Broncos Claim Victory in First District Game

The Broncos came six inches short. If only, Cadesman Pope could have moved the football six more inches after catching the fourth down pass from Ethan Morriss.

The Broncos opened district play with a game against long-time rival. (I know it should be the Reagan County. They will always be the Big Lake Owls to me.) The Broncos won the toss and elected to take the opening kickoff. For the fourth time in six games, they were able to march down the field and score.

The drive took eight plays to cover the sixty yards. Morriss had the biggest gain with a run around the right end: it covered 25 yards. Will Anderson scored the touchdown on a 23-yard run. Dustin Neff missed the PAT kick.

Jorge Gaytan blitzed and made a nice tackle at the start of the Owl drive. Constant pressure on the quarterback caused him to throw an interception to Tyler Creek who returned it down the far sideline setting up the next Bronco score. After the interception, Neff scored on a 14-yard run. The Broncos tried a trick play by having Word Hudson go

in motion, taking the pitch from Caleb Gonzales, the PAT holder, trying to score the two-point conversion. The Owls, either were not fooled, or just got lucky, and stopped him short of the goal line.

The next Bronco scoring drive was a methodical drive of 70 some yards. It started with a roll out pass to Hudson, followed by runs by Morriss, Anderson, and Neff. Neff got his second touchdown on an eleven yard run. He should have been stopped for no gain, but they failed to "wrap up." This time his PAT kick was good.

Throughout the game, the Bronco defense stifled anything the Owls tried. This allowed the Broncos to score two more touchdowns in the second quarter. Gonzales scored the next Bronco touchdown on a 28-yard pass from Morriss. Gonzales almost got another touchdown on a pass that he caught as he fought with the Owl defender and came down with another catch at the two-yard line. Two plays later, Creek caught a five-yard touchdown pass from Morriss.

In the third quarter, Zac Rodriguez ripped off several good runs through the Owls. When

he got the ball to the Owls 30-yard line, Kris Aguero scored on a 30-yard run.

The Owls got two touchdowns in the fourth quarter. One came after Morriss tried a running rugby-style punt that they blocked.

In case you were wondering, Cadesman Pope was stopped six inches short of scoring the seventh Bronco touchdown that would have made the second game of the season of scoring more than 40 points.

Sonora had 22 first downs to 16 for the Owls. The Broncos rushed 27 times for 208 yards and four touchdowns. They completed 11 of 18 passes for 144 yards and two touchdowns. One statistical blemish was 11 penalties for 80 yards. The Broncos fumbled once, but they recovered it. The Owls fumbled once and lost it. The Owls also threw two interceptions. Caleb Gonzales had an interception that did not count due to a Bronco penalty.

The next Bronco game is against Alpine this Friday in Bronco Stadium. The Alpine Bucks are undefeated this season. They defeated the Ozona Lions 26-13 at Lion Stadium.

Saint Ann Catholic Church Celebrates 80 Years

The earliest records found on the Catholic community in Sonora date back to 1898 when a priest, Father Moulin from San Angelo, was coming to hold services in homes. At that time, there were 35 Catholic families in Sonora. By 1915, priests from San Angelo were coming more often either by horseback or buggy. Services were still being held in the homes. Some Catholics were also making the trip to Sacred Heart Church in San Angelo.

By 1924, Father Peter Baquet, pastor of Sacred Heart in San Angelo with donations from the Catholic families purchased property in Sonora and a small wooden building was built, and it was named Saint Ann Mission. He was able to celebrate mass and administer the sacraments more often.

In 1927, Bishop R.A. Gerken, first bishop of the newly formed diocese of Amarillo, found the small mission to be in great need of renovations. This time, with monies from the diocese and the members, renovations were done, and a home for the priests was also built. Now regular services were inaugurated. Sonora became the headquarters for the missionaries that were also serving Ozona and Eldorado.

By 1929, more land was purchased around the same area where the small building had been built and more renovations went on and Saint Ann was completed. Bishop Jerome A. Drosserts of San Antonio dedicated the new church, with Father Baquet as celebrant of the mass. There were 120 confirmations the same day. Bishop Drosserts

proudly noted that in all, Saint Ann had managed to acquire a \$3000 church during very poor years in the county.

In 1938, The Franciscan priests returned to San Angelo and more services were offered throughout the area. Missionary catechists were offering religious education to all the children. A house was built to house these nuns.

Saint Ann church was canonically erected as a parish on August 15, 1955, with missions at Ozona and Eldorado. Father Godfrey Blank, O.F.M. was appointed pastor. By this time Sonora had been served by ten priests and they all had made many contributions to the catholic community. The parish was under the care of the Franciscan priests with the diocese in Amarillo.

On September 7, 1967, the Sonora parish was annexed to the diocese of San Angelo, and the first diocesan priest, Father Michael Fernandez, from Spain became its parish priest. Right away, Father Michael realized the need for a new church building. The number of catholic families had increased through the years.

The present church was built under the guidance of Father Michael Fernandez with the building committee consisting of Mr. & Mrs. Louis Davis, Mr. Polo Cervantes, Mr. Pete Gomez, Sr., and Mr. Louis Olenick. Alvin Julian, San Antonio architect, drew the plans, which would be capable of seating 400 people and the cost estimated was \$130,000.

Since very little of the work

was actually contracted, because most of the work was done by volunteers, the actual cost was \$80,000.

The church was built from native rock donated by Mrs. Stella Miers Keene from her ranch. The wood beams from the ceiling came from Arkansas, and the marble and granite from the back wall, the altar, light fixtures, and large chandelier came from Mexico. The external shape of the church is that of a Roman cross. The altar is in the center of the sanctuary area with the pews set in a semi-circle so that the faithful will be close to the altar and priest. A large crucifix on the back wall can be seen from all entrances to the church. Many memorials along with labor were given towards the baptismal font, altar, doors, light fixtures, and windows. The church was completed by December 1969.

By this time, nuns were not coming to this area, so lay people were being certified to teach the doctrine to children and adults. Also established, was Legion of Mary, Cursillistas, English and Spanish choirs and also bible studies.

Father Michael Fernandez left to serve in the Odessa area after being in Sonora for ten years. He was greatly missed. Father Louis Moeller and Father John Waldron were the next pastors.

In 1981, Father Gilbert Rodriguez from Mexico became the pastor. He installed the Society of Our Lady of Guadalupe with 28 members. He added a chapel on the east en-

trance. He obtained the image from Mexico. This chapel was built with the generous raising of funds by the Society of our Lady of Guadalupe. Also, they made several renovations to the parish hall.

In 1983, Father Bernard L. Gully came to Saint Ann. Right away he realized the pastor had very little privacy at the rectory, since it also held the church office and a meeting room. He was able to purchase a new rectory on Oak Street where it remains the rectory for priests. The old rectory was converted to parish offices and classrooms.

After Father Gully left to serve at Sacred heart Cathedral in San Angelo, Father Lawrence D'Nello was appointed pastor. He made many renovations to the interior of the church to conform to the laws of Vatican II document done with many generous donations.

After Father D'Nello left in 1991, Father William Dubisson took over. Many of the parishioners had met him prior to coming to Sonora, so the community instantly felt comfortable with the new pastor. Father Bill, with his many years of experience, brought his broad knowledge of administration. He started working on plans for new classrooms and a new hall. Father Bill was always looking after the welfare of our youth and their education. He was a big Bronco fan and the football players always knew he would not miss a game. Father Bill served Saint Ann for 14 years.
