Marfa, TX – Billy Riffe Shurley of Marfa & San Angelo, Texas died Wednesday, March 31, 2010 surrounded by his family. Bill was born August 15, 1926 to Edgar Derry Shurley and Rae Riffe Shurley. When Bill was four years old his mother passed away. Bill's father married Ruth Tipton Shurley and they were blessed with Bill's little sister Derry Kay. They made their home on the family ranch south of Sonora, Texas. His parents, stepmother and second wife, Louellen Shurley, have preceded Bill in death.

A graveside service was held Saturday, April 3, 2010 at the Cemetery in Sonora, Texas. Arrangements were by Kerbow Funeral Home.

A memorial service will be held at the First United Methodist Church in Marfa, Texas on Saturday, April 17, 2010 at 2:00 pm

Bill played high school football and played in the marching band for the Sonora Bronco's. He was an Eagle Scout and awarded the Order of the Arrow. He was also an accomplished pianist. Bill was in the class of '46 at Texas A&M University but was unable to graduate due to enlisting in the Army Air Corp during WWII. He served as a gunner on the B-29 Superfortress. After the war he attended the University of Wyoming and graduated with a B.S. degree in Wool Technology. While at the University, he played football for the Wyoming Cowboys and was honored as a Little All American running back. He was a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon.

In 1949, he married Jane Bryant and upon his graduation, they moved to Marfa, Texas where they began a long life of West Texas ranching; during which time, he lived a very full and diverse life. Bill was recently awarded Agricultural Conservationist of the Year.

Bill passed down his love of sports, music and a sense of fun to his grandkids. "Paw Paw" was so proud of all of their accomplishments. He loved to follow them as they competed in swimming, soccer, baseball, football, band, theatre, and singing. He was always there to saddle up "Old Pinto" for horseback riding, and driving the infamous "dune buggy," and hunting mule deer, quail and coyotes. All of the grandkids cherish lessons learned and time spent with their grandfather.

Other highlights in Bill's life include his starring role as Ed Kerr in the Walt Disney movie, "Sancho The Homing Steer," narrated by Rex Allen, taken from a J. Frank Dobie short story. He was photographed as the Marlboro man for billboards and print ads. He was a model for Ralph Lauren in fashion magazines. However, his real passions were flying and being a cowboy.

Bill was a member of the AOPA since 1951 and a member of the Quiet Birdsmen Association. He set a world record for towing four sailplanes simultaneously. He was also the tow

pilot on the record setting "Border to Border" sailplane flight of four sailplanes that flew from Mexico to Canada. He was a member of the Confederate Air Force.

Bill was a gold card member of the PRCA. He loved steer roping and team roping. He was competing in the steer roping at the Cheyenne Frontier Days Rodeo on the day of the first lunar landing

He was a member of the Marfa School Board, Marfa TV Cable Co. Board, Presidio County Airport Board, Rio Grande Electric Board and the University of Texas McDonald Observatory Board. Bill was a long time member and held many leadership positions at the First United Methodist Church of Marfa.

Many comments have been made about Bill, but one in particular stands out from one of his friends: "He had the most beautiful smile when he told you no. You just had to like him anyway!" There was always a twinkle, a perceptible tenderness and love for his fellow man in his eyes. That will always be with us; even now that he's finally been "turned out" into his Maker's green pastures. We will miss him...

"Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timberland!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "productivity value" of their land rather than on market value. This means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber-not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 2010 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.

Don't get hit with a penalty! "Render" your taxable property by April 15.

A "rendition" is a report to your county appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on Jan. 1 of this year.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income-such as the inventory and equipment used by a business. If you render late, don't render or file an incomplete or false rendition, a 10 percent to 50 percent penalty may be imposed.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. The appraisal district must notify you in writing of any value change and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 2009. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2010.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 2010 renditions is April 15. You can get an automatic extension to May 15 (or the next business day if a weekend) if you ask for it in writing on or before the April 15 deadline. The chief appraiser may grant an additional 15 days after May 15 for an owner who shows good cause in writing.

A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owns a home on Jan. 1 and uses it as a primary residence on that date is entitled to a \$15,000 homestead exemption to lower school taxes this year...and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.

Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled—or if you're 65 years old or older—you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the 65 or older or disabled exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The county, city or junior college may adopt a tax ceiling to lock in 2010 taxes as the highest amount for 65 and older or disabled homeowners.) The age 65 or older homeowners school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. The age 65 or older homeowners (or their surviving spouses 55 years of age or older) also may transfer the percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's school tax ceiling, to a new home.

If you're a disabled veteran who receives from the Veterans Affairs (VA)—(1) 100 percent disability compensation due to a service connected disability and (2) a rating of 100 percent disabled or a determination of individual unemployability, you are entitled to an exemption from taxation of the total appraised value of your resident homestead. A surviving spouse does not qualify.

Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 2009, you won't need to reapply for 2010 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home—or if you've moved to a new home—you'll need to file for an exemption for 2010. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the age 65 or older exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you became disabled, you need to file for the disabled person's exemption. the disabled person's exemption.







Following completion of the environmental review, the Service will publish a notice of availability and a request for comments on the draft EIS and the Applicant's permit application, which will include the draft HCP. The draft EIS and draft HCP are expected to be completed and available to the public in early to mid-2010.
