Ben Castilleja Sr. was born to Margarito and Clara Castilleja on Fenruary 13, 1913, in Kenedy, Texas. The Castilleja family lived in the Stonewall-Fredericksburg area, where both of his parents died when Ben was just seven years old. He was then raised by his aunt and uncle in Uvalde.

At the age of 14 or 15, Ben began working for Sonora resident Lillian Hudspeth. As a young man, Ben would drive Mrs. Hudspeth on occasions when she desired to travel to surrounding towns - long before there were any paved roads between Sonora and San Angelo or to the south to Del.Rio. At the age of 18 Ben began learning the trade of sheep shearing and developed his own machinery to make the tedious job of shearing faster, and therefore more productive.

On June 24, 1942, he married Genoveva Perez-Sanchez. Ben and Genoveva were blessed with seven children of their own; Ofelia, Enedina, JoeBen Jr., Eva, Margaret, Hector, and bertha. Daughter Eva passed away at the age of 32 leaving a 7 year old daughter, Jessica Robledo. Jessica was raised by her grandparents.

Ben continued the sheep shearing business until his retirement in 1998 at age 85. His memory serves him well as he still recalls many of the ranchers he has worked for in Sonora and the surrounding areas, such as Clara Allison, Cleve Jones, Clara Jones, Edwin Sawyer, Wesley Sawyer, Lee Allison, Lee Fawcett, Rip Ward, John Wade, Albert Ward, John Joy, Pamela Meador, P.K.McIntosh, and John Miller. Even to date Ben enjoys spending time with his friends who still continue to have a kindred relationship. Ben still speaks highly of his cherished memories of life long friends Lura and Eddie Sawyer and Mr. and Mrs. John Joy.

In Ben's retirement, he still continues to be an avid craftsman and maintains the couple's home and yard. Ben and Genoveva, at the ages of 94 and 93, respectively, conn tinue to enjoy their good quality of life in Sonora while attending weekly worship services at St. Ann's Catholic Church.


