Construction Project Put On Hold As Trustees Review Contract

The Sonora ISD Board of Trustees held a lengthy meeting Monday night in which they hammered out a "one phase only" addendum to the contract with Chapman Harvey Architects of Lubbock for the athletic facility planned at Bronco Stadium. The original contract was approved by the board at a special meeting on February 6th, with board member Scott Jacoby casting the only dissenting vote.

Following the vote, Jacoby asked Superintendent Bawcom to send the document to the district's legal counsel to review the areas of the contract with which he had concerns. "The contract should have reflected the motion of the board," Jacoby said, adding, "it should have been sent to our lawyers in the beginning." His main concern was contractual language providing for a multi-phase project, including a provision that allows for the architectural firm to be paid what they anticipate they would profit on the value of services not performed by the architect.

"This was truly not the motion of the board," stated Trustee Barbara Jennings. "We agreed that we would do Phase I only and, if we decided not to do anything else, it would end there." This contract, she said, implies that the district will continue with other

The district's legal counsel has responded to Jacoby's concerns with 13 pages of amendments, which were forwarded by the district to the architectural firm. Leonora Clardy, Chapman Harvey's coordinator on the Sonora ISD project, responded to the legal issues raised by the school districts attorney. She told the board that the contract presented was a "standard architectural contract" prepared on documents their firm received from the American Institute of Architects. "We're not trying to put anything over on you," she stated. "Our goal is to get the district a contract you guys feel comfortable with.. (and) one we're comfortable with. We can change the verbiage," she said.

The board asked the architectural representative if their decision had been clearly communicated, eliciting a heated response from Superintendent Bawcom, "This (decision) was very well communicated from me. I'm not going to get thrown under the bus

on this deal," Bawcom told the trustees. Ms. Clardy responded to Bawcom's remarks by stating, "Doug did make it clear that we were only proceeding on Phase I (of the project); I just missed the mark." "I wanted to ensure we (the architects and the school district) had the flexibility, as the project proceeds, to move right into the second phase without having to come back and renegotiate the contract."

Larry Harvey, a partner in the architectural firm, told the board that he "wouldn't hire (the district's attorney) on what I've seen. She doesn't understand our business and doesn't understand our profession." He explained that the open-ended contract would allow the district to go seamlessly from one phase of the project to the other. Harvey further indicated that the district is "wasting time" by sending revisions of the contract to their attorney, and that the August 2008 completion date for the girl's locker room is now an

The board directed the superintendent to send the revised response from the architectural firm, along with their response to the proposed amendments, to the district's attorney for her review before signing off on the addendum.

Board President Dean Dermody remarked to the board," Until we put some trust in them (the architectural firm) we are going to have a hard time getting this done."

Prior to the meeting, incoming Precinct 2 Trustee Tryon Fields told the board that "the contract bothers me." "What you are going to discuss, and possibly approve, could saddle an incoming board with a multi-phase project that they don't agree with." He asked the board to make sure their decision doesn't saddle the new board with a project they don't agree with and the community will not support.

In other construction-related business, Superintendent Bawcom told the board that plans for the public restroom and concession area at the tennis courts has been completed and is ADA compliant. He presented a diagram to the board, indicating that the 19-foot by 23-foot cinder block structure will be located in the corner of the tennis courts. The building will have a metal roof that will coordinate with that of the new vocational build-

Bawcom said the metal building that the district has ordered is expected to arrive on March 15th. "Once the building gets here, we will start construction immediately," he

A lifelong resident of Sonora, Vicenta Lopez is one of the longest registered survivors with Relay for Life in Sutton County. It was 44 years ago - in 1964 - that she first discovered she had breast cancer. Vicenta was scheduled to go in for gall bladder surgery in Houston when she told the doctor about a lump in her left breast. and he ordered a biopsy. When the biopsy came back positive, Vicenta instead went into surgery for a complete mastectomy. Her gall bladder surgery was performed later while she was recovering. from the mastectomy. Vicenta recalled how self conscious she was after having her breast removed. But, her family helped her through it. Between laughs, she recalled that when she refused to go out to eat with her family for fear that people would notice she was "lopsided," one of them got her bra and some tissues and fixed it so know one would notice! Follow up is very important, and Vicenta has made certain that she has gone to yearly checkups every year since the surgery. Throughout the ordeal, Vicenta made Philippians 4:13, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me," her motto, and continues to live by this.





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

Extension Office To Offer Pesticide Applicator Training Course

By Pascual Hernandez



With Spring not far away, some of us begin thinking about ways to control unwanted vegetation. However, you should know that some chemicals are designated general-use pesticides and can be purchased "over-the-counter" while others are restricted-use pesticides and require a pesticide applicator license. So, if you've considered acquiring an applicator license, here are some things you should know.

Private applicator license are required in order to use or supervise the use of restricted or state-limited pesticides or regulated herbicides in the production of agricultural commodities. Applicators must obtain 15 continuing education units (C.E.U.s) every five years, including a minimum of two C.E.U.s in laws and regulations and two in integrated pest management (IPM).

Commercial/noncommercial licenses are required to use or supervise the use of restricted or state-limited pesticides or regulated herbicides, for hire or compensation, on the land of another person (commercial). Applicators must obtain five C.E.U.s annually, including at least one C.E.U. each in two of these three topics: laws and regulations, IPM and drift mini-

With that in mind, if you are interested in acquiring a license, please contact your local County Extension Office at 387-3101. We will be offering a training course on March 25th at the Sutton County Civic Center. We will also provide take-home study material and have a "refresher" session on April 7th. Texas Department of Agriculture personnel will be on hand to administer testing that afternoon. Call by March 14th sothat study manuals can be ordered for you. Sonora Citizens Research Animal Shelter in Junction







Shelter. The word evokes awareness of basic needs: warmth, relief, protection and provision. In Junction Texas, residents joined together to bring a state of the art facility to their community designed to meet the needs of homeless and abandoned animals. The dogs and cats that pass through the doorways of the Sam B.Coffey Animal Shelter are given a second chance of finding a caring home.

The facility is named for the late Sam Coffey, a Baptist minister who was known for his devotion in caring for the homeless pets of Junction. The facility was created primarily with the use of grant monies obtained from two Texas foundations.

Junction City Councilman Larry Maddux played a key role in the shelter project. Maddux and his wife Suzy are former Sonora residents and agreed to give a tour of the facility to a group of Sonorans who share the hope of seeing a similar operation in this community. Since opening its doors (arms) in 2004, the shelter has placed over 50 animals in new homes and has even worked an amazing out-of-state adoption. The shelter is operated by Carolyn Moore, an employee of the City of Junction and foster mom to the shelter residents.
