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

My early stock show career can be summed up in one sentence. I showed sheep. Those of you that have ever spent any amount of time around this animal can appreciate the power of that statement. I've heard it said that, "Every sheep is born looking for a warm place to die", and for the duration of my sheep showing experience, I spent a great deal of time wanting to take my sheep to that "warm place". The winters of my youth were spent running our show lambs around a makeshift track, grumbling under my breath as I spent countless hours working with them, and cringing every time one of those animals sneezed and covered me with a liberal coat of sheep snot. Never has there been a harder headed, clueless, and overall aggravating animal as a sheep, and never has there been a better teacher. I went to college for a total of 7 years receiving 2 degrees, and the lessons I learned in school pale in comparison to the lessons I learned from a sheep.

"We believe in the skills kids learn through stock shows such as time management, commitment, management of resources, and pa-tience", commented Pascual Hernandez, Sutton County Extension Agent, during a recent interview. The Sutton County Stock show has served the youth of Sutton County since at least the late 1940's, showcasing both the agricultural industry and youth of this county.

The 2008 stock show held true to that over 60 year tradition. This year's stock show had over 45 exhibitors showing animals across 27 different classes of livestock (market lambs, meat goats, angora goats, swine, and cattle), and sold a total of 48 lots. Pascual Hernandez noted that stock shows tend to reflect the current trends in the agricultural market, "The exhibitors in the sheep

Everyone that I spoke to about the park knew that it was important and that it had some kind of history, but nobody could tell me exactly what that history was. There were three main theories as to why the park was named Liberty Park. First was that the park was named for all the Hispanic World War II Veterans, second was that the park was named after the Hispanic settlers that first came to Sonora, and the last theory I heard was that the park was named Liberty Park because of all the Cinco de Mayo celebrations held there. I finally came to what I believe is the real story behind the name Liberty Park. Robert Mata Sr. stated, "When they started building it they tried to think of a name. They ended up calling it Liberty Park after all the guys that were coming back from the war".

The park is now covered in graffiti, and the slab is crumbling. This is a far cry from its original design reported in the Devil's River News, "Between the walks grass will be planted, with shrubs and flower beds outlining the walks and the dance platform. In the center of the platform a lily pond and flower beds will be built". The construction of the park took a community effort, and it is going to take another community effort to restore it. Even though there is no formal declaration of this park being a World War II memorial, that does not lessen its importance to the memory this park stands for. The restoration of this park is not simply an issue for the city to worry about, and neither is it strictly a Hispanic issue, it's an American one.

## Body Found at Trailer Park

Police were called onto a gruesome scene on Tuesday, January 15th at approximately 7:00 a.m. where a man was found dead at the Stadium Trailer Park located in the southeast part of Sonora. Texas Rangers were called in to assist in the investigation. There has been no comment issued by the Police Department regarding this matter; however, unconfirmed reports speculate that this was a possible homicide (indicated by wounds consistent with foul play). These sources also report that the victim was a heavy set Caucasian male, in his fifties, employed by Mittel Dozing, and that the victim was found by his employer inside the house.

According to a deputy sheriff working outside of Sutton County, it is not uncommon to have the Texas Rangers called in on a possible homicide. He stated that, "Every county is different in their protocols; the local police's main purpose is to secure the scene for the arrival of the Rangers."

At around 4:00 p.m. that afternoon, several police officers, forensic investigators, and unmarked vehicles were present at the scene. We were assured that Chief House would issue a statement to the press as soon as the investigation progressed further; however, at press time Chief House was still unavailable for comment.

## **Obituaries**

Harvey Lester "Les" Strawn, Jr. age 81, of Coman-che, Texas died Monday January 7, 2008 at his daughter's home after a lengthy battle with cancer and heart disease.

Les served a lifetime of law enforcement. He started his career in the Army as a military policeman. He then attended West Point Academy as a young man and then worked for the Department of Public Saftey a a Texas Highway Pa-

trolman for 23 years, serving the towns and counties of Al-bany, Eastland, Abilene, Del Rio, Sonora, and Comanche. After retiring from the State Highway Patrol, he be-came a police Sergeant for Comanche and served 10 years. He later served as a Deputy Sheriff for Comanche Coun-He was also a private security officer for several years.

After finally retiring from Law Enforcement, his spare time was used doing what he loved, playing golf. He played in many tournaments, always doing well, usually winning. Les played in the PGA Senior Golf Tournament that was televised on ESPN.

Les was instrumental in the development of the Texas Highway Patrol Museum in San Antonio and was on the Board of Directors. Les was also featured in the Winter 2007 edition of the Texas Highway Patrol Magazine, highlighting his great career with the Highway Patrol. Quoting the article, "In 2008 the Wall of History inside the Texas Highway Patrol Museum in San Antonio will be renamed 'The Les Strawn Wall of History' in his honor." Les was also a 32 degree Mason for over 50 years and past

master of the Comanche Lodge. He is survived by his wife of 57 years, Georgia; his daughter - Debbie Perkins of Bailey, Colorado; his son-Anthony Strawn of Burkett, Texas, and his grandchildren - Bandy Jacob Strawn and Destiny Perkins both of Colorado. He was preceded in death by a son, Herschel Strawn.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p.m. Monday, in the Heartland Funeral Home of Comanche, with Bro. R. D. Williams officiating. Burial followed in the Gardens of Memories Cemetery in Comanche County.
