If fear is a widespread influence, whether justified or not, it will affect [property] value adversely". In his 1993 article "Properties Near Power Lines and Valuation Issues" David Bolton found that the general public perception was that EMFs were the values of adjacent property downwards. 


The City of Sonora gets a big thank you also for exceedingly wonderful water pressure.



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



Stomach Worms Likely To Be Problem This Spring

With the good rains and warmer temperatures will come the inevitable "stomach worms" for livestock. In warm, moist climates, the internal parasite that causes the most problems to sheep and goats is usually Haemonchus Contortus, better known as the "barber pole" worm. It is a blood-sucking parasite that causes blood plasma and protein loss. It is also the largest and most deadly stomach worm.

The symptom most commonly associated with barber pole worm infection is anemia, characterized by pale mucous membranes, especially in the lower eye lid; and "bottle jaw," swelling of fluid under the jaw. The barber pole worm is difficult to control because it has a short, direct life cycle and is a prolific egg producer.

A female barber pole worm can produce thousands of eggs per day. The barber pole worm is also capable of going into a "hypobiotic" or arrested state when environmental conditions are not conducive to its development and resuming its life cycle once environmental conditions improve.

These larvae do not feed or lay eggs and do no damage to their hosts while in this state. However, in spring they resume development and large numbers of eggs are shed into the pastures. When the weather warms up, larvae will be waiting to be ingested. They are less of a problem in arid regions, because parasites require moisture for their develAgriLIFE EXTENSION

Sheep are more susceptible to internal parasites than most other types of livestock.. Their small fecal pellets disintegrate very easily thus releasing the worm larvae onto pastures. They graze close to the soil surface and to their feces. They are slow to acquire immunity. Sheep also suffer a loss of immunity at the time of lambing, which does not restore itself until approximately one month after lamb-

In the U.S., few anthelmintics are FDA-approved for use in sheep and lambs, and no new drugs are likely to be developed. As a result, producers must develop more integrated programs for controlling parasites, which do not rely exclusively on drug therapy.



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
