




Hastings Ups Fuentes



There were other times when we really did forget whose was whose. Of course, the biggest one was "mine." I am not sure if we didn't get them very often because Mom couldn't afford them or because of the hassle they

However, some people must receive a stimulus payment. In late March, the IRS will send a special mailing to certain recipients of Social Security and Veterans Affairs benefits. nontaxable and recipients do receive a stimulus payment, people in this group need to file a tax return if they have at least \$3,000 from a combination of certain Social Security benefits, Veterans benefits and earned income. The minimum stimulus payment for these people is \$300 (\$600 for married filing jointly).

The IRS has created a sample of Form 1040A with information on how to fill out a few lines that will enable eligible people who do not normally file a tax return to receive the stimulus payment.






