





was actually contracted, because most of the work was done by volunteers, the actual cost was \$80,000.

The church was built from native rock donated by Mrs. Stella Miers Keene from her ranch. The wood beams from the ceiling came from Arkansas, and the marble and granite from the back wall, the altar, light fixtures, and large chandelier came from Mexico. The external shape of the church is that of a Roman cross. The altar is in the center of the sanctuary area with the pews set in a semi-circle so that the faithful will be close to the altar and priest. A large crucifix on the back wall can be seen from all entrances to the church. Many memorials along with labor were given towards the baptismal font, altar, doors, light fixtures, and windows. The church was completed by December

By this time, nuns were not coming to this area, so lay people were being certified to teach the doctrine to children and adults. Also established, was Legion of Mary, Cursilliastas, English and Spanish choirs and also bible studies.

Father Michael Fernandez left to serve in the Odessa area after being in Sonora for ten years. He was greatly missed. Father Louis Moeller and Father John Waldron were the next pastors.

In 1981, Father Gilbert Rodriguez from Mexico became the pastor. He installed the Society of Our Lady of Guadalupe with 28 members. He added a chapel on the east en-

trance. He obtained the image from Mexico. This chapel was built with the generous raising of funds by the Society of our Lady of Guadalupe. Also, to the parish hall.

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Smoke on the Mountain


