

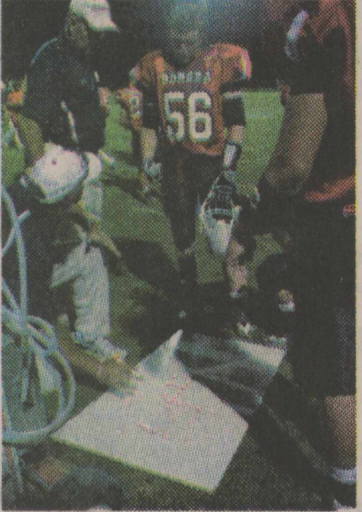

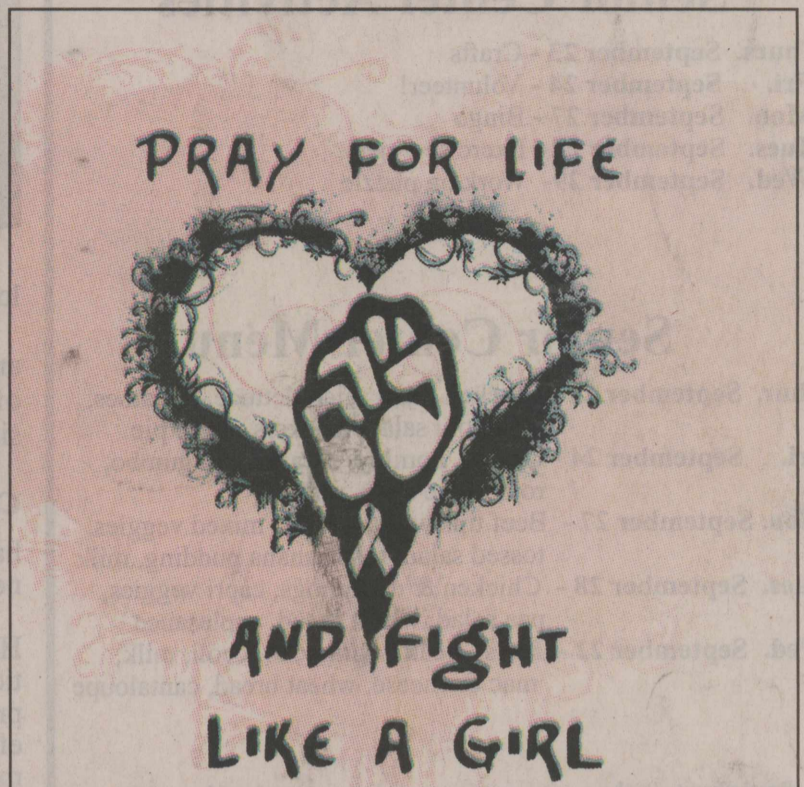

Breast Cancer Awareness Month Kicks Off At The Sutton County Courthouse

All life is a fight where the battle lines are drawn between the first desperate gasp of air and the surrendering release of the last breath. Most of us never have to choose any specific battleground, and continue about our everyday lives without a thought towards our own mortality. There are; however, some people that have no choice but to turn and face that unrelenting adversary. In 2009, 254,650 American women have had to stop their lives to turn and look across the field of battle. In a perfect world they would be allotted the time to focus on the upcoming fight, but our reality is not perfect. They do not get a break from paying bills, taxes, or work. They have to continue on as best they can-looking across the battle lines while breast cancer stares back at them.

In the “Art of War” by Sun Tzu there is a well known passage that states, “keep your friends close and your enemies closer”. While Sun Tzu may have been talking about war among men, there are some shocking statistics that show it applies to the war on breast cancer. In the case of breast cancer early detection (keeping your enemy closer) seems to be the key to a successful battle plan. Generally speaking there is an estimated 95% survival rate of patients diagnosed with breast cancer if the tumor is 2 centimeters or less in diameter. Depending on any number of factors, that 5 year survivability rate can decrease to 67% if that tumor grows only three more centimeters. Keep your enemies closer because its easier to see them coming. For our older Sonora Bronco Fans who may have started a “Bucket List,” we can scratch through any need to see a football game with non-stop action, trick plays, fake punts, pick six interceptions, 12 touchdowns, five lead changes, comebacks from 12 and 11 points down, and a desperation game winning drive where the winning touchdown came with no time left on the game clock!

The regular season is half over, and the Bronco Na-

tion has already enjoyed three games of extraordinary suspense and excitement. In the Brady game, we got to watch the Bronco defense stop the Bulldogs as they tried to come from behind. Then the Ballinger game featured a Bronco team that overcame a 21-point deficit to take the lead only to see the Bearcats drive the field losing on the last play of the game as their field goal to tie missed. The excitement of those two games now seems like watching paint dry when

compared to this week's game versus the Blanco Panthers. Ever since the 2000 State Championship game, where Sonora won 27 to 24, the Blanco Panthers had owned the Broncos when they were in our district in 2006 and 2007.

The Panthers won the toss. Blanco came to the line of scrimmage using the same offense that they used in 2000. Tim Goodman, a sophomore making his first varsity start, scored on his first carry on a 66-yard run on a mid-line trap play. In what was going to plague the Panthers all night, TJ Raby badly hooked his PAT kick that smacked the little bucking Bronco on the scoreboard next to the “Class of 1976” sign. The Panthers had a 6 to 0 lead with only 16 seconds off the clock.

Eric Santana returned the Panther kickoff to the Broncos' 33-yard line. The Broncos made two first downs as Ethan Morriss completed two third down passes to Word Hudson. The drive ended when Cadesman Pope had a pass from Morriss go through his hands, and a diving Sam Isenburg intercepted for the Panthers near the Panthers' 20-yard line.

Despite excellent tackles by

Jorge Gaytan, Lino Villaneuva, Sam Powers, and Zach Badeaux, the Panthers logged two first downs on Bronco penalties. Gavin Garrow broke free for a 20+ yard run to the Broncos' 22-yard line. They did not go any farther as the Broncos forced a turnover on downs.

After two plays of no gain and another penalty, Morriss found Hudson over the middle for a 36-yard gain for a Bronco first down at their own 41-yard line. Bronco penalties moved the ball back to the 20-yard line. Gavin Garrow intercepted and returned it to the Bronco 16-yard line. On the next play, Garrow appeared to score but a motion penalty against the Panthers cancelled it. Goodman broke through the Bronco line again and made to the Broncos' one-yard line. He got his second touchdown of the night two plays later on a quick hitter. After a Blanco penalty, Panther quarterback Tanner Rogers was forced to scramble. Davis Jimenez hit him low and prevented the two-point conversion. The Panthers lead 12 to 0 with 0:28 left in the first quarter.

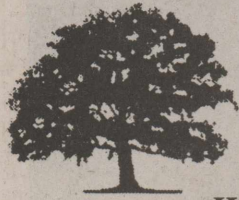
Ryan San Miguel returned the kickoff to the Bronco 39-yard line. Coach Sine

called Badeaux's number on a seldom used trick play that resulted in a 40-yard run to the Panthers' 21-yard line. Imoni Cross almost scored on the next play as he gained 20-yards to the Panthers' one-yard line as the first quarter ended. On the first play of the second quarter, Morriss scored on a quarterback sneak. Cross got off a low PAT kick that was blocked. The scoreboard read Vistors 12 – Broncos 6 with 11:56 left in the second quarter.

Preston Lopez and Pope stopped the first down run, Gaytan sacked Rogers on second down, and Rogers threw incomplete on third down forcing a punt to the Broncos. Morriss completed a pass to Braxton Snyder for a 20-yard gain to the Panther 36-yard line. Two plays later, Morriss scored from 19-yards out. Morriss attempted a pass for two to Snyder, but a Panther deflected it incomplete. New game: 12 to 12 at 8:45 left in the first half.

With the ball at the Panthers' 35-yard line, Rogers threw a quick pass that was intercepted by 6'4" Pope who took to the barn for the first Bronco lead of the night. Cross

has invested in a new tool that takes early detection to a level not seen in Sonora before.

With the acquisition of a digital mammography machine the Hospital is now able to provide a tool to assist in early detection of breast cancer. This new machine is able to detect the pre-cursors to the formation of breast cancer tumor cells, in effect detecting breast cancer before it forms. In addition to mammograms the machine is built to perform breast capable MRIs, and sonograms. Making it a device designed to accommodate a wide variety of women's health needs.

Multi-County Range, Predator and Livestock Program Slated for Oct. 26 in Ozona

OZONA - Range topics, predators and livestock issues will all be addressed during a multi-county program conducted by the Texas AgriLife Extension Service offices in Crockett, Sutton and Schleicher counties from 8:30 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. Oct. 26. The program will be held in the Crockett County Fair Park Convention Center, located at 1301 Ave. AA in Ozona. Three Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units will be offered.

"Anthrax and predator problems have been a topic of concern with many landowners in Crockett, Sutton and Schleicher counties this year, as well as in previous years," said Chase McPhaul, AgriLife Extension agent in Crockett County. "The purpose of this program is to educate producers and give them possible solutions to their predator issues, as well as other ranch-related problems."

The day's topics and speakers will include:

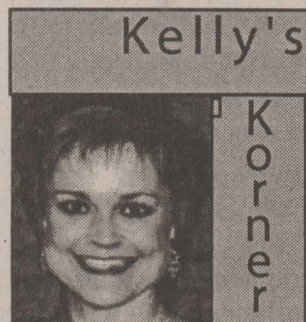
- Recognizing and Managing Common Livestock Health Problems (including anthrax), Dr. Floron "Buddy" Faries, AgriLife Extension program leader for veterinary medicine at College Station.

- Least Cost, Most Effective Methods for Controlling Pricklypear, Juniper, Mesquite and Regional Perennial Weeds, Alyson McDonald, AgriLife Extension range specialist at Fort Stockton.

- Interpreting Evidence of Predation, Predator Biology,

and Trapping Techniques and the Role of Predator Control in Predator Management, Saidor "Hoppy" Turman, Texas Wildlife Damage Management Service district supervisor at Fort Stockton.

Diabetes Numbers Are on the Rise

According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), the number of people with diabetes has increased by 3 million in 3 years to a new high of 24 million. This means that almost 8 percent of people in the U.S. have diabetes. Almost a quarter of people over 65 years old have diabetes. In addition, 57 million people have pre-diabetes, which means they are at very high risk for developing diabetes.

Are you or someone in your family at risk for type 2 diabetes? Your risk is higher if you are over 45 years of age, especially if you are over your recommended weight. You are also at higher risk if you are less than 45 years of age and have any one of these risk factors: physically inactive; have close rela-

tives with diabetes; are a member of high-risk ethnic populations such as African American, Latino, Native American, Asian American, or Pacific Islander; have delivered a baby weighing over 9 pounds; have high blood pressure, high cholesterol and/or triglycerides, polycystic ovary syndrome, tests indicating your body is not

handling glucose well, or a history of vascular disease.

If you think you are at risk, ask your doctor or clinic for a fasting blood glucose test. Then, make sure you understand the results when they come back to you. Ask for a copy, and keep that copy somewhere so you can find it and compare future results.

If you are told your re-

sults indicate you do have pre-diabetes, is there anything you can do to reduce your risk of developing diabetes? The Diabetes Prevention Program showed the answer is "yes." By walking 30 minutes daily for 5 days each week at a moderate speed and losing 7 percent of your body weight, 58 percent of the people participating in this study did not develop diabetes.

If you know you have diabetes and you want to learn more about how to make sure you do the best you can by keeping your blood glucose in the range recommended by the American Diabetes Association (70 mg/dL to 130 mg/dL), ask your doctor or clinic for help finding diabetes self-management classes in your community. Doctors and other health care professionals can provide advice and medicines, but the person with diabetes has to manage it every day.

kicked the PAT, and the Broncos led 19 to 12 with 8:38 left in the second quarter.

The Panthers stuck to their game plan of running the ball. Kyle Patlan logged a solo tackle and blitzing Badeaux had another tackle of a loss. After a holding penalty, Rogers' pass to Travis McClinton came up short, and the Panthers lined up in punt formation. A short snap to Garrow resulted in a run for a Panther first down at the Bronco 38-yard line. Six plays later, Kyle Garrow leaped into the

end zone with the option pitch from Rogers. Raby kicked the PAT, and the score at the half was 19 to 19.

Santana returned the second half kickoff to the Bronco 36-yard line. Two first downs later, Morriss threw to Cross. He caught the pass near the 20-yard line and eluded tacklers for an apparent touchdown. It was wiped out by an illegal formation penalty. Two plays later, Morriss threw a pick six to Ethan Evans. This was lead change number two. A high snap resulted in a failed PAT,

and the Panthers regained the lead at 25 to 19 with 10:18 left in the third quarter.

The next Bronco series seemed to be doomed by good Panther defense and Bronco penalties. Clayton Parks came in to punt, but he fooled the Panthers with a perfect pass to Dallas Payne. Payne completed a 50-yard catch and run. Four plays later, Morriss scored from the four after a nice block by Coyler Dermody. Gaytan kicked the PAT giving the lead back to the Broncos at 26 to 25 with 4:52 left in the third quarter. This was the third lead change of the game.

Sam Isenberg returned Gaytan's kickoff about 70 yards to the Broncos' 11-yard line. On Goodman's second carry of the drive, he leaped into the end zone for the fourth lead change. Goodman tried to score two more points but Powers and K. Patlin stopped him short of the goal line. The Broncos now trailed by 5 points at 31 to 26 with 3:54 left in the third quarter.

Despite a good catch and run by Cross that moved the ball into Panther territory, the Panther defense forced a turnover on downs. On the first play of the fourth quarter, Rogers completed a long pass to Jordan Handberry who was tackled by Shane Patlin at the Broncos' four-yard line. (At this point, I was thinking about how much I dislike writing articles when the Broncos' score is less than our

opponents.) Four plays later, Payne intercepted a fourth down pass in the end zone, and I felt somewhat better.

A pump fake by Morriss set up the hitch and go by Hudson for a 45-yard pass play. Two big runs by Morriss moved the ball to the Panthers' 13-yard line. My heart had a sinking feeling of impending doom as Gavin Garrow intercepted a fade pattern to Hudson in the end zone with 8:42 left in the game.

Two plays later, Rogers threw a 79-yard touchdown pass to McClinton. As an official was running past the Blanco bench, a Blanco coach said one too many things about the officiating. The Panthers had to try for two from the 18-yard line after the unsportsmanlike penalty. Due to more penalties, it took two plays before the PAT failed. The Broncos were now eleven points down with 7:11 left in the game.

The mood in the visiting stands was now at an all-time high. I was thinking the obvious: we need to score quickly. After a touch-back on the kickoff, Morriss thrilled the Bronco Nation with a much needed 80-yard run for a touchdown. The two-point conversion failed, and the Panthers led by a score of 37 to 32 with 6:52 left in the game.

At this point, the chess match between the opposing coaches got serious. The

Panthers were expected an on-sides kick, but Gaytan kicked it deep. The Panthers returned to their running game trying to run time off of the clock. In fact, they started using the wrap-around draw, which they used with success in the 2000 State Championship game. After one first down, the Panthers punted. There was 4:32 left in the game. With 3:11 left in the game, Morriss threw his fifth interception.

With 2:14 left in the game, Gavin Garrow appeared to run for the game winning first down at the Broncos' 39-yard line, but a holding penalty by Blanco made it third and 15. After the last Bronco timeout, Goodman gained 11 yards on the wrap-around draw. There was a penalty called against Blanco. In the coaches' chess match, it was now Coach Sine's call. "Do I accept the penalty and give them another play and lose about a minute off the clock, or do I refuse the penalty and give a great rushing teams a fourth and short?" Coach Sine chose to refuse the penalty. Back to Coach Rogers. "If I go for it on fourth and three and make it, game over. But if Sonora stops me, they will have a short field." He chose to punt, and his punter kicked it out of bounds at the Broncos' 21-yard line with 1:41 left to play.

Could the cardiac Broncos go 79 yards with no time outs left? A nice catch by Pope moved the chains to the Bronco 36-yard line. After a

six yard catch by Badeaux on third down, Morriss dropped to pass on fourth and four. As he searched for a receiver, a Panther caught him. As Morriss was being thrown for a loss, he threw it while falling down. Pope made a miraculous catch at the Panther 45-yard line for the first down. The clock showed 32 seconds left. Two incomplections later, there were only 22 seconds left. On third down, Morriss hit Cross between four Panther defenders at the 25-yard line. After spiking the ball to stop the clock, Morriss threw to Badeaux who had snuck out of the backfield. Badeaux had to twist his body to catch the pass that was slightly low and behind him. He sped toward the end zone and was tackled at the three. Morriss rushed to the line and spiked the ball with four seconds left in the game. Coach Sine signaled in the play. "Ethan, you run the ball to the right," was the call. Morriss took the snap and ran straight for the right pylon using all the speed that he had. He crossed the goal line as the buzzer sounded with his fifth rushing touchdown of the night winning the most exciting game in memory.

During the post game celebration, I overheard Coach Payne tell his wife, "We had it all along."

The 5 and 0 Broncos have a bye next week before they start district play against the Junction Eagles in Bronco Stadium.

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Sonora To Host Two Educational Opportunities in October

October will start off by offering two educational opportunities for our folks. The first is a Hunter Education Course. This event is offered by the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department and Texas AgriLife Extension Service. The course is for anyone needing a hunter education certificate.

The two-day course begins on October 1st at 6:00 p.m. at the Sonora High School. The 2nd day begins at 8:00 a.m. Upon satisfactory completion, participants will receive their hunter certification. Remember that every hunter (including out-of-state hunters) born on or after Sept. 2, 1971, must successfully complete a Hunter Education Training Course. There is no cost for the training, but your certificate will require \$15. Youth participants aged 12 and older will be eligible for consideration for a doe hunt. Call the

Extension Office at 387-3101 to register.

Secondly, the Edwards Plateau Prescribed Burning Association's Cinco Chapter will conduct an "Equipping Ranchers to Manage Rangelands" field day from 9:30 a.m. until 3 p.m. on Oct. 5 at the Sonora Texas AgriLife Research Station.

Three Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units will be offered—one and a half in the general category and one and a half in the integrated pest management category.

The field day will be very informative for those now using prescribed fire to manage noxious plant species and for those considering it. The intent is to allow land managers to learn how to get the most from their fire efforts while maintaining a high level of safety and legal protection.

The morning topics include: Edwards Plateau Prescribed Burning Association Insurance, Economics of Brush Management, Harvesting Deer for Herd Improvement, Texas Fire Law and Liability Concerns. Lunch will be served on site and is \$10.

Afternoon field tour topics will include: Fire Line Preparation and Maintenance, Herbicide Treatment Following Fire and Mechanical Disturbance, and Improving Nutrition Through Burning.

The field tour will be sponsored by AgriLife Research, the Texas AgriLife Extension Service, the Natural Resources Conservation Service and the Concho Valley Resource Conservation and Development Area.

Landowners Reminded Licenses Needed to Operate Hunting Leases

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department would like to remind landowners that a hunting lease license is required for certain hunting operations, and that those licenses must be renewed yearly.

The owner of a hunting lease or the landowner's agent may not receive pay or anything of value from hunters unless the owner or agent has acquired a hunting lease license from the department. This law applies to all hunting leases.

There are three types of lease licenses: (1) hunting lease license; (2) hunting cooperative; and (3) wildlife management association. The license is required to be displayed on the hunting lease property.

The first type of license, the hunting lease license is for

the total amount of property in a county owned by an individual, partnership, firm, or corporation. Lease licenses can be purchased at any location where Texas hunting or fishing licenses are sold. Or, licenses can be bought online

with a credit card at www.tpwd.state.tx.us Fees are:

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- Between 500-1,000 acres – \$147
- More than 1,000 acres – \$252

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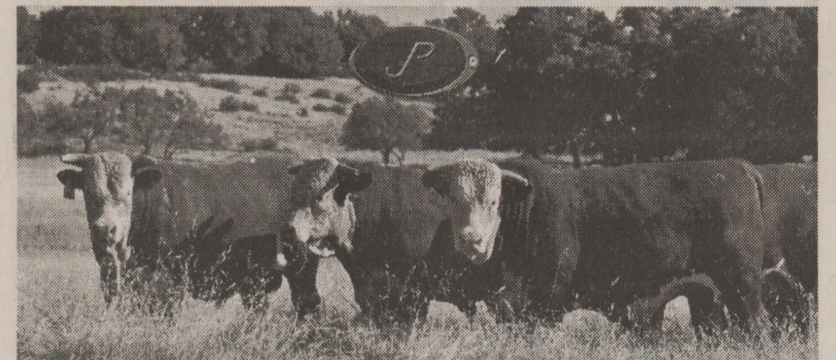
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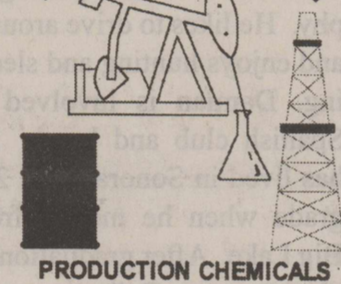
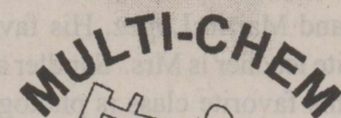
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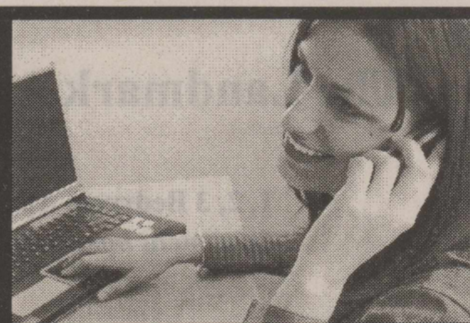
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Colts vs Blanco 8th Grade Boys

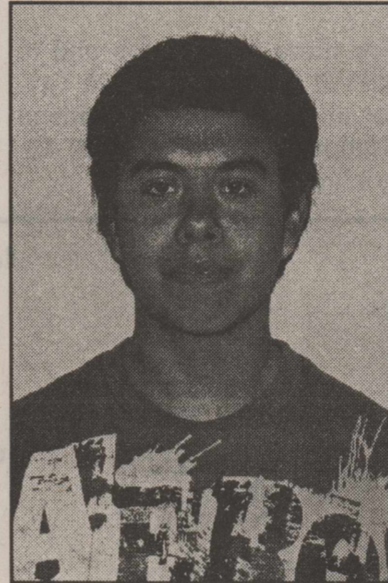

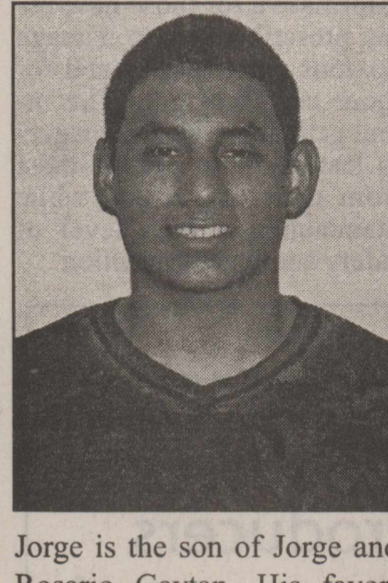

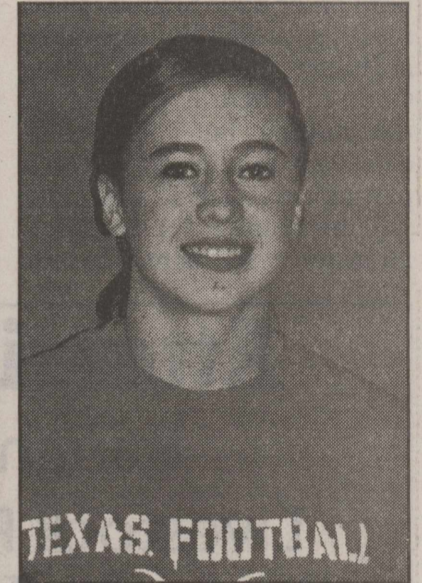
High School Students Of The Week
