## **Ports-to-Plains Traffic Corridor Increases Truck Traffic Traffic Bypass - Roadblock Ahead?**


Even before the first mile of pavement is laid in Sutton County, the 1400-mile Ports-to-Plains trade corridor is already carrying goods to America's heartland from the Mexican border town of Laredo. Much of this freight is coming right through the middle of Sonora.

If you've traveled US Hwy. 277 through town, north to San Angelo or south to Del Rio, you've very likely experienced the increased truck traffic. You've probably been stuck behind one of the "superloads" hauling massive components for wind turbines, and you've likely noticed the deterioration of the two-lane highway. The upgrad-ing and widening of Hwy 277 to four lanes is scheduled to be completed between 2016 and 2020.

But does Sonora need a traffic reliever route now? Where will it be constructed? Who will pay for it? Who will benefit and and safety issues in Sonora. who will the bypass hurt?

The citizens of Sonora and Sutton County have an opportunity to have a voice in decisions on this issue at a public meeting on October 9th at the Sutton County Civic Center. The public meeting is a legal requirement for compilation of a feasibility study conducted by the Texas Department of Transportation, (TxDOT), and opinions and comments from local citizens will help to determine the location of the bypass.

Speakers at the meeting will inform the pub-

lic of the community's options, including the construction of a proposed bypass, the financing of its construction, and the economic impact on local businesses. The meeting is the first of at least two meetings to gauge public reaction to the proposed bypass – and for people in Sonora it is the first real chance to make your voice heard on this issue. **Financial Burden** 

Max Howorth and John Paul Friess, both members of the Transportation Committee of Sonora and Sutton County, have made it clear; "The transportation committee is NOT a proponent of a reliever route. We are nothing more than a fact-finding body representing the interests of the people of Sonora and Sutton County in discussions with TxDOT about the reliever route." Max Howorth, president of the board of directors of the Sonora Industrial Development Committee, said "We don't even have clear justification that we need a reliever route - especially not if we (in Sutton County) are going to have to pay to build it."

The cost of the reliever route project is anticipated to be \$24 million, exclusive of the right of way. That figure does not include the cost of the required interchange with Interstate 10. To fund the project, the community could be faced with a bond election. Other options include intra-state banking loans, or pass-through tolling. "Depending on the agreement reached with the state, over a period of 8-10 years, the county would be paid back 85% to 95% of the cost of the project," Howorth explained. **Continued on Page 4**

It seemed like there was a referee conference on each penalty to see if any of them had any idea on where to mark the ball. However, it should be noted that they would finally get the calls right, as at least one of them may have officiated a football game before. Sonora, which has logged four straight victories since losing to Harper, who has yet to lose, had to work hard for this victory. After a scoreless first quarter, the Broncos scored first with 10:34 left in first half on a 32yard touchdown throw from senior quarterback Victor Vaquera to Will Anderson. This capped off a 14-play, 61-yard drive that saw Sonora convert twice on fourth down. Aaron Gaytan kicked the ball through the uprights. The officials called a chop block penalty on the PAT kick - which is a new one for me. The Bronco linemen just went down on all fours, and the Ingram rushers fell over them - thus a chop block. The pass attempt to make the two point conversion failed. The Broncos led 6-0. Sonora also put together a 5-play, 41-yard drive that ended when senior fullback Morgan Martinez scored on a 1-yard run with 2:45 left before intermission. The Broncos were up 12-0 at that point. There were two penalties on the play. Ingram was called on a block in the back, and the Broncos were called for unsportsmanlike conduct. After a ten minute delay (it seemed), the officials ruled that the penalties would offset and two points would be given to the Warriors. Neither team scored in the second half. The second half can be described as follows. The Broncos would run four to ten plays per drive before losing a fumble or being penalized. The Warrior drives usually were three and out or one first down and three and out. The Warriors had only four first downs all night. Anderson had two interceptions and Martinez had one as they stopped three Warrior drives. Ricardo Rodriguez rushed 11 times for 74 yards, Vaquera had 62 yards on 14 carries, and Anderson had 10 carries for 55 yards. Alonzo Pena had the most impressive run of the night as he broke several tackles in a fifteen yard run late in the game. In all, the Broncos rushed 53 times for 271 yards while holding Ingram to only ten rushing yards. The Warriors had only 73 yards of total offense. From my vantage point on the sidelines, I saw Aaron Gaytan, Alberto Tovar, and Michael Jenkins make several outstanding defensive plays. ## **\$22k Raised at Benefit Roping**

The event raised just over \$22,000 for the Wounded Warriors Project with \$7,500 coming from the auction. Additional money was raised through cash donations, t-shirt sales, the barbecue and the roping itself. "The benefit roping could not have been as successful without the help of DCP employees, along with our many friends and family members," said Debbie Collins, whose arena on Bloodworth Road was crowded from early Saturday morning through most of the weekend.

"The very generous cash donations from the Eldorado, Ozona and Sonora communities and businesses along with the Midland/Odessa area was amazing," Collins added.

The best two team times shared \$1000 in prize money. Winners of the best time, and sharing the \$600 prize were Bryan Johnson and B.J. Dugger with a 5.91. Second place, taking home a cash prize of \$400, was the team of Casey Gattis and Jeff Gilbert with a time of 6.23.

Karl Rios and Devon Hayes took home the championship saddles, having the best cumulative time, with 31.33. Rios and Hayes each took home \$1,188 in prize money. The team of Jack Kinsey and Sterling Price earned the spurs with a combined time of 33.38. They each earned a \$1,005 paycheck. Bryan Rogers and Frank Montague took third and the breast collars with a time of 34.82. Third place shared \$1,646.

Also taking home prize money from the event were Casey Gattis and B.J. Dugger, fourth place with 36.54, earning \$640 per man; Joe Rios and Steve Northcott, with a 36.67. In fifth place, earning \$457 per man; Joel Garza and B.J. Dugger, sixth place with 37.02, earning \$274 per man; and in seventh place, Leo Rodriguez and B.J. Dugger, with a time of 38.95, earning \$183 per man.





Sometimes all it takes is a little bit of information like this in the paper to help a researcher jump back another generation.



Daniel went to work on a farm then switched to working on the railroad. City directories told me this information. This experience has taught me that every little bit of information that is in the newspapers and in the directories is important to anyone doing research. Death certificates are not always correct Now the next article states and obituaries are often wrong. Recently, I was working on one obituary and found that in earlier obits the sisters had said their fa-

ther was J.T. and J.A., which was incorrect. The last daughter to die listed her father as the initials J. H.. With the correct initials and last name, White, it was a breeze going back and finding the family in census records. It turned out that the father was John Henry. So if you are stuck on a member of your line, double check the initials of the parents against the other family members death certificates. Many times A and H are confused and the names John are sometimes listed as Jack or Johnathan, especially if the father's name was John.

Doing a family tree can be a time consuming, confusing, hair pulling experience, but gathering all the history can also be very educating. You learn about wars, historical reasons large groups of people left a country and came here, and what wars your ancestors fought in. Military records are available to direct descendants of deceased members, but you do need the branch of service and hopefully service number or dates of approximate service.

Until next week, we wish you happy hunting on your family tree and pray that God will send








"If we have to have the reliever route, we need to make sure it is as close to town as possible," she said.

Covington said she has sent personal notices to all 236 of the Chamber's business members encouraging their attendance at the public meeting on October 9th. The Chamber has not polled its members individually to gauge membership reaction. The office has, however, received telephone calls from several members who will not be able to attend the meeting requesting the questionnaire form that will be handed out at the public meeting.

"Sonora is busy now, because of the gas industry," Covington said, adding, "We don't know if that will still be the case five years from now, but we do know the Ports-to-Plains trade corridor is definitely coming through Sonora.'

Traffic passing through the area from the Ports-to-Plains trade corridor is projected to double the existing rate. Highway 277 from San Angelo to Del Rio will be upgraded to four lanes to accommodate the flow. A reliever route is expected to be constructed to the west of Eldorado and a reliever route is under development in Del Rio.

Sonora's Junior Varsity didn't need a full four quarters to secure their fourth victory of the season. The defense stopped the Warriors on all but one drive and the offense's rushing and passing game was clicking. 
Defensive plays by Paul Faz, Ryan Garmon, Angel Aguayo, and Gonzales put the brakes on the ensuing Warrior drive.
