

Hotel Occupancy Tax

A Quick Discussion on Design and Intent

*editors note-Last weeks edition included a letter to the editor which has brought up a question reguarding the Hotel Occupancy Tax (or HOTS). I admit that it was not a subject I knew much about, but have researched it and am printing some of my findings in the hopes that it will resolve some questions reguarding this issue.

According to the State Comptroller's office, this is a tax paid by "a person who pays for a room or space in a hotel costing \$15 or more each day". The hotel owners are not directly burdened by additional tax liability, but (just as the case with sales tax) they must increase their rates to adjust for that taxthus increasing the cost of their service. Money collected in each community is then re-distributed back to the communities-by the state-in order to "enhance and promote tourism and the convention and hotel industry". Simply put-the hotels charge extra, send that extra amount to the state, the state then returns what was collected back to the city. The city is then mandated by the state to spend the money only on things that will bring more tourists into that city.

One example of the allocation of those funds in Sonora is seen through the "Daddy Daughter Date Night" sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce. As the Date Night is an event they expect mostly local participation, they pay for the costs associated with the dance with revenue not generated with the hotel tax. I use this organization as an example because they receive HOTS money. The Letter to the Editor questioned Friends of Historic Main Street, and while it would have been appropriate to use them as an example their board wants to

address the letter themselves.

Up on Eaton Hill Monumental Spring!

For ten years I have wandered the trails of Eaton Hill - often exhilirated by a new discovery or thrilled by a chance observation. But NEVER before have I witnessed such an eruption of spring splendor as is on display right now. The hill is absolutely LUSH with flowering vegetation, new leaves, grasses and all the creatures responding to their good fortune – especially the birds! Making my way between the Eaton House and the birding shelter (a very short hike), I could scarcely take in all the wonders and finally just sat down in hopes of keeping my presence from disrupting the busy morning display. In front of me a pair of hooded orioles were foraging, a first of season ruby-throated hummingbird whizzed back and forth from feeder to limb, and just over my shoulder a black-capped vireo sang loud and clear – giving his all for the ladies to appreciate. On the ground and atop the rock wall, in and out of the fresh-leaved mesquite trees hopped a herd of sparrows, gleaning mosels of who knows what-all. There sat I, surrounded by wildflowers in shades of blue, pink, white, yellow, red, purple and orange; receiving the gift of being present without being noticed. The words of naturalist John Muir, which are found on the Eaton Hill brochure came to me once again: "In every walk with nature, one receives far more than he seeks."

John Muir is often referred to as the "Father of the National Park System". He was born in Scotland in 1838 and immigrated with his family to the United States as a boy of just eleven years. His passion for preserving and appreciating the intristic value of nature came, well, naturally. From a young age, John showed himself to be a rather remarkable individual. He loved to read and learn, but working the family farm in Wisconsin left no time for such pursuits. Having been granted permission to read in the hours before work, young John invented a contraption that would physically dump him out of bed at 1:00 a.m. so he could study. An "early-rising machine" it was called. While attending the University of Wisconsin, Muir distinguished himself by building hand-made clocks with large, carved, wooden gears. One such invention was a combination desk and clock. The machine incorporated a timer that would allow a specific amount of time to study a lesson and then remove it and rotate in the next book, and so on throughout the days study time. Muirs' innovative creativity extended to expressions of his personality as well. Being described by a friend as "...bubbling over with fun, and a keen participant in frolics and college pranks...", he built a chair and deemed it "the loafer's chair" - which when sat upon would set off a spring and thus fire an old pistol concealed beneath the seat of the chair!

In 1887, John Muir turned away from an almost certain future of wealth and acquisition, and instead began in earnist to "study the inventions of God." In 1890, the US Congress declared Yosemite a National Park, due in large part to Muir's efforts. In addition, a camping trip with Teddy Roosevelt at Yosemite is said to have sealed President Roosevelts' determination to expand the National Park System of

Ultimately, John Muir found the heart of God revealed most intimately in the natural world. I wholeheartedly agree.
