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

The Sonora Volunteer Fire Department recently participated in live fire training in Big Lake, Texas. Pat Campbell, Maray Cearley, Rick Cearley, Manuel Duran, Peter Duran, Don Reese, Mikey Sanchez and Jacqui Thomas all attended. Self-contained breathing apparatus and full bunker gear were worn while learning to contain and extinguish the fires. Students were taught a gallon of water produces 1,700 cubic feet of steam, which can be used to extinguish the flames and to use different fog patterns to vent smoke and heat through openings to the outside.

"Actually," said the shopkeeper, "I've never really seen him do anything but drink beer and whiskey and make alot of noise, but his papers say he's a Company Man."



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

Will Dunn finished eighth in the 110 m hurdles.



Sonora Golfers Take On State


