

Another declares that life was brought to Earth by aliens. Anything but God.

> The most controversial part of the film follows Stein to the Dachau concentration camp, underlining how Darwin's theories of natural selection led to the eugenics movement, embraced by Adolf Hitler. If there is no God, but only a planetary lab waiting for scientists to perfect the human race, where can Darwinism lead? Stein insists that he isn't accusing today's Darwinists of Nazism. He points out, however, that Hitler's mad science was inspired by Darwinism.

> Now that the film is complete, the evolutionist prophets featured in the film are on the warpath inveighing against it, and the alleged idiots who would lower themselves to watching it. Richard Dawkins laments how the film will solicit "cheap laughs that could only be raised in an audience of scientific ignoramuses." Minnesota professor and blogger P.Z. Myers predicts the movie is "going to appeal strongly to the religious, the paranoid, the conspiracy theorists, and the ignorant — which means they're going to draw in about 90% of the American market." Myers and Dawkins now both complain they were "duped" into appearing in the movie (for pay).

> Everyone should take the opportunity to see "Expelled" - if nothing else, as a bracing intidote to the atheism-friendly culture of PC liberalism. But it's far more than that. It's a spotlight on the arrogance of this movement and its leaders. a spotlight on the choking intolerance of academia, and a spotlight on the ignorance of so many who say so much, yet know so very little.

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


This is a true life anecdote about Albert Einstein, and his theory of relativity.



No farewell words were spoken, no time to say good-



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Survivor Of The Week


Sydonia Wilson can nearly be considered a lifelong resident of Sonora – she moved here with her parents at age 5 in 1935 as the youngest of five siblings. Sydonia joked that her parents had been "trying to reach perfection and when they had me they knew they'd achieved their goal."

Sydonia's battle against cancer began in the late summer of 2003 when she was getting a routine mammogram. This led to the early detection of a very small spot that otherwise wouldn't have been noticed for probably more than a year, even with a self breast exam. Luckily, the spot was able to be removed completely with a biopsy and Wilson went on Tamoxifen, a cancer medication, for treatment. At this time, it seemed her battle was over – but unfortunately, that was not the case.

In the late summer of 2006, Sydonia would begin a second cancer battle, but this time, it began in a much different way. It started when, after getting out of the shower, she noticed "polka dots" on her breast. She said they looked like "little flea bites" all over, and immediately made an appointment with her local doctor. Initially, doctors thought that it was an infection and put Sydonia on a round on antibiotics. But, when these didn't phase the "infection," they decided to do a biopsy just in case. By this time, Sydonia had noticed that her lymph node was swollen and she feared the worst. Doctor's found that it was "external aggressive breast cancer" and they gave Wilson two to five years because of the aggressive nature of this form of cancer. The Sunday following her diagnosis, Wilson attended the First United Methodist Church of Sonora, as she does nearly every Sunday. During the service, Rev. Ray Wells asked Sydonia to come to the front and asked the congregation to lay hands on her and pray; Wilson recalled, through tears, how at that very moment she could feel her healing begin. As part of her treatment, Sydonia underwent two rounds of chemotherapy, had her breast removed and then underwent radiation.

Through it all, she remained upbeat and continued to push through. Church and community members accompanied her to each of her treatments, and Sydonia insisted that they do their shopping after her treatments so as to not be "wasting a trip to San Angelo." Wilson, through tears, said that she had two heroes throughout her treatment: Jackie Polocek and Ruth Gibbs. She said she watched both of these women undergo treatment with immeasurable courage; Polocek would receive chemo and then go and teach school and Gibbs would drive herself from the ranch to her treatments. Sydonia knew that if they could do it, so could she and that emulating them would help her fight this disease.

Throughout her treatment, she has constantly maintained that "this will not get the best of me!" She continues to work a few days a week at the Methodist Church and sing in their choir, along with keeping track of her grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Through a mix of laughter and tears, Wilson recalled her memories of her battle so far – and although it is not over, Sydonia has put her mind to winning this battle. And through her hard-headedness and the power of prayer, it seems that this will soon be a reality. This year's Relay for Life will be held on May 9-10 at Bronco Stadium. All Sutton County cancer survivors are encouraged to register with Relay for Life to be recognized at the event. Normal newborns have brief periods of sleep, crying or fussing, and quiet alertness many times a day. They often cry for long periods for no apparent reason. ·Hold and touch your baby as much as possible. You can keep him


