

Raising Broiler Birds

Raising Broiler Birds The cross of Rhode Island .Red hens and Barred Rock males is a popular broiler bird. It is said that they grow faster and are easier to raise than most pure breeds. Broil-ers are started on a chick starting ration and can be given hard grain after a short time or raised on an all mash feed. A special broiler ra-tion gives well fleshed birds. The loss in dressing broilers ranges be-between 13 and 14 per cent.
