



Texas held up better than much of the rest of the country throughout the recession. Housing did not get anywhere near as overbuilt during the boom years and home price appreciation was fairly modest. Fewer Texans pulled substantial equity out of their homes and only about half as large a share of Texas homeowners owe more on their homes than they are currently worth as compared to other states. As a result, household balance sheets have remained stronger, job losses were less severe, and fewer homes have slipped into foreclosure. Even state finances held up better, as Texas does not have an income

RUTHIE SHAFER CAHILL


