## OF 4,000 WILD FLOW ERS GROWING IN STATE OF TEXAS, THE PLAINS AREA ENDOWED WITH MORE THAN 60 KINDS Approximately 4,000 dirferent kinds of wid flowers are to be found in the State of Texas, according to authora- tive botanical information, at least 60 spectes of that total' being located on spectes of that total' being located on the South Plains area. Right now probably 25 or 30 different varieties are in blossom and fragrance. LUNCHEON DISHES
F OR a most tasty luncheon dish,
try the following when it is conCasserole of Noodles and Tuna Fish. Take two cuptuls of uncooked
noodles, one pound can of tuna fish, ne-fourth cupful of chopped pimiento, two cupfuls of drained, cannec and buttered crumbs. Cook the noodles until tender in three quarts spoonful of salt has been added. in the bottom of a buttered baking dish, then a layer of fish, pimiento
and peas. Season well and repeat until all the ingredients are used.
Pour over the white sauce and top with a thick layer of butter
crumbs. Bake until brown.

Chicken Pie Supreme. Cut up a cooked chicken and ar
ange in a large casserole in layer with uncooked rice, add small on
ions, broken mushrooms and a few peas. Dot each layer with butter,
using two layers of chicken. Pour season well, cover and cook until
the rice is done. Uncover and place very small baking powder biscuits
over the top or well-browned crou-
lons.
