# Report on TCEQ Investigation: Sonora's Water Supply System

Submitted by the City of Sonora

Re: Complaint Investigation at: City of Sonora Water System, Sonora (Sutton County),

TCEQ PWS ID: 2180001; Incident: 125705; Investigation: 761782

Status: Closed Initial Problem:

On 06/17/2009, an envelope was received at the San Angelo TCEQ Office. The envelope included a letter from an anonymous complainant and a page from a newspaper. The newspaper page consisted of pages 7 and 8 of the June 11, 2009 edition of The Devil's River News, which is the Sonora, Texas, local newspaper. Pages 7 and 8 are the Classified Ads section of the newspaper. The complainant had circled one of the classified ads, which was a public notice that had been placed in the newspaper by the City. The ad notified the public of a repeat monitoring violation. The ad stated that the City of Sonora is required to submit water samples for bacteriological testing, that the samples submitted during March 2009 contained coliform bacteria, that the TCEQ requires the collection of repeat samples, and that the City failed to collect the repeat samples. The letter from the complain-

ant asked for something to be done to educate the City officials about the proper method of alerting citizens of potential health hazards.
