



LBJ: Water stained; 70 deflukes, JDC Skip-N-Pop topwaters, and green pumpkin tubes along docks and break lines of flats with stumps White bass are fair trolling Shad Raps and Tiny Traps. Crappie are good on minnows and white Curb's crappie jigs over brush piles in 8 - 12 feet. Channel catfish are good on live bait and dip bait. Yellow and blue catfish are good on trotlines.

PROCTOR: Water clear; 74 degrees; 0.73' high. Black bass are good on crankbaits off points. Striped bass are good on live shad. White bass are good on live shad. Crappie are good on minnows. Channel and blue catfish are good on fresh shad in the lower end of the lake. Yellow catfish are slow





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"Shattered Dreams"

Unique in its design and powerful in its impact, "Shattered Dreams" is an educational experience that reminds us all of the dangers associated with drinking and driving. It reminds us that too many young lives have already been lost and countless others severely impaired because of the tragic consequences of underage drinking and drinking combined with driving. "Shattered Dreams" is about drinking and driving. It's about living and dying. Can "Shattered Dreams" make a difference in a young person's life? Families, schools, faithbased and community groups in Texas must join together to teach young people that consuming alcohol while underage is never a good choice. Can our communities afford to ignore the devastating impact that underage drinking is causing?

W The "Shattered Dreams" program involves the dramatization of an alcohol-related crash on or near a high school campus, complete with police and EMS response, emergency room treatment, family notifications, and the arrest and booking of the driver. The crash scene drama is played out before the student body during a school day. Throughout the day the other elements of the "docu-drama" unfold. To give students a better understanding of the number of DWI-related deaths, an individual dressed as the "Grim Reaper" appears periodically throughout the school day to select a new victim. In 2000 every 20 minutes someone in Texas was injured or killed as the result of drunk driving. The victims are taken out of class, made-up in white faces and dressed in black t-shirts to symbolize death, and then returned to their classrooms to continue their day. By the end of the day, every student has one or more "dead" classmates present in the classroom with him, and on this note the school day ends. The next morning a wrapup assembly is held featuring those who played roles in the previous day's drama, including the "crash" victims, the drunk driver, their parents, and participating law enforcement and medical personnel. Impact statements from community members whose lives have been affected by teenage alcohol use and drunk driving bring closure to the program and reinforce its dual message for the teenage audience --Don't drink until you are 21, and never drink and drive. "The TABC has participated in many 'Shattered Dreams' productions across the state. The response of all participants, especially that of

students, educators, and parents, has been tremendous. What we are hearing from participants is that this program is touching kids and changing their behaviors as no other program has done before," said Enforcement Chief James Smelser. "We are excited by the results," Smelser continued, "and are looking for opportunities to bring 'Shattered Dreams' productions to other communities."

Dinner was hosted by Kenny's parents at the Cafe Buenos Aires in downtown Santa Barbara.



ASK THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

We have had many questions concerning William Richard Carver the outlaw. So many we will address some of them in this column.

Many researchers over the years have had different theories on the robberies at Grants Station, New Mexico in the fall of 1897 and the robbery attempt at the bank in Nogales Arizona in 1896. WOLA and NOLA researchers are strongly leaning towards Will not participating in these robberies after some excellent documentation by John D. Tanner, Jr. John Tanner is married to the closest living relative to Doc Holliday. He wrote to Donna Ernst with the following statement: "I don't know where Bill Carver was on August 6, 1896, but I know that he was not robbing the International Bank in Nogales. The robbers were : The two Christian brothers, Will and Bob (the later having assumed the alias Tom Anderson), George Musgrave (aka Jesse Williams), Jeff Davis, Jess Miller-and seven other aliases of which I am aware, Bob Hayes and Cole Young. The same is true for the hold-up of the train at Grant's Station on November 6,1887. The fire was not caused by improperly setting explosives. The perpetrators separated the locomotive and cars some two miles away from the passenger cars before they blew the two safes. Following the robbery they placed the locomotive in reverse and it steamed into the passenger cars, causing the explosion and subsequent fire. Fortunately the passengers could well hear its approach and had abandoned their cars. The robbers were George Musgrave (who had assumed leadership of the "High Five" gang), Tom Anderson (Bob Christian), Theodore James and Sid Moore. These two robberies (and a host of others) are well documented and attributed by newspapers, eyewitness accounts, indictments and the very valuable collection of correspondence of the United States Marshal's offices in Arizona and New Mexico territories. They are totally unassociated with Carver and

Inquest was held there. He was first taken to the Sutton County Courthouse and treated by doctors there in the Sheriff/Tax Collectors office, but was removed to the Old Jail later that night. The fatal shot was to the right lung, passing through the body and lodged under the skin near the spine... this bullet was matched up and found to belong to J. R. Davis. Doctors Midkiff and Taylor and D.B. Woodruff the J.P. of Pct. No. 1 and ex-officio coroner all wrote about this and spoke of it for many years after the shooting. They told how the bullets were matched to the guns by the manufacturer of the bullets. Davis, a former Texas Ranger was a crack shot but never bragged about the killing as he had a family and was smart enough to not provoke the living members of the Wild Bunch.

50-195 (05-06/5) **Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures**

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the market or appraised value of your property
 the unequal appraisal of your property
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
 any exemptions that may apply to you
- · the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
 the local governments which should be taxing your property

- the ownership of property
 the change of use of land receiving special appraisal
 any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affects

Informal Review

(Insert description of appraisal district's informal review pro-cess, if any, then give name and telephone number of person taxpayer should contact.)

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hear-ing in the evening, Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your

hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court or an Arbitrator

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. As an alternative and within the same time period, you may file a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district in certain cases

Tax Payment

You must pay either the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday

your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you

(You may insert deadline for protests concerning omitted property if doing so would avoid taxpayer confusion.)

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.
