

### **Breast Cancer Awareness** Month Kicks Off At The **Sutton County Courthouse**

All life is a fight where the battle lines are drawn between the first desperate gasp of air and the surrendering release of the last breath. Most of us never have to choose any specific battleground, and continue about our everyday lives without a thought towards our own mortality. There are; however, some people that have no choice but to turn and face that unrelenting adversary. In 2009, 254,650 American women have had to stop their lives to turn and look across the field of battle. In a perfect world they would be allotted the time to focus on the upcoming fight, but our reality is not perfect. They do not get a break from paying bills, taxes, or work. They have to continue on as best they can-looking across the battle lines while breast cancer stares back at them.

In the "Art of War" by Sun Tzu there is a well known passage that states, "keep your friends close and your enemies closer". While Sun Tzu may have been talking about war among men, there are some shocking statistics that show it applies to the war on breast cancer. In the case of breast cancer early detection (keeping your enemy closer) seems to be the key to a successful battle plan. Generally speaking there is an estimated 95% survival rate of patients diagnosed with breast cancer if the tumor is 2 centimeters or less in diameter. Depending on any number of factors, that 5 year survivability rate can decrease to 67% if that tumor grows only three more centimeters. Keep your enemies closer because its easier to see them coming. has invested in a new tool that takes early detection to a level not seen in Sonora before.

With the acquisition of a digital mammography machine the Hospital is now able to provide a tool to assist in early detection of breast cancer. This new machine is able to detect the pre-cursors to the formation of breast cancer tumor cells, in effect detecting breast cancer before it forms. In addition to mammograms the machine is built to perform breast capable MRIs, and sonograms. Making it a device designed to accommodate a wide variety of women's health needs.

This Friday, October 1st at the Sutton County Courthouse our community will come together in order to fulfill the first part of Sun Tzu's statement (keep your friends close). Everyone is invited to put on something pink and come to the courthouse to kick off Breast Cancer Awareness Month.
